

Weekly Discipleship Plan (Week of September 14th)

Shorter Catechism Question:

Q. 21. Who is the redeemer of God's chosen ones?

A. 21. The only redeemer of God's chosen is the Lord Jesus Christ, the eternal Son of God, who became man. He was and continues to be God and man in two distinct natures and one person forever.

Scripture Memory: Exodus 20:1-5 And God spoke all these words, saying, "I am the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery. "You shall have no other gods before me. "You shall not make for yourself a carved image, or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or serve them, for I the LORD your God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers on the children to the third and the fourth generation of those who hate me,

DAILY DEVOTIONS

Day 1

Reading: Exodus 13

Questions: How can we devote our lives to God daily?

What can we learn from the Israelites' trust in God despite uncertainties about their journey?

How can the act of remembering past deliverances strengthen our faith in future challenges?

End with prayer: pray for two unchurched people you know.

Day 2

Reading: Exodus 14

Questions: What role does Moses' obedience play throughout this account?

What does the image of the pillar of cloud and fire convey about God's guidance and protection?

How should we react when we find ourselves questioning God's plans, as the Israelites did?

<u>End with prayer</u>: pray for friends, relatives, and neighbors who don't have saving faith in Jesus.

Day 3

Reading: Exodus 15-16

Questions: How does the Israelites' song of praise expose their view of God?

What can we learn from the divine provision of manna and quails? How does this apply to your life?

How does the principle of Sabbath rest apply in today's fast-paced life?

<u>End with prayer</u>: pray for the Lord to renew your mind with His truth.

Day 4

Reading: Exodus 17

<u>Questions</u>: What can we learn from Moses' reaction to the Israelites' grumbling?

What does the support of Aaron and Hur for Moses symbolize in our Christian journey?

How does this passage challenge your understanding of God's provision, protection, and promise?

End with prayer: pray for the great commission to be fulfilled.

Day 5

Reading: Exodus 18-19

Questions: How does Jethro's advice reflect the wisdom of God?

What does this chapter teach us about the consequences of disobedience to God's commands?

How does the notion of God owning "the whole earth" influence our understanding of stewardship?

<u>End with prayer</u>: pray for God's help and guidance in sharing the gospel with others.

Day 6

Reading: Exodus 20

Questions: How does understanding the Ten Commandments affect your view of God's character?

How did the Israelites react to God's display of power, and what does this reveal about their understanding of God?

Why do you think God associated keeping His commandments with loving Him?

<u>End with prayer</u>: pray for people serving in local, state, and national government.

Day 7

Reading: Exodus 21-22

Questions: How does the "eye for an eye" rule (lex talionis) balance justice with mercy?

Why does God demand respect for leaders and the prohibition of blasphemy?

How do the laws concerning the treatment of foreign residents challenge our attitudes toward

immigrants and refugees today?

<u>End with prayer</u>: pray for God's protection and blessing on our first responders (police, firefighters, doctors, nurses, etc...).
