Stage - Ages

Stage One: 4 th – 6 th Grade	At this stage, we encourage parents to keep access
	to technology simple. Consider joining the Wait

	For families who decide their child needs a device
	before 8 th grade, Keep It Simple.
	Include: simple phone devices that only allow
	calling and texting; they don't download apps, and
	do not allow sharing of pictures or videos.
	Example: Gizmo watches or Gabb phones
	Rationale: A watch is a smartphone alternative for
	those who want their kids to Wait Until 8th (or even
	longer). They let you talk, message, and track your
	child's location without giving them full access to
	the internet, social media, games, and everything
	else a regular smartphone offers. <u>They're designed</u>
	primarily for kids between the ages of about 8 and
	13, a time when many kids begin going out into the
	world on their own for the first time. They're not as
	easily lost as a phone, and many also come with
	apps and alarms that remind (and encourage) kids to
	do chores or finish tasks.
	Exclude: Smart Phones, Internet Connected Tablets,

	Be Real – Limits photo sharing to one per day –
	should not be given before 7 th grade – Caution! This
	app includes the opportunity for kids to view
	mature and inappropriate content.
	Smart Phones – 8 th Grade and Above
	Internet Browsers with the strictest parental controls
	YouTube Kids – until 9th grade depending on the
	maturity of your child, then cautiously add regular
	YouTube.
	Instagram – <u>Not before 9th Grade</u> – 10 th Grade may
	be better
	Exclude: Snapchat, TickTok, Discord, X
Stage Three: 10 th – 12 th	This stage is a great time to incrementally prepare
Grade	your kids for independent technology use by the
	time they finish high school. How much
Preparing for Independence	technology is given and how much oversight is
with Parental Guidance	exerted, will depend on your child's maturity level
	and your own discernment with God's guidance.
