# God's Wisdom in Authority for Children

(The Protective Beauty of Authority as God Designed)

Chapter 4: You're In Charge (Shepherding a Child's Heart)1

Main Idea: God designed authority not as a weapon to control, but as a shelter to protect. Parents are called to exercise ambassadorial authority—not their own—so their children learn to joyfully live under God's good rule.

Opening Scriptures: (1) Romans 14:7–9 — We live for the Lord. (2) Ephesians 6:1–4 — Obedience and training in the Lord. (3) Proverbs 13:24 — Loving discipline brings life. (4) Hebrews 12:5–11 — God disciplines us for our good.

#### 1. The Struggle and the Story

"There is no more important heart issue for every child ever born than the issue of authority." — Paul Tripp

**Discussion:** (1) What emotions rise in you as you hear stories of children who reject authority? (2) How do you relate to that struggle in your home?

#### 2. Authority as God's Design

# A. God's Good Design

- God is the source of all authority (Romans 13:1).
- Parents represent God's authority.
- You are an ambassador—not the king.

"As a parent, you have authority because God calls you to be an authority in your child's life... You act at His command." — *Tedd Tripp* 

#### B. Authority Is God's Plan for Flourishing

- Built into creation: family, church, and society (Gen. 1–2).
- Children thrive under wise authority; chaos grows under autonomy.

"Freedom is not found in autonomy; it is found in obedience." — Tedd Tripp (Psalm 119:44–45)

"Parents, be thoroughly determined that your child will obey you even though it may cause you much trouble and cost them not a few tears." — J.C. Ryle

# C. Distortions of Authority

- Two primary distortions of Biblical Authority are:
  - Authoritarianism
  - Permissiveness

"A parent who's always yielding to their child... inverts God's appointed order." — J.C. Ryle

#### 3. The Heart Problem: Self-Rule

- Every child is born a self-appointed little sovereign.
- Resistance to authority = rejection of God's rule.

"It is God who is not being obeyed when you are disobeyed." — Tedd Tripp

"Children cannot learn too soon that this is a world in which we are not intended to rule." — J.C. Ryle Scripture: 2 Corinthians 5:15 — We live for Him who died for us.

#### 4. Exercising Ambassadorial Authority

- Patient Slow to anger (Psalm 103:8)
- **Purposeful** Toward holiness (Heb. 12:10)
- **Protective** Safe boundaries (Psalm 23:4)
- Consistent Faithful, not moody (James 1:17)

## 5. The Practice of Heart-Level Discipline

## A. Fight Early, Fight Small

- "Teach your children that God loves them so much that He gave them parents to be kind authorities." *Tedd Tripp*
- "Obedience is not the enemy of joy—but the path to it." J.C. Ryle

### B. Discipline + Instruction = Heart Work

- Never discipline without biblical instruction.
- Discipline reveals the heart's relationship to God.

"Correction is not displaying your anger... It is reminding them that their sinful behavior offends God." — *Tedd Tripp* 

# C. Consistency Reflects God's Character

- Consistency brings security.
- Inconsistency clouds the picture of God's steady grace.

# 6. The Parent's Heart and Hope

- We resist God's will like our children resist ours.
- God's authority is redemptive—He disciplines in love.

"You have no choice. You must engage your children. You are acting in obedience to God." — *Tedd Tripp* 

"If we love our children, then let obedience be an expectation continually before their eyes." — J.C. Ryle
