Christmas Offering Letter 2025



Dear Church Family,

One of the greatest joys of our church is that God has placed us here—right in the heart of Fremont and the Tri-Cities—to help our community and our world **SEE Jesus**. That vision shapes everything we do: **Sharing** life by helping people follow Jesus, **Equipping** disciples to be changed by Jesus, and **Engaging** community to join Him on His mission. This is where we are going as a church on mission with Jesus.

God has entrusted us with an incredible facility that allows ministry to flourish every day of the week. Beyond our Sunday services, our campus is alive with discipleship and mission:

- **Life Groups** where people take next steps in following Jesus
- **Bible studies** that deepen our faith
- Free Dining, which serves ≈ 15,000 meals every year to hungry and unhoused neighbors
- **English tutoring** every Monday and Wednesday, opening doors for relationships and transformation
- And many other ministries that shine the light of Christ in practical and powerful ways

Our building is more than walls and rooms—it is a ministry tool that God uses to bless people, families, and our broader community. And because our facility is aging, we have a long list of projects that need attention so the ministry can continue to grow for decades to come.

After prayerful discussion, our Elders have approved the launch of a **Capital Campaign to raise \$1,000,000** to meet these needs. This campaign is not about buildings for their own sake—it is about strengthening our ability to help people SEE Jesus for years to come. We are building for tomorrow.

Our First Project: Repairing or Replacing the Gym Floor

Our first major project will be **repairing or replacing the gym floor**, a space used for outreach, youth ministry, community gatherings, recreation, and countless events that bring people through our doors. The cost for this project ranges from **\$37,000 to \$130,000**, depending on the final scope.

DiscipleShift and Why Life Groups Are Essential

Last spring in 2024, our Elders along with other leaders went through the book DiscipleShift: Five Steps That Help Your Church To Make Disciples Who Make Disciples. We went through this book because we were convicted that we needed to make some shifts in the life of our church to become a church that fulfilled the mission given to us as a church by Jesus in Matthew 28:19–20: "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

This is the mission of every church, but it is incredibly easy to stray away from this mission and to become focused on distractions. Going through the book DiscipleShift challenged us to think about what we were focusing on as a church, and we talked a lot about how to become a discipleship-focused church. One of the biggest takeaways from this was that we needed to build our church strategy and focus around life groups. This ministry was modeled to us by Jesus - most of his time was not spent speaking to crowds, but with intentional discipleship with his close followers, especially the 12 disciples. Life Groups are a modern model of how Jesus lived out His ministry. Jim Putnam, author of DiscipleShift says this about small groups (AKA life groups): "If there had to be a choice, I would prefer our people attending their small group instead of weekend worship (Sunday service)."

On Sundays, you can come to church, worship, hear Scripture preached, and spend some time chatting on the patio. But it is also easy to come and go on Sunday without making deeper relational connections that lead to discipleship relationships and spiritual growth. It is easy to keep things at a surface level on Sunday mornings, if you want to. But life groups are where we take following Jesus to the next level - through regular rhythms of relationship and spiritual practices designed to deepen our relationship with Jesus. Life groups are where transformation, spiritual growth, accountability, and multiplication can happen.

We just finished an 8 week dive into prayer in life groups that included weekly prayer challenges designed to help all life group members experience God in new ways. We are also striving to make our life groups more missional by initiating opportunities to serve face-to-face with and reach our neighbors outside these church walls with the good news of Jesus. By doing all of this, life groups are how we as a church family SEE Jesus together by sharing life, equipping disciples, and engaging community

If there is one thing I want you to take away from this article it is this: If you are not in a life group, you are missing out! God is doing a new thing in the life of our church - and life groups are where we practice following Jesus together. I challenge you to take a bold step of faith and sign up for a life group today. Session Update (November)

Prior to the meeting, the Elders spent 20 minutes in prayer – both individually and in small groups – lifting up CPC and its ongoing mission. This time of focused intercession set a spiritually grounded tone for the gathering.

During the first hour, Pastor Sam facilitated a dynamic exercise in Leadership Development. His session emphasized that leadership is a vital component in cultivating a disciple-making culture. By strengthening leadership skills, CPC continues to equip its community to live out the Great Commission with clarity, conviction, and purpose.

The consent agenda was approved which included minutes of the October Session meeting, October 26 Congregational Meeting, as well as reports by the Clerk, Treasurer, Deacons, and Ministry.

The church has received a \$10,000 anonymous gift from a person who does not attend CPC. It is worth noting that our Engaging Community sometimes returns to us in unexpected ways. Evie Knottnerus gave an update on the status of "The Journey" which is experiencing good growth. The Journey offers a fellowship opportunity for young people, and provides Christian fellowship for marrieds, dating couples and singles.

Al Trimble presented the month-by-month details of the 2025-2026 budget. This discussion understandably led to questions about the various options regarding the repair-replace of the gymnasium floor. Options are difficult as we are not aware of the extent to which there is still water present under the flooring. Solutions range from patching, total replacement, or replacement with other than wood. Investigations of options are continuing.

A decision was made that there will be a traditional Christmas offering. Options of a giving target were varied, but there are many examples in the church of deferred maintenance that need to be addressed. Introductory discussions were held on Denominational Ordination Standards as well as Governance Policies and Procedures Manual. Considerable written documentation was available for preparation and will be included in the December meeting agenda for discussion.

The meeting was closed in prayer.

Men's Breakfast Recap

On November 22nd approximately 40 men attended the Men's Breakfast to enjoy fellowship, and good food in the Free Dining Room. CPC's Volunteer Director of Discipleship, Tony Perez, spoke about what it means to have relationships centered on iron-sharpens-iron discipleship as brothers in Christ. Clips from the movie "The Forge" were shown that highlighted the importance and impact of brotherly relationships to help us in our walk with the Lord. The men took time around tables to share what was going on in our lives, how God was at work, and how we could pray for one another.

Special thanks to Larry Hsu, Matthew Jue, and Tony Perez for their hard work and leadership in making this event happen, and to all the other men who volunteered and showed up early to help set up for the event.



Ministry Partner - Dennis and Linda Beck

Since 2015, after returning from our overseas assignment in Eastern Europe, we started working on campuses with University Professors in a ministry of Cru called Faculty Commons. Currently, living in Ohio, we oversee the Faculty Commons regionally in the Midwest.

Professors are highly influential in the lives of the next generation, but often, Christian faculty do not know how they can be open about their faith on campus. We help them see their calling to be salt and light where God has sent them and give them a vision for the world. We also reach out to non-believing faculty to share the gospel and teach faculty how to share their faith in their setting.

Going to the world means bringing faculty overseas to minister, using their platform as professors to open doors and share the gospel. Last year we brought faculty to Italy and to Poland. The faculty were able to speak to students there using their field of expertise as respected professors but also tying in their personal testimony of faith in God.

During the academic year, faculty from various campuses partner with the Cru student ministry for outreach. At one university, invited by the Cru student movement, faculty spoke to students on "What I don't Say in the Classroom". In this way, students could hear respected professors talk about their faith in Jesus in a public way, opening the door to further spiritual conversations.

Our passion continues to be in winning, building, and sending Christ-centered laborers into the world. We can't do it alone. Our hearts are filled with thanks that you are a part of our team, and with God's help, we can together believe God to reach the whole campus for Christ. The whole campus to the whole world!

Investment Committee Annual Report

The Investment Committee's purpose is to preserve and grow if possible the liquid assets of the Church in various targeted and general funds currently held in nationally recognized financial institutions.

Highlights for the 2024-2025 fiscal year, include:

- Year to date, (Jan 1 to Sept 30), the DJIA performed at 9%, S&P500 13% and Nasdaq 17%
- Our core accounts, all but Reserve which grows cash until it is needed in our checking account, performed between 11% and 13%. So our conservative portfolio weathered the storm of inflation and recession so far by matching the indices. Pure NASDAQ investments are too volatile for our portfolio so we mostly track the Dow and S&P.
- On average 40% of our investments are in bond related funds earning 3 to 7% interest, so only 60% of our assets track the indices. Our growth was better than the stock indices due to donations into the Building Maintenance, Deacon, and Mission funds.
- Annual draws were made on the Yang Scholarship Accounts to fund the target mission of those accounts, scholarships for our students in college.
- The White Church account continued to fund cemetery and Townhome maintenance.
- The Building Maintenance Trust continues to stand ready to help with one time expenses for our
 property not covered by the yearly budget. BMT will likely become depleted this coming fiscal year as
 we finish paying for the Center (gym) roof and HVAC units. Your targeted giving could help restore
 the fund that has been in existence for forty-five years to help fund the next maintenance project
 above and beyond the scope of the annual budget.
- Pastor Housing, Missions, Deacons and Endowment accounts also stand ready to help during times of shortfall or extra need per the focus and guidelines of the original gifts.

The Investment Committee members thank God for providing this financial buffer and the congregation for the trust placed in us as we continue to serve in this role.

- **Tree Trimming Project:** In June, volunteers led by Mike and Zach Schmit trimmed trees hanging over the Club Room roof, preventing potential damage and improving the longevity of the roof. Their hands-on care reflects faithful stewardship of God's buildings.
- Campus Clean-Up Day: In September, Scouts, BSF, and other ministry partners joined forces to refresh and beautify our campus, exemplifying our heart to Share Life in service.

We are truly grateful to Tammy Sawyer for her faithful leadership of the Buildings & Grounds Team. This year also brought deep sadness with the passing of our beloved custodian, Scott Sawyer. His faithful service and joyful spirit will forever inspire us. We are profoundly thankful for the steady support of Jim Burke, William Jennings, and our summer temporary employees Alec Sanchez, Caleb Emmett, Fahim Rahimi, Evan Dickerson and Zach Schmit, along with numerous volunteers who have faithfully carried on this vital ministry of care and upkeep of the church campus. In an effort to cut down on expenses, we have hired a professional cleaning company and landscape company instead of hiring a second custodian.

Through every project, we've seen God's faithfulness—working through dedicated volunteers and staff to build not just facilities, but a community that reflects His love and care.

Scam Prevention

Most things progress. Cities, transportation, and especially technology. Criminals use technology to swindle money from individuals, groups and governments. Criminals also are always on the cutting edge of advancements to trick people out of their hard-earned money, This has been the case with early deceptive look alike website names, that redirect customers to fake websites, to modern "hello mom" calling scams. The latest technology is Artificial Intelligence ("AI"). Al programs, like Chat GPT, are the latest tool where criminals can exploit new technology for fraud. Al is being used to copy voices and can be used for "Deep fakes" where the program not only learns the syntax but voice patterns of people to replicate a person's speech.

The fear is if a scammer were to take public video of someone, like Pastor Sam, they could craft a "Deep fake" Al voice of that person for nefarious uses. The thing to remember is not to fear progress. All scams work on the same principles: you receive an unannounced call, text, or email asking for something (usually cash or gift cards) in a very rushed manner that is out of character of the person asking.

For example, if you were to receive a call or email from "Pastor Sam", or your "local banker", out of the blue, where the caller, who sounds like someone you know, is asking for money or gift cards for an emergency and is pressuring you to do it right now.

If this happens, follow the common-sense rules:

- Slow down
- Don't divulge any personal banking or password information
- Hang up and call the person or institution who is reaching out to you. Use the phone number you have for them, not one provided by that contact
- Confirm with a family member or church staff if this is a legitimate call or request



There have been no known attempts to use AI to spoof any of our church members or staff, though it could happen in the future. There have been past fake emails, using Pastor Sam's good name to solicit funds, but remember, Pastor Sam will never contact you for gift cards or cash donations personally.
