Live by Wisdom Ecclesiastes 9:13-10:20

Three preliminary points about Biblical wisdom:

- 1. God gives wisdom (James 3:13-18).
- 2. Fools despise wisdom (Proverbs 1:7).
- 3. The world's wisdom is often contrary to God's wisdom (1Co 1:18f).

Big Idea: Wisdom comes from God; so, we live by wisdom to reflect Christ.

<sup>13</sup> I also saw <u>under the sun</u> this example of wisdom that greatly impressed me: <sup>14</sup> There was once a small city with only a few people in it. And a powerful king came against it, surrounded it and built huge siege works against it. <sup>15</sup> Now there lived in that city a man poor but wise, and he saved the city by his wisdom. But nobody remembered that poor man. <sup>16</sup> So I said, "<u>Wisdom is better than strength</u>." But the poor man's wisdom is despised, and his words are no longer heeded. <sup>17</sup> The quiet words of the wise are more to be heeded than the shouts of a ruler of fools. <sup>18</sup> <u>Wisdom is better than weapons</u> of war, but one sinner destroys much good.

10 As dead flies give perfume a bad smell, so a little folly outweighs wisdom and honor. <sup>2</sup> The heart of the wise inclines to the right, but the heart of the fool to the left. <sup>3</sup> Even as fools walk along the road, they lack sense and show everyone how stupid they are. <sup>4</sup> If a ruler's anger rises against you, do not leave your post; calmness can lay great offenses to rest. <sup>5</sup> There is an evil I have seen under the sun, the sort of error that arises from a ruler: <sup>6</sup> Fools are put in many high positions, while the rich occupy the low ones. <sup>7</sup> I have seen slaves on horseback, while princes go on foot like slaves.

<sup>8</sup> Whoever digs a pit may fall into it; whoever breaks through a wall may be bitten by a snake. <sup>9</sup> Whoever quarries stones may be injured by them; whoever splits logs may be endangered by them. <sup>10</sup> If the ax is dull and its edge unsharpened, more strength is needed, but skill will bring success. <sup>11</sup> If a snake bites before it is charmed, the charmer receives no fee. <sup>12</sup> Words from the mouth of the wise are gracious, but fools are consumed by their own lips. <sup>13</sup> At the beginning their words are folly; at the end they are wicked madness— <sup>14</sup> and <u>fools multiply</u> words. No one knows what is coming—who can tell someone else what will happen after them?

The toil of fools wearies them; they do not know the way to town. <sup>16</sup> Woe to the land whose king was a servant and whose princes feast in the morning. <sup>17</sup> Blessed is the land whose king is of noble birth and whose princes eat at a proper time—for strength and not for drunkenness. <sup>18</sup> Through <u>laziness</u>, the rafters sag; because of <u>idle</u> hands, the house leaks. <sup>19</sup> A feast is made for laughter, wine makes life merry, and money is the answer for everything. <sup>20</sup> Do not revile the king even in your thoughts, or curse the rich in your bedroom, because a bird in the sky may carry your words, and a bird on the wing may report what you say.

Big Idea: Wisdom comes from God; so, we live by wisdom to reflect Christ.

Wise living makes us good witnesses.

- 1. The world doesn't value wisdom (9:13-18).
- 2.A fly ruins the perfume (10:1-4).
- 3. Walk in wisdom (10:5-11).
- 4. Speak with wisdom (10:12-19).

### 1. The world doesn't value wisdom (9:13-18).

<sup>15</sup> But there was found in [the city] a poor, wise man, and he by his wisdom delivered the city. Yet <u>no one</u> remembered that poor man. <sup>16</sup> But I say that wisdom is better than might, though the poor man's wisdom is despised and his words are not heard. <sup>17</sup> The words of the wise heard in quiet are better than the shouting of a ruler among fools. <sup>18</sup> Wisdom is better than weapons of war, but <u>one sinner destroys much good</u>.

Ever notice on Social Media the wise guy has like 10 views but the wise person has millions?

- 1. The world ignores wisdom but often listens to a shouting fool (vv. 16; 17).
- 2. Wisdom is often despised and forgotten (vv. 15; 16).
- 3. Wisdom is better than might (vv. 16; 18).
- 4. One sinner can undo much wisdom (v. 18).

Live according to God's wisdom (Jam 3:17-18).

- i. Value wisdom over strength (v. 16).
- ii. Wisdom accepts obscurity in service (v. 15).
- iii. When the world forgets, God remembers (Heb 6:10; Mt 6).
- iv. Am I pursuing wisdom to glorify God, or receive recognition?

It's not bad to receive recognition. That's not the point. But, it's a matter of heart condition.

# 2. A fly ruins the perfume (10:1-4).

<u>Dead flies make the perfumer's ointment give off a stench</u>; so a little folly outweighs wisdom and honor. <sup>2</sup> A wise man's heart inclines him to the right, but a fool's heart to the left. <sup>3</sup> Even when the fool walks on the road, he lacks sense, and he says to everyone that he is a fool. <sup>4</sup> If the anger of the ruler rises against you, do not leave your place, for <u>calmness will lay great offenses to rest</u>.

## Foolishness ruins us; Wisdom saves us.

### The Fool:

- Destroys their reputation (v. 1).
- Opposes God's truth (v. 2).
- Goes against God's Word (v. 2).
- Can't hide their foolishness (v. 3).

### The Wise One:

- Identifies flies (v. 1).
- Pursues integrity, truth (vv. 2-3).
- Responds calmly (v. 4; Col 3:16).
- Guards their character (v. 3).

#### Fool:

The fool consistently opposes God's truth (v. 2), revealing his bent heart.

Fools go against God's Word (v. 2; Prov 9:1-5; 13-15).

A fool can't keep quiet (v. 3; Prov 17:28).

Fools can't hide themselves; their conduct exposes them to all (v. 3). Folly reveals itself outwardly (10:3). Sin cannot remain hidden; foolishness walks in public.

#### Wisdom:

Wisdom calls us to patience and calmness, even under unjust rulers (v. 4).

Calmness helps problems go away (v. 4; Col 3:16).

Godly living gives us opportunities to share Christ (1Pt 3:14f).

Wisdom brings stability under authority (10:4). Calmness under an angry ruler reflects the Spirit's fruit of peace (Gal 5:22).

Take the fly out in 4 steps from 1 Cor 5.

- i. Mourn/recognize sin (1 Cor 5:1-2).
- ii. Repent/Judge the sin (1 Cor 5:3-5).
- iii. Remove the source; get rid of sin (1 Cor 5:6-7).
- iv. Experience restoration; God forgives (1 Cor 5:8).

## 3. Walk in wisdom (10:5-11).

<sup>5</sup>There is an evil I have seen <u>under the sun</u>, the sort of error that arises from a ruler: <sup>6</sup>Fools are put in many high positions, while the rich occupy the low ones. <sup>7</sup>I have seen <u>slaves on horseback</u>, while princes go on foot like slaves. <sup>8</sup> Whoever digs a pit may fall into it; whoever breaks through a wall may be bitten by a snake. <sup>9</sup> Whoever quarries stones may be injured by them; whoever splits logs may be endangered by them. <sup>10</sup> If the ax is dull and its edge unsharpened, more strength is needed, but <u>skill will bring success</u>. <sup>11</sup> If a snake bites before it is charmed, the charmer receives no fee.

Walk wisely; make good use of the time (Eph 5:15-17).

- i. Seek godly character, not charisma (vv. 5-7).
- ii. When fools rise to power; God remains sovereign (vv. 6-7).
- iii. Be realistic about risks in life and work (vv. 8-9).
- iv. Sharpen your blade, physically & spiritually (v. 10).

# 4. Speak with wisdom (10:12-20).

...even on social media.

<sup>12</sup> <u>Words</u> from the <u>mouth</u> of the wise are gracious, but fools are consumed by their own <u>lips</u>. <sup>13</sup> At the beginning their <u>words</u> are folly; at the end they are wicked madness— <sup>14</sup> and fools multiply <u>words</u>... <sup>19</sup> A feast is made for <u>laughter</u>, wine makes life merry, and money is the answer for everything. <sup>20</sup> Do not <u>revile</u> the king *even in your thoughts*, or <u>curse</u> the rich in your bedroom, because a bird in the sky may carry your <u>words</u>, and a bird on the wing may report <u>what you say</u>.

# Watch what you say, you can't un-say it.

- i. Check your speech, it mirrors your heart (vv. 12-14; Lk 6:45).
- ii. Speak graciously, as a wise one (v. 12).
- iii. Say less. Too many words reveal our foolishness (vv. 13-14).
- iv. Words cause great trouble, even whispered (v. 20; Jam 3:5).
- v. God will bring every secret into judgment (Eccl 12:14).

THINK - True, Helpful, Inspiring, Needed, Kind

In wisdom, "confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved." Rom 10:9 Live wisely so that you would rightly represent the one who gives wisdom.
