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Difference Between a Doer and a Hearer

Many people listen to sermons, read devotionals, or regularly attend church. It is essential to keep learning about God and hearing messages from the Bible, but it's what we do after that that matters. James is saying that it's not enough to only hear the Word; we need to be living it out in our daily lives.

The Difference Between a Doer and a Hearer

Being a doer means living out everything you hear. It involves intentionally growing through God's Word. A hearer is the opposite; they only listen and are affected by it, but do nothing. They might live according to worldly values during the week and then come to church on Sunday seeking repentance. After that, they repeat the cycle without ever applying what they're learning. James tells us that "Faith without works is dead," which means you can't have one without the other (James 2:17 NIV). Faith doesn't work without both hearing and doing.

Think about it: If we only listen to God's word without taking action, how are we truly honoring and serving Him? Use your job as an example. Do you just show up and watch others work, or do you actively participate? Your faith works the same way. Don't just hear God's words — live them out. Show those around you the real change that faith can bring.

Living What You Hear

Living out what you hear is not just about following a set of rules; it involves allowing God's Word to take root so deeply in your heart that it transforms your view of the world and influences how you respond to people and circumstances around you.

Being a doer means allowing scripture to shape you into the best person you can be, a true follower of God. It influences your identity and behavior. From personal experience, I know that when we choose to live according to God's will by spending more time with Him and truly letting Him guide every part of our lives, we become the happiest and best version

of ourselves, regardless of what we face.

It is important to remember that living out the word is not a sporadic act; it's an ongoing transformation. It's not just hearing "love your enemies," but embodying someone who no longer sees them as enemies, but as people who need God's love. God never intended for us to admire His word from afar. He meant for it to dwell within us, shaping us each day as we live it out.

Application

So, how do we really live out the word in our daily lives? Start small. Pick one verse that has recently stood out to you and write it down. Carry that verse with you and keep an eye out for how you can live it each day. Just one small action can make a huge difference.

For example, let's say you choose, "32 Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you." Ephesians 4:32 NIV. Ask yourself, who can

I show unexpected kindness to today? Or maybe you pick, "3 Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves," Philippians 2:3 NIV. Look for a chance to put someone else's needs before your own. It doesn't have to be anything significant. One small act of God's Word is better than a hundred moments of only hearing it.
