

LIFE LESSONS FROM THE LADIES: Part Two LESSON 20

Well, ladies, you've made it! I can't believe it's already week 20 and we've reached the end of our road. You have pressed on, laying hold of each and every week! You have fought the good fight and finished the race. You, my friends, have completed a great task and I'm proud of you. I hope you've all learned as much as I have, been challenged as much as I have, and been inspired as much as I have. Each and every life we studied had so much to say to us, both good and bad. I know these studies can be time consuming and difficult, but I know every minute in God's Word is an eternal investment!

Women in the Bible are both prominent and obscure. The Bible mentions women by name, by title, by family relationships (wife, mother, daughter, widow), and sometimes by geographical locations. I also read that women in the Bible are rarely mentioned by name, with named women representing only 5.5 to 8 percent of the total of all named characters, male and female. A few facts about women:

- Sarai is the only woman in the Bible to have her name changed. (Sarai to Sarah)
- Deborah is the only female judge.
- Athaliah is the only woman to rule the kingdom of Judah.
- 700 women became wives of Solomon.
- The daughter of Herodias is never identified by name, but historians believe she was called Salome.

Memory Verse of the Week: "A gracious woman retains honor..." Proverbs 11:16

Second Day

Work on your beautiful verse. How would you define a gracious woman?

Today we're going to do something a little different as well. We've been looking at women in Scripture, but let's take a few minutes and talk about women outside of the Bible. There have been many ladies in history that I think we could call heroes, right? Perhaps they are from years ago, or they may be alive today. You may personally know them or have read about them. In his book Heroes Among Us, Jim Ryan wrote, "The Random House Dictionary defines hero as 'a man or woman of distinguished courage or ability, admired for their brave deeds and noble qualities.' This definition says nothing of material success or athletic ability, but speaks of character qualities such as courage, bravery, and nobleness. Where do these 'noble qualities' come from? Is he born a hero, or are heroes made? I cannot help but think that

one becomes a hero through consistently making small decisions that build one upon the other, fortifying one's character through a lifetime of right choices. It's the little decisions built one upon the other that make the man. When the moment of crisis comes, there is already the fortitude of character that is strong enough to make the right decision even in the midst of the most trying circumstances. Often the basis and the foundation upon which to make the right choices is faith. Faith in God and faith in Christ."

He continues, "Yes, what sets them apart are the decisions they made, decisions to stand firm in the face of tyranny, to give their lives for others, to right the wrongs of social injustices, to slay the dragons of their day. Their lives show us what it is to be good, to be brave, to be guided by conscience and character. They are the stars that guide us in the dark nights, the wind at our backs, whose courage shows us the way in which we should go."
