

The COMMA Method

- 1. Write the date and the passage you are studying at the top of the page.
- Take a moment to pray. Ask God to speak clearly to you through his Word.
- Read the entire passage at least twice. It helps to read a few translations.
- 4. Work through each of the five sections of COMMA. See back cover for sample questions.
 - C Context is taking note of what comes before and after the selected passage.
 - **O** Observation is looking for the big picture and then zooming in to get the details.
 - **M** Meaning is understanding what the author intended to say to the original audience.
 - **M** Main Idea is finding the center of the circle, the bull's eye. What is God saying?
 - A Application is responding to God's Word with repentance, faith, and obedience.
- 5. Spend a few minutes in silence, meditating on what God has said to you in the Scripture.

Context

- · What was written right before this and right after this?
- · What sort of writing is this (history, law, story, poetry, gospel, prophecy)?
- What do you know about the human author?
- · Who was the original audience? What background information would be helpful?
- What has happened so far in the story?
- · Why was it written? What questions are being answered?
- · How does it fit into the larger story of the Bible (i.e., creation, fall, redemption, glory)?

Observation

- · How is the text divided? Look for transition words (i.e., therefore, and, but, thus).
- · Can you outline the passage?
- What is the plot? Where are the high points and low points in the story?
- What is the tone? What is the mood?
- · What people, places, things, and ideas are mentioned?
- Are there any words you need to define or look up?
- · What words or ideas are repeated?
- What jumps out to you? • What are you curious about?

- Meaning
- · What questions do you have about this passage?
- · What is the logical flow of thought?
- What is the author trying to communicate to the original audience?
- · What does this passage teach about God?
- · What does this passage teach about ourselves?
- · What does this passage reveal about Jesus?
- · How does this passage point to the need for God's grace? • What other parts of the Bible shed light on the meaning of this passage?

- Main Idea
- · What is God trying to communicate to us?
- Can you summarize the passage in one sentence?
- Are there any summary statements in the text?
- · If you wrote an essay about this passage, what would the title be? • What would you post on social media about this passage?

- Application
- How does God want you to respond to this Scripture?
- How does this passage challenge (or confirm) your understanding? • How does this passage make you feel? How should it make you feel?
- Did God reveal any sin that you need to turn away from?
- How does your heart attitude need to change?
- · What is something you need to believe? • How do you need to change the way you are living?
