ACTION STEP

We've read several Bible verses, heard two messages and discussed. It's time to put the words into action.

This week, take your to-do list and turn it into a prayer of dependence list. Before you do anything on the list, pray first. Then, next to the list, write down how God answered your prayers.

PRAYER

Ask how you can pray for one another this week. Then, close in prayer, mentioning each request and person before the Lord. This prayer of dependence may help you...

Heavenly Father, you alone know my future. Because I am spending far too much time on the "what ifs" that plague me, I choose to lay my burdens down at your feet. I choose to trust that tomorrow is already figured out, because you are the author of every one of my tomorrows. I will take a leap of faith. I will trust you. Even when I can't see what the outcome will be. Because you truly are a good Father. Lord, help me to remember that when my mind spins onto that hamster wheel of worry, you have already figured everything out. You are faithful. You will provide. All that I am called to do is to trust. Help me to carry that out today. I pray this in Jesus' name, amen.

Finish by reciting The Lord's Prayer:

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors.
And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one.
For Yours is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever.
Amen." — Matthew 6:9-13 NIV

- 3. How do you feel about asking God for things? How does it change your perspective knowing that he insists on you asking him for all kinds of things?
- 4. What are you praying for that God has yet to answer? Why do you think God does not always answer your prayers immediately? How have you experienced growth in your life by persevering in prayer?
