

Today is National Poinsettia Day, honoring the plant's namesake John Poinsett, the first U.S. ambassador to Mexico and a botanist who began importing the plants to the United States. Legend has it that in the 16th century a poor girl in Mexico collected weeds to put in front of a nativity scene because it's all she could afford. From the pile of yard waste, a poinsettia bloomed. Dr. Seuss' How the Grinch Stole Christmas quickly became a staple of Christmas after its publication in 1957. The Grinch's climactic realization that Christmas, "doesn't come from a store. What if Christmas...perhaps...means a little bit more!," points to the life Jesus came to bring that first Christmas.

Dec 15 Angels


Whether atop a tree or in the songs we sing, angels at Christmas remind us of the original announcement of Jesus' birth and our mission to keep sharing the good news.





"But Christ has rescued us from the curse pronounced by the law. When he was hung on the cross, he took upon himself the curse for our wrongdoing.

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


"And Mary said: 'My soul glorifies the Lord and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has been mindful of the humble state of his servant...


Dec 23 Travel

Lighting a candle in one's window is commonplace at Christmastime.
Originally, lighting a candle in the window was an act of rebellion. Some Christians were forced to go "underground", so they would light candles in their windows to let others know they were Christians and invite them into their homes. Instead, a lamp is placed on a stand, where it gives light to everyone in the house. Do you have a wreath on your door?
Originally, families would make their own wreaths after trimming the trees to its desired shape. The shape of the wreath was also important as the circle symbolized the eternal life Jesus came to bring at Christmas.

Bells have long been associated with Christmas because bells are used to help make announcements. As we end this journey through the "stuff" of Christmas, you can live as a bell by announcing the message of Christmas that Jesus has come.
