Miracles of the Bible

It is so important to **know that our God is awesome** and in order to
know that you need some examples of
why that is so. It is our hope that you
can draw **strength from knowing**about God's awesome power.

It should be noted that **all of the miracles are of God** regardless of who *performed* them. The only exception to that would be Jesus because He is God the Son.

The Firey Furnace (1 of 3) from Daniel
Chapter 3

Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego were captured by King Nebuchadnezzar and taken to Babylon to work in his court. King Neb had an enormous statue of gold built and commanded that everyone bow down and worship the statue when they heard music.

The king threatened anyone who refused with death by burning in a fiery furnace.

Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, **friends of Daniel** (lion's den miracle), were faithful to God.

They did not want to worship anyone or anything except God. The king was furious when he was told that they had refused his command.

But King Neb gave the three another chance with a final warning, "...if you do not worship, you shall be cast immediately into the midst of a burning fiery furnace. And who is the god who will deliver you from my hands?"

The Firey Furnace (2 of 3)

Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego answered the king, "O Nebuchadnezzar, we have no need to answer you in this matter. If that *is the case,* our God whom we serve IS able to deliver us from the burning fiery furnace, and He will deliver *us from your hand,* O king.

But if not, let it be known to you, O king, that we do not serve your gods, nor will we worship the gold image which you have set up."

7 times hotter and that the furnace be heated bound and thrown into the furnace.

Because the king's command was urgent, and the furnace had been heated extremely hot, the flames of the fire KILLED THE MEN who had bound the three and took them up to throw them in.

Then King Nebuchadnezzar was astonished; and he rose in haste *and* spoke, saying to his counselors, "**Did we** not **cast** three **men bound into** the midst of **the fire**?"

They answered and said to the king, "True, O king."

"Look!" he answered, "I see four men loose, walking in the midst of the fire; and they are not hurt, and the form of the fourth is like the Son of God."

The Firey Furnace (3 of 3)

Then King Neb went near the mouth of the burning fiery furnace and spoke, saying, "Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, servants of the **Most High God**, come out, and come here." Then Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego came from the midst of the fire.

And everyone saw them and saw that **the fire had no power on them** — the **hair** of their **head**was not singed nor were their **garments** affected,
and the **smell** of **fire was not on them**.

The fourth man in the fire was God the Son, Jesus Christ. This miracle happened in the Old Testament, before Jesus was born to a virgin.

Jesus appeared many times in Old Testament events in His 'pre-incarnate' form. We are not told what that actually looked like except that it was in the form of a man and is referred to as the Angel of the LORD.

It is beautiful to **know that Jesus** is **in control** of everything including **ALL** of the **elements of earth**. After all, He created them.

There is nothing that you could ever face that Jesus cannot overcome.

This is *not* a *miracle*, **but it shows us** a **picture of God's love**. (part 1 of 3)

Luke 15:11-32 The Parable of the Lost Son (*OR* The *Prodigal* Son) (*Paraphrased*)

Jesus tells His disciples the story of a man who had two sons. The younger son asked his father for his portion of the inheritance. The father agreed and divided up his livelihood and gave the younger son his part.

After a few days, the younger son gathered everything he had and left home. He went to a faraway land and basically **partied** and **wasted EVERYTHING that his father had given** him.

And after all of his **money** was **spent**, there was a **famine** in that place and the younger son had **nothing**.

He was so desperate that he took the MOST disgusting job — feeding pigs — and was paid so little that he still could not afford much food and longed to eat what he was feeding the pigs.

The Parable of the **Lost Son** (part 2 of 3)

Not only that, but the **people** around him would **not** give him **anything**.

Finally, the younger son thought about the **servants** his **father** had and how his father **paid** them **enough** to have **plenty** of **food**, but he was **starving** to death.

The younger son then decided that he would **go home** and tell his father what he had done and that **he was sorry**. And because he was no longer worthy of being called his **son**, he would ask his father to **hire him** as a **servant**.

So, the younger son **went home** and as he was walking toward his home — but was still a great distance away — his **father saw him**. His father was so filled with joy that he ran and hugged and kissed his son.

The younger son started **telling** his father all that he planned to tell him and that he was **no longer worthy** of being called his **son**.

The Parable of the **Lost Son** (part **3** of 3)

But his father **stopped him** and called to his servants.

The father ordered that the **best clothes** and **shoes** and even a **ring** be brought for his son and also that a **fatted calf** be killed and cooked so they could **eat** and be **happy**.

The father was **overjoyed** and said all of this because he had thought **his son** was **dead** but instead, he was **alive**.

There is more to the story of the prodigal son; another lesson to be learned about the older brother. And you can read all of it in Luke 15:11-32. But the part that we are emphasizing here is the father's reaction.

The father represents God, and the younger son is **every sinner** who was lost. This is the only place in the Bible that **shows a picture of** God *RUNNING* toward each of us when we turned to Him.
