Over the past year, Grace has been through so much. We have formally separated from the United Methodist Church and created a new identity with a new future now held in the Global Methodist Church. This word is a promise for us as well. God has given us a new future filled with hope and vitality on a new path in the Global Methodist Church.

Amazing Grace

Theology Matters: by Rev. Matt Sichel

This month's issue of Theology Matters brings us to the third article in the Apostle's Creed. This article begins the Creed's coverage of Jesus Christ, which could be argued as the most important part of the whole. It is my prayer that as we work through the Creed together, all of us can begin to create a framework in our minds of what we truly confess as Christians. People tend not to like the details of theology, because they can be confusing or overwhelming. I hope that this series in Amazing Grace will provide clarity for you as the subjects become more manageable in your minds.

In Romans 12:2, Paul instructs: "Do not conform to the pattern of this world but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will." Thinking deeply about what our faith means, how the pieces work together, and how we can apply them to our lives is an important part of spiritual growth. I encourage everyone to consider the things we believe and allow them to change how we live. This is what spiritual transformation is all about.

<u>Article 1</u>: "I believe in . . . Jesus Christ, his only begotten Son, our Lord;"

There is no Christianity if Jesus of Nazareth was simply an itinerant rabbi from the Ancient Near East. If Jesus was simply a man, then you can rank him with all the other great teachers of the ages, but there would be nothing more than moralistic teachings about the Jewish God. This statement in the Apostles' Creed forces the conversation forward into a different spot. It makes the faith that we profess something revolutionary, because it's a confession that Jesus of Nazareth is God.

This article is a distinct echo of the conversation that Jesus has with his Apostles in Cæsarea Philippi (Matthew 16:13-20). Jesus brings them to a place that is the center of pagan Roman worship in occupied Palestine, and he asks a very important question:

"But what about you?" he asked. "Who do you say I am?"

It is in response to this question that Simon makes his famous declaration of faith, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." When we confess the Apostles' Creed, we make the same declaration of faith that Simon Peter did in this story, and we become like him in Jesus' renaming him as Peter (in the Greek, Petros, Π étpos), which means Rock. On the rock of this faith, Jesus builds his church.

But what does this all mean? It is helpful to consider all the important words in the line of the creed. "Jesus" is followed by modifying words which clarify what we're saying. We'll look at each of the modifiers and see what they tell us about our faith.

"Christ"

No, this is not Jesus' last name. It is an adjective to describe him, a title. The word "Christ," comes from the Greek word, Christos, Χρίστος which means "anointed one." This word is the Greek version of the word Messiah (in Hebrew Meshiach, .(תַּישִׁיחַ) This title makes a specific claim about who Jesus is and links him directly to the Old Testament visions of the Messiah, who brings redemption to Israel and the entire world. This title helps us to connect Old and New Testaments together in our understanding of how God brings salvation to everyone, both Jew and Gentile. To claim Jesus is the Christ, is to link your faith with everything that came before Jesus and the promises that God made to Israel, and through Israel to the whole world.

"Only Begotten Son"

This phrase should bring into our minds the famous verse, John 3:16: "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." However, it is also a reference to Psalm 2:7. There, David writes specifically of the Messiah, "I will surely tell of the decree of the Lord: He said to Me, 'You are My Son, Today I have begotten You.'" So, the idea of the begotten son is related to Jesus' status as the Messiah, the Christ. But beyond these Biblical things, the words have importance to understanding more of who Jesus is.

There was serious disagreement in the very early church about Jesus' relationship to God. The word "Trinity," is not in the Bible, and the church struggled to come up with the correct language to explain how Jesus and "his Father" could be related together, as well as how Jesus' divinity and humanity were related to one another.

Some people claimed that Jesus was not actually eternal at all, but simply the first and most perfect human being that God ever created. This is a heresy known as Arianism, named after the early church teacher Arius (AD 256-336). This heresy continues to this day in the teachings of the Jehovah's Witnesses and the Latter Day Saints (Mormons). This statement, that Jesus is the "only begotten Son" of the Father, means that we recognize that Jesus is eternal and has always existed as the "Word" which comes directly out of God the Father, distinct, but completely and utterly of the same "divine stuff" as the Father (John 1:1-18).

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"our Lord"

To say Jesus is Lord is to say that Cæsar is not. This is a political statement (as much as it is another way of saying that Jesus is God). To call Jesus "Lord," means that we recognize that we are no longer primarily citizens of any earthly kingdom or nation. It is to echo Paul's statement in Phillipians 3:20, "But our citizenship is in heaven. And we eagerly await a Savior from there, the Lord Jesus Christ."

This is an important distinction for Christians to make in a world that is increasingly no longer connected to Christianity and the church. This means that we recognize a higher authority in our lives, and we live to bring a new Kingdom to bear on the world. Our lives should reflect the fact that we live for a different Lord and his Kingdom. When we pray, "thy Kingdom come," it is another way of pledging allegiance to our Lord, Jesus, who is the King of heaven and earth. This is what we declare when we say, "Jesus is Lord."

What does it mean to you when you say, "Jesus Christ is Lord, the only begotten Son of God."? I hope that this month's piece will help put more meaning to those words as we confess the statement together in worship. Perhaps it can be a moment for you, one where you imagine yourself in Cæsarea Phillipi, in the sandals of Simon Peter and the other Apostles. When Jesus looks at you and asks, "Who do you say that I am?", what will you answer? I hope this now gives us all the confidence to speak out boldy, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God."
