Baptism is an outward expression of an inward faith that is performed through full immersion in water.

[Jesus to His disciples] Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, BAPTIZING them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit,

[Interjections in brackets] Matthew 28:19 NKJV

Baptism is a symbol of **Jesus's death** and **burial** (**going under** the *water*) and **His** resurrection (**coming up from** the *water*).

The Bible does not give us a detailed description of how baptism is practiced because it was common knowledge when the Bible was written and did not need to be explained. But we do know...

Now John also was baptizing in Aenon near Salim, because there was much water there. And they came and were baptized. [much water is needed to go fully under the water.]

[Interjections in brackets] John 3:23 NKJV

Baptism is NOT necessary in order to be saved. We wanted to make sure that you would know what baptism is so that no one could ever deceive you about it.

So, if anyone tells you that if you have not been baptized, then you are not saved, that is a LIE.

It truly IS NOT NECESSARY.
When Jesus died on the cross,
a thief was also hung next to Him.

The thief asked Jesus to save him, and Jesus did. The thief died and he was not baptized.

Then he said to Jesus, "Lord, remember me when You come into Your kingdom."

And Jesus said to him, "Assuredly, I say to you, today you will be with Me in Paradise [Heaven]."

[Interjections in brackets] Luke 23:42-43 NKJV

Communion or the Lord's Supper

Is the act of worship that involves **eating bread** [or a small cracker] and **drinking** *wine* which is usually substituted with **grape juice**.

It is typically practiced at least once a month.

The Lord's Supper is one of the **central acts of worship** in the *Christian Church.*

It is **based on the specific command of Jesus to His disciples**on the night on which He was betrayed.

Before we continue with the description of how this is done and why, first let us assure you that it is NOT required in order for you to be saved and if you do not do this, it is OK.

[Interjections in brackets] 1 Corinthians 11:23-26

[the Apostle Paul, in a letter to the newly formed church in Corinth] For I received from the Lord that which I also delivered to you: that the Lord Jesus on the same night in which He was betrayed took bread; and when He had given thanks [to God the Father], He broke it and said, "Take, eat; this is My body which is broken for you; do this in remembrance of Me."

In the same manner **He also took the cup** after supper, saying, "This cup is the **new covenant** in My blood. This do, as often as you drink *it, in* **remembrance of Me**."

For as often as you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death till He comes.

1 Corinthians 11:23-26 NKJV

[see also Matthew 26:26-28, Mark 14:22-25, and Luke 22:14-20]

In doing that, **Jesus established** a practice, which **has been** *continued* **ever since** by *His followers*.

Again, communion is NOT necessary to be saved. Do not let anyone tell you that it must be practiced.

If you are able to follow the instructions, prayerfully and with the necessary supplies, then there is nothing wrong with doing so.

What **you will need** for each person: a **small** piece of bread or **cracker**; and a **sip** of wine or **grape juice**.

Note: Some people like to take a **personal moment to silently confess** and ask forgiveness for any sins they may have committed since the previous time they **confessed their sins to Jesus** before they partake of *the Lord's Supper*.

It is not a Biblical requirement to do that, but it does not hurt either.

Instructions for the person **leading** the **Communion**:

Lead the participants in a prayer (thanking God and asking for His blessing on the group).

If desired, have a **moment** to silently confess anything to **God** or for a **personal prayer**.

Read one of the passages of scripture previously mentioned *up to the point* of eating the bread, eat the bread. **Instruct** everyone that it should be done at the **same time**.

Read the remaining part about *passing* and **drinking** the wine and **instruct** everyone participating to *drink it together*, **drink** the wine *OR* **grape juice**.

Note: a **single cup** was passed around in the early church. **Individual cups** are now used. **Either way** is ok to do.

As you should in all things, *glorify God*. **That is all**. Keep it *Simple*.
