When God Shows Up in Straw and Silence

"They found Mary and Joseph, and the baby, who was lying in the manger."
- Luke 2:16

We humans are great at imagining gods that fill in the gaps of our lives: gods of power where we feel weak, gods of control when life feels chaotic, gods who win because we so often lose. We create gods in our own image, just upgraded. Richer, stronger, shinier.

But then comes this baby. Born in a barn, wrapped in rags, lying in a feed trough. No divine spotlight. No thunder. Just a cry in the cold night. This child is God's loud "no" to all our projections of unshakable strength and polished perfection.

The word "God" has carried so many meanings throughout history: some awe-inspiring, some terrifying, some hollow. But the Christ child gives us a new reading. A new translation, a new name "Emmanuel": **God with us.** Not above us. Not aloof. Not unreachable. But right here, close enough to touch. Fragile enough to hold.

In Bethlehem, God didn't show up cloaked in glory. He showed up as a nobody: a "have-not," a refugee, someone already marked for death. And in doing so, God rewrote what power looks like.

This baby is the embodied "No" to all our idols. But he is also the radiant "Yes" to a new kind of hope. A hope that doesn't ignore suffering but lives through it. A hope that dares to believe the world can be remade, not through force, but through love.

Still, we ask:

If Christ has come, why do children still starve?
Why are strangers still turned away?
Why do some hearts still break under the weight of injustice?

Friends, I hope this Advent journey will be a meaningful one for you and may you experience Our God, called Emmanuel, God with us.

There are a lot of things going on in our church life. We are planning, praying, and preparing for different events and when they come, they are over and we go on with the next thing. This section in our Newsletter should give us a moment of appreciation and celebration of what we have done and experienced in the last month.

So let's celebrate and be thankful!

When God Goes to the Movies: Faith, Fellowship & Popcorn

When we kicked off our sermon series "When God Goes to the Movies," I'll be honest—I wasn't totally sure how it would land. 9 full weeks diving into three different movie franchises: Star Wars, Harry Potter and Lord of the Rings. 9 Sundays, 9 Trivia Nights and 6 Movie Nights. It felt a little risky and honestly overwhelming. But it turns out, God is just as present at the movies as in the sanctuary and sometimes with popcorn in hand. Each week, we explored the deeper spiritual truths hidden in some of our favorite films. And let me tell you, I was not prepared for how much Anakin Skywalker made me tear up. His journey from that little gifted naiv boy to someone who fell to the lies of this world, chose the dark side and did terrible things... thinking there is no way back from this...When Obi Wan said "You are lost, Anakin", I realized in a new way, how powerful the message of the gospel is: There is always a way back into life with Jesus.

Then there was Harry Potter, who surprised me more than I had expected. I saw in him a Jesus-like figure, not in the "turn water into pumpkin juice" way, but in the way he chooses love over fear, light over darkness. He's someone who *struggles*, who tries his best, and still shows up for his friends and the greater good. In other words: a deeply relatable, wand-carrying example of discipleship.

And it wasn't just about the sermons. We had an absolute blast bringing this series to life in other ways like Trivia Nights at the Mason Jar (which was way more work than I had anticipated: Thanks to the head Trivia team, Macey Fredenberg, Scarlett and Ash Arlt). We had folks show up who'd never set foot in a church and weren't necessarily planning to! One younger student said after our *Lord of the Rings* night: **"Thank you so much for doing this. This is so much fun!"** That right there was the moment I knew: this series is doing what church is supposed to do.

Our Thursday Movie Nights at the church were also a surprising little ministry of their own. We had one visitor come *just* for the movies, not Sunday worship, not Bible study, not even the snacks (okay, maybe the snacks a little). But it created an open door. And isn't that what Jesus is always about: opening doors, setting tables, welcoming people right where they are?

One of my favorite parts of this whole experience was watching people in our church community **step up and bring their gifts** to the table. From trivia planners and popcorn poppers to the amazing Design Team, the music ministry, the hospitality teams during coffee hour and AV tech folks. It really took a whole cast and crew to make this series happen. And honestly? I think we had more laughs and late-night deep talks than during any sermon series I can remember.

A special thank you to Maija, who created the amazing countdown video, to Morgan who created our hilarious trailer video for this series, and edited our Instagram posts. So if anyone ever asks you why we did this, you can tell them:

Because Jesus didn't just hang out in temples, he met people on roads, in homes, at dinner tables... and if there had been movie theaters in Galilee, I'm pretty sure He'd have been there too.

So stay tuned, we may just have to bring this one back for a sequel.

When God Goes to the Movies was a big hit for me. I enjoyed the decor, the costumes and the interaction during the service. I think what I enjoyed the most was how the pastor was able to pull the movie theme into biblical passages. It was a very fun way to interact with God's word. **Patti Soov**



Here's how it works:


- ⇒ Bring a **recycled or gently used item** from home that might spark some joy (or at least confusion).

These are the ways we assisted our Cheney neighbors in October 2025

92 households came into Cheney Outreach Center this month

37 day-bus passes were given to assist clients to get to medical appointments and/or work; 7 clients requested gas vouchers for the same purposes

26 households requested and/or received diapers or hygiene products

15 households requested rent assistance

14 households requested utility bill payment assistance
