JUBILEE REFRESHER

Over the past seven weeks, we have explored the heartbeat of Jubilee, God's call to freedom, restoration, and renewal. We began with the sound of the shofar, a sacred declaration of liberty that invited us to return to God's rhythm. From there, we discovered His heart for restoration, confronted the obstacles that keep us from living it out, and learned about the economics of grace, where generosity replaces greed and compassion overrides self-interest. As we share what unfolded, we celebrate the ways generosity opened hearts, restored dignity, and made visible the truth that freedom grows when it is given away.
