
Look around your church. How can you tell people are praising Christ the King?

Circle the ways you see people worshipping.








- Today is called **Christ the King Sunday**.

Look at each of these symbols and color them. Then trace the words.



Reusable Cross

Do you see lots of crosses in worship today? Decorate the cross below. Then, if you have scissors, cut it out. If you don't, fold along the solid lines, carefully lick the edges, then tear.

Today's memory verse is a line from the man on the cross next to Jesus. Read it, then see if you can **remember** it.


During the Sharing of the Peace, tell it to someone you shake hands with. During the sermon, say it in your head. And after worship, tell it to the pastor on your way out.




Then he said, "Jesus, **remember** me when you come into your kingdom." Luke 23:42

Agape

Agape is a Greek word that means a love, a kind of love that is so powerful that you can do nothing more and nothing less to change it.
