


# Why Take This Course?

Systematic Theology I is the first part of a study in the foundations of Christian Evangelical theology. With particular emphasis on understanding the teaching of Scripture as a whole and in its unity, this course will focus on the doctrines of Scripture, God, man and the person of Christ and the Holy Spirit. Special emphasis will be given to the practical application of these doctrines to the ministry of the Body in contemporary culture. The course will also provide an occasion for students to think deeply on these theological truths, especially of how they relate to their own understanding of God and His creation

### **Textbooks You Need to Purchase**

- 1. Bible Doctrine: 2nd Edition: Essential Teachings of the Christian Faith by Wayne Grudem (Zondervan, 2022). **This textbook will be used again for Part II, Fall 2026.**
- 2. Across the Spectrum: 3rd Edition: Understanding Issues in Christian Theology by Gregory A. Boyd and Paul R. Eddy (Baker, 2022)
- 3. You should also have a good "word-for-word" translation of the Bible, like NASB, ESV or NET.

# **Learning Objectives**

- 1. This course is designed to help you be able to articulate the meaning of key theological terms and concepts.
- 2. You will be able to explain the nature and necessity of Systematic Theology including the significance of theological thinking and interpretation.
- You will be able to develop personal positions on these doctrines within a biblical framework utilizing a proper theological method.
- 4. You will also be able to: define each doctrine with accuracy, provide biblical support for them, and identify deviations or false expressions of key doctrines.
- 5. You will be able communicate biblical answers to key theological questions raised by the church and the culture that pertains to these doctrines.
- 6. You will be able to identify critical and controversial issues in Christian theology.

# **Assignments & Requirements**

**Weekly Scripture Memory Quiz** - 10 points each. Each week, at the end of the textbook reading chapter, there is a passage of Scripture to memorize. You will be asked to write that out on paper in class as a quiz.

**Term Paper** - Students will write a 2,500 - 3,000-word paper on one of the following theological issues found in Boyd, *Across the Spectrum*:

- The Inspiration Debate (Inerrantist or Infallibilist)
- The Genesis Debate (Young Earth or Old Earth)
- The Divine Image Debate (Substantival, Functional or Relational)
- The Hell Debate (Eternal, Annihilation, or Universalist)
- The Christology Debate (Classical or Kenotic view)
- The Women in Ministry Debate (Complementarian or Egalitarian)

All papers must use MLA formatting. See Lead Instructor for more details.

**Mid-term & Final Exams** - There will be two examinations (see the course schedule, pg. 5) based on the main textbook by Grudem and lectures.

**Attendance** is mandatory. After three excused absences, your grade may be adversely affected. A short email to me, describing the nature and extent of the absence, will suffice. Unexcused absences will receive a reduction in grade after the first and subsequent unexcused absences.

**Class participation** - contribute to discussions to earn extra points.

**Reading.** On Google Classroom, report weekly on how much of the reading you completed. 10 points.

Make up quizzes/exams - If you miss a Scripture quiz, you can make it up by coming in :30 minutes early before the next class to take it. Missing a midterm or final exam is not optional unless you have an emergency or are sick. In that case, it is your responsibility to contact the lead instructor to schedule a make up time within one week of the previous exam.

All unexcused late work will receive a reduction in points per each day late.

### **Course Expectations & Costs**

#### **EXTENSIONS**

There will be **no extensions** in this class except for extenuating family emergencies or medical reasons. "Incompletes" occur when class work is not completed during the semester. An incomplete will automatically become an "F" 30-days after the semester ends.

#### **ACADEMIC INTEGRITY**

Academic dishonesty constitutes a serious violation of scholarship standards at CLCM and can result in denial of credit and possible dismissal from school. Academic dishonesty includes cheating on assignments or exams, plagiarism, fabrication of research, the facilitation of academic dishonesty, and depriving others of research materials.

#### **CREDIT**

The current cost for 3 credits is \$400. At least half of tuition is due the first class (or before), and the final half before the 4th class. Other arrangements may be made if done with prior approval.

Students who pay in full at or before the first class will receive a \$25 discount. Students who register and pay in full at least 2 weeks before the first class will receive an additional \$25 discount.

Successful completion of this course will result in 3 credits towards an Associate of Arts degree in Christian Studies from Christian Life College, Mt. Prospect, Illinois.

#### **AUDIT**

This course may be audited for a lecture fee of \$170. Students who pay in full at or before the first class will receive a \$25 discount. Students who register and pay in full at least 2 weeks before the first class will receive a \$50 discount. Audit students have no reading, paper, or exam requirements, but are urged to keep up with the reading and lecture schedule to get the maximum benefit of the course.

All fees must be paid in full by the 4th week of the semester.

CLCM grads can also audit for only \$50 per course.

**Observation**: We allow a <u>one-time</u> (no-fee) observation of up to three classes to determine if you want to sign up for a future course.

**Application Fee** - for 1st time applicants.

"Registration and Application fee" of \$25 which must accompany the application of new students for credit or audit.
