A Hair on Fire Life or A Life on Fire for God

A "hair on fire life"...that's what my brother-in-law calls it when we run from place to place, or thing to thing, caught up in the busyness of activity without stopping to smell the proverbial roses. That's the kind of life most people live in 21st century America. We live in a world that rewards activity and stuff. We brag about all that we've accomplished, all the things on our calendars, and how little we sleep. We fail to take all our allotted vacation time, and in the process, we fail to take care of ourselves.

Sadly, like a lot of you, this is how I've lived most of my life, until August 2020, when I was forced to slow down. No, I'm not talking about the pandemic, which did, in fact, slow many of us down. I'm talking about a physical injury to my back that literally brought me to my knees. For 17 months, I endured constant pain, had many, too many, doctor and physical therapy appointments, had 15 epidural steroid injections, walked with a cane and sometimes a walker, and ultimately had surgery in January.

This is not a "woe is me" story. This is a story of blessings and gratitude, because through this I learned to slow down and live in the moment. My struggles became a blessing. I nurtured relationships with family, friends, and most importantly, with God. I relied on prayer more than ever, including the prayers offered by my church family. I "allowed" others to help me. Many of you in our congregation prepared meals for my family. When an octogenarian offers to let you borrow his cane, the Wal-Mart greeter offers you her chair, or the receptionist at the nursing home offers you a wheelchair, you humbly accept and say thank you. Yes, all of these things actually happened to me.

And surprisingly, I learned that having a back injury is so much more than pain and struggling to walk. I won't go into the details, but there's a lot more under the surface than meets the eye. You really can't judge a book by its cover. Now when I see someone who is hurting, I wonder what I don't see; what's under the surface that is causing one of God's children to suffer. And, more importantly, how can I help.

Times of suffering, although something we would all rather avoid, are actually opportunities for growth. Paul tells us, "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose." (Romans 8:28) And through my pain and suffering, God allowed me to grow in my faith and in my love of Him, all because I was forced to slow down and to live in the moment.

Living a hair on fire life doesn't allow you to enjoy the beauty all around you, the beauty of God's creation, the abundance of God's provision, or to appreciate relationships and the small moments of life. And yes, I'm embarrassed to say that I've backslid. I, like the rest of you, are a work in progress.

As we head into this season of Advent, I encourage you to slow down and spend time preparing your heart for the birth of our savior. Don't race through these days as though your hair is on fire, buying one more present, going to one more event, baking one more thing, or putting up one more decoration.

Advent is a time of expectation and hope. "Advent" means "arrival" or "coming," and it prompts us to pause each day for 4 weeks and remember why Jesus came at Christmas. Use this time, these weeks of hope, peace, joy, and love, to cultivate a relationship with the One who was born in a manger and died on a cross, all for your sake and mine.

Consider this Advent season a gift, given to you by the One who knows you best; the One who wants nothing more from you other than a relationship. But in order to receive the gift, you must first accept it.

I invite you to put out the everyday fires in your life, and light a fire in your heart for Jesus. May this season be truly transformational to all who would accept this wonderful gift.






At the heart of the West Lawn United Methodist Church is a strong desire to reach out to the community and show God's love by providing food, shelter and support where needed both locally and globally. Did you know that over the past 10 years the people of this faith community have given \$766,125.02 to Reach Reading, Help Haiti, and make a difference in the world? Inspired by Mike Slaughter's book, A Different Kind of Christmas, we introduced this missional opportunity in 2012. Since then, we have fed street children in Port-au-Prince through

UMCOR's hot lunch program, supported various initiatives of Divine Ministries in Haiti (supported locally through TeamOne27), helped to build more than a dozen homes for the people in Pignon, Haiti, and assisted the church in Magambua, Tanzania providing famine relief.

In addition, we have supported evangelism programs aimed at children in Reading & Berks County, played a leading role with the Quad W Missional Intern program, and fed the hungry & clothed those in need through New Journey Community Outreach. We've also funded shelter ministries at Hope Rescue Mission, Opportunity House and City Light Ministries. We support Little Acts of Love by keeping local senior citizens and veterans in their homes through home repairs. We provide vital support for the homeless through Family Promise and Hannah's Hope, minister to local veterans and provide help for pregnant moms through Mercy Ministries. All of this and more has been done in the name of Jesus Christ thanks to your generous giving.

Getting Things Done for God – A Pastoral Perspective on Stephen Ministry by Pastor Lisa Hoopes

MINISTRY around him from morning till evening. When his father-in-law saw all that Moses was doing for the people, he said, "What is this you are doing for the people? Why do you

alone sit as judge, while all these people stand around you from morning till evening?"

Moses answered him, "Because the people come to me to seek God's will. Whenever they have a dispute, it is brought to me, and I decide between the parties and inform them of God's decrees and laws."

Moses' father-in-law replied, "What you are doing is not good. You and these people who come to you will only wear yourselves out. The work is too heavy for you; you cannot handle it alone. Listen now to me and I will give you some advice, and may God be with you. You must be the people's representative before God and bring their disputes to him. Teach them the decrees and laws, and show them the way to live and the duties they are to perform. But select capable men from all the people—men who fear God, trustworthy men who hate dishonest gain—and appoint them as officials over thousands, hundreds, fifties and tens. Have them serve as judges for the people at all times, but have them bring every difficult case to you; the simple cases they can decide themselves. That will make your load lighter, because they will share it with you. If you do this and God so commands, you will be able to stand the strain, and all these people will go home satisfied."

Moses listened to his father-in-law and did everything he said. He chose capable men from all Israel and made them leaders of the people, officials over thousands, hundreds, fifties and tens. They served as judges for the people at all times. The difficult cases they brought to Moses, but the simple ones they decided themselves. Then Moses sent his father-in-law on his way, and Jethro returned to his own country. (Exodus 18:13–27)

We in our congregation are a little bit like the Israelites in the desert. Almost 2 decades ago, we began a new venture that challenges the structures we have been so comfortable with in the past. Previously, when things have gone wrong for members, the congregation has always looked to the pastor and maybe a few other leaders to provide the needed guidance, support, and care for those hurting members. The problem with this picture, however, is that caring for the number and needs of hurting people usually requires far more time than the time the pastor and other leaders have available. As a result, people often receive far less care and support than they need. They may feel lonely, neglected; they may think no one really cares.

The pastors who have provided care for hurting members have also seen the inadequacy of this model. A pastor might visit a newly hurting person for a number of weeks, but soon other people need that pastor's attention as well. Although the pastor knows that the person still needs care and attention, there simply aren't enough hours in the day to see to everyone. So as new crises arise that demand the leaders' attention, they turn their care to others, leaving some members still hurting and still in need of care.

Stephen Ministry provides a solution for this problem, just as Jethro offers a solution for Moses' difficulties in trying to do everything himself. By training gifted individuals to help with the caring, Stephen Ministry multiplies the amount of caring that can be accomplished and helps individual care receivers experience the support and concern they need for as long as they need. One person cannot do it alone.

The excerpt from Exodus teaches that religious leaders need to spend their time leading and letting the church members do what God gives them the ability to do. The official religious leaders don't have to do everything, as Jethro says, "for the people" (verse 14). And, as Moses shows, religious leaders can't do everything. No one has all the gifts. God graciously distributes gifts among the entire body of believers.

In the New Testament, in chapter 6 of Acts, the young Christian church has been growing so fast that some members weren't getting the care they needed. The church encounters the normal problems all institutions meet as they expand. They experience a transition, just as Moses in the wilderness learns a new method of administration instead of tearing his hair out with all the legal details.

The apostles find themselves harried by the task of delivering food to the needy. "So the Twelve gathered all the disciples together and said, 'It would not be right for us to neglect the ministry of the word of God in order to wait on tables. Brothers, choose seven men from among you who are known to be full of the Spirit and wisdom. We will turn this responsibility over to them and will give our attention to prayer and the ministry of the word." Do you know what happened? These seven used the different gifts God had equipped them for, and the church grew; in fact, it multiplied. One of those seven known to be full of the Spirit and wisdom was named Stephen. Our Stephen Ministry is named for him, one with the gift to care for others.

Moses had to discover for himself that spreading responsibilities around gets a lot more done and in a much better way. The early church had to discover that to meet the needs of a growing congregation, it needed others to serve in a caring ministry. Our church, in using Stephen Ministry, has discovered the blessings of mobilizing more people for ministry.

Our Stephen Ministers use their gifts from God, and sound biblical and psychological and counseling disciplines, to provide the best care possible for those who are hurting. Our Stephen Ministers are perfect examples of God's grace among us. They are as much a gift from God to our congregation and community as were those capable, honest, God-fearing men that God granted to the Israelites in the wilderness of Sinai, and as much as those seven, including Stephen, full of the Spirit and wisdom, that God gave to the early Christians in Jerusalem.

Informed by Moses and Jethro and Stephen, and following God's Holy Spirit, our Stephen Ministers quietly and confidentially get things done here for God.






