An addition to the January 18 message

I was reminded that the definition of culture is a group of people with shared values.

The week of January 18th I preached about being careful when using or hearing the phrase, “Christianity should go against the culture.”

In the message I spoke more about traditions than cultures... but I still hold to my statement that we should be careful when using or hearing that phrase.

There is more to my words of caution than I spoke about. The reality is, I have heard people use the labels “Christian” or “un Christian” as weapons against trends that they don’t agree with. I have heard people call the rise in dialogue around LGBTQI rights “a cultural trend” that Christians should go against. I have heard people who side with one political party demonize the other, thinking that the other party is immoral.

Perhaps the source of this topic can be traced to Romans 12:12 - Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God’s will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will.

The reality of living this out can be varied and complicated. Kristen Mongomery writes about her change in perspective around living “counter-culturally” when a woman in a market in Asia pulled a container of dish soap out of her shopping basket. The author was instantly affronted by a difference in cultural priorities, individualism (American) and being good community members (Asian.) Where she wanted the ability to choose for herself what was best for her, the woman was living out her values in making sure the author had what was best for her. The author reminds us that we can take a very self-centered approach to moral truths and it would be better if we took a birds eye view to one another’s actions before getting too upset at them.

Lastly, Arthur C. Brooks, helps us understand that people who disagree with us are not necessarily immoral in his book *Love Our Enemies*.

...there are in fact five innate moral values that exist among humans of all races and cultures, which he calls the “five foundations of morality.” They are: (1) fairness, (2) care for others, (3) respect for authority, (4) loyalty to one’s group, and (5) purity or sanctity. (Later, he added liberty to the list.) Haidt’s research has shown that of these five moral foundations, the first two—fairness and care—are nearly universal. Except for sociopaths, almost everyone—conservative or liberal, young or old, religious or nonreligious—believes in fairness and compassion to others.

What is fair?- This is where we disagree. Brooks identifies two different expressions of fairness. There is redistributive fairness and meritocratic fairness. We all believe in both, just in different proportions. Liberals tend to emphasize redistributive fairness, while conservatives put a greater emphasis on meritocratic fairness.

The differences in expressing compassion also look different between different people. Liberals act out compassion by providing people with basic needs like housing, food and healthcare. Conservatives act out compassion by helping others to help themselves through job training, wage subsidies, and work requirements for welfare.

“The implication of these findings is both critically important and inescapably clear: nearly all of those who disagree with us are not, as we so often think, immoral; they simply express this morality in different ways.”

When we talk, we should use personal experiences that fit the values of compassion and fairness, so that we are all using the same moral values. Instead of calling the “other” immoral, we just have to identify what their morals are, and if we all have similar values but different expressions of those values.

What cultural trends do you think Christians should stay away from? Could those trends be expressions of a value that you actually align with? How do our answers to the above questions help us live more in harmony with one another?

Lenten Services and Activities

Lent is a season of preparation when Christians remember Jesus' sacrifice. It is a time of reflection - a quiet time for listening to God. You are invited to "observe a holy Lent: by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's Holy Word." (*Book of Worship*, p. 322)

We are continuing our study of the Life of Jesus in 100 Days through Lent. In addition, New Song is offering the following during Lent:

Ash Wednesday Service, Wednesday, February 18 at 7 pm with a soup supper before. This is a contemplative service which includes the imposition of ashes.

Palm Sunday, Sunday, March 29 at 10:30 am with a procession of palms, wonderful singing, and remembering Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. We are also reminded of the rest of Holy Week, including the story of Jesus' journey to the cross.

Maundy Thursday, April 2 where we journey to the upper room and remember the meal that Jesus shared with his disciples where the sacrament of communion originates.

Good Friday, April 3 when we remember Jesus' death. This is a quiet service, and will include Taize music.

Animals 4 God



Happy Valentine's Day from **Animals 4 God!** Our pets share their love for us every day in multiple ways, and we at **A4G** and everyone who has a pet, feels that love. They are a true blessing to us.



Our pets have "jobs" and they take their work seriously. Those jobs could simply be to be near us when we are down or their excited greeting when we return home – even if we've only been gone a few minutes.

"Every pet can change a life" (London, C). So, this month I am going to share a story about a 2-year-old Belgian Malinois, named Preciosa, who went from a city shelter dog to service dog. This story is from the January/February 2026 issue of "Best Friends" magazine, that a fellow congregant and animal lover, brought to my attention. (Thank you so much, PH!). Best Friends helps shelters to become "no kill" shelters, and partner with other animal welfare organizations "by working together to save pets who need extra time or care" (London, C).

The Best Friends Team knew Preciosa was highly intelligent, so they "made it a priority to keep her brain engaged" (London, C). Preciosa exhibited signs of high stress while in the shelter. She did not walk well on a leash and when confined for any length of time, she would spin, dig, and jump. They created a specialized training plan for her, and she picked up skills with ease and excelled.

Preciosa is now a service dog for David Herrin. Several years ago, Mr. Herrin was in a severe car accident and had to learn to "walk, talk, (do) everything all over again" (London, C). After his doctors suggested he get a service dog, he adopted Zack, "who brought him back to life" (London, C). This gave Mr. Herrin the desire to train "shelter dogs to become service animals for people in need" (London, C).

Eventually, Mr. Herrin needed a new service dog. He knew that dog would have to be "loyal and intelligent with keen senses and a desire to serve" (London, C).

Mr. Herrin was sent a photo of Preciosa, and it was love at first sight. When he finally met her, the connection was instantaneous. Preciosa "began to tune into everything about David's body" (London, C). Mr. Herrin has "heart issues, so she's learning that rhythm of my heart," he says.

"Preciosa makes everyday life possible for David" (London, C), and she takes her job very seriously. Of course, when she is not wearing her vest, she and Mr. Herrin are able to play, and "her favorite place to visit is Starbucks for a pup cup" (London, C)!

You don't have to own a pet or be a member of New Song to join. You just need to have a desire to serve God by planning and participating in activities which enrich the lives of others by sharing our pets. We also strive to do God's will as He challenges us to care for all the animals of the Earth by hosting educational activities with guest speakers and organizing collection events to donate to area shelters. We meet at the church on the 2nd Tuesday of the month at 5:30 pm. We also host the Reading Program on the 2nd Tuesday at 6:00 pm when school is in session.



Care and Nurture Ministries



Samaritan Support - for Those Experiencing Homelessness or in Need of Help

For those who do not know, we maintain Samaritan Support in the church office here at New Song. We have more and more people every day who come to our door asking if there is anything we can do to help.

We ask, "In what way do you need help?" Then they say where their biggest needs are; whether in food supply, relocation, fuel for their car or prayers for help and comfort. We offer a listening ear and they are met with kindness and support. Along with any of the following kits, we also include a Samaritan Support Envelope that includes a kind, connectional and informational letter from us. We have a Community Help - Quick Reference Trifold of information, an encouraging brochure that talks about why they are not alone in their struggles, and we put a card with a stamped envelope, with a post it note, that asks "Would you like to contact your family?"

We provide a portable meal consisting of the following general items.

- Bumble Bee snack on the run, with either chicken or tuna salad and crackers (Protein)
- Peanut butter crackers, 2 pkgs; or
- Pork & beans with a ring pull tab to open (Protein)
- BelVita biscuits
- Napkins
- 2 bottles of water
- Apple sauce cup & spoon
- Handful of star mints
- (if available) package of hand wipes

We also try to keep in stock a supply of Hygiene Kits:

- Hand towel and wash cloth, bar of soap (soap saver if available)
- Shampoo, toothbrush & toothpaste (check date on toothpaste)
- A pair of socks (or more)

The above is provided in a clear (gallon size) zip lock bag, then all is provided in a handled reusable tote bag.

If there are reusable insulated drink cups with a lid available I include one for easy refills on the go.

If you would like to help collect a few of these items, we would be glad to have any of the above items to replenish our 'in office stock'. Towels & washcloths can be new or gently used.
