SIN THAT LEADS TO DEATH (PT. 4)

In this month's newsletter, we are picking up where we left off in part three. We defined how the Greek word for death is used. This week, we will assess how to understand best John's use of it in 1 John 5:16-17. Is θάνατος a Physical or Spiritual Death?

In the context of John's previous discussion of eternal life in Jesus (1 Jn 5:6-13), it would be awkward and difficult to support an argument for John referring to a sin that leads to physical death. While the wages of sin is death (Rom 6:23), sin results in two deaths.

First, there is the physical death that all people will experience. One day, every person's body will fail and die. Second, all people are spiritually dead apart from Jesus' saving work. In the latter, everyone is born in a state of spiritual death (Eph 2:1; Rom 5:12). It is then right to understand that everyone is born dead spiritually and will experience a physical death in the future.

What, then, is the death John is speaking of in the text of 1 John 5:16-17?

John Stott provides clarity that it cannot mean a physical death, stating, "It can hardly refer to a sin punishable by physical death...the life with which it is contrasted is spiritual or eternal life." Yet, Gary Derickson argues against Stott's position. His focus is that the one committing the sin that leads to death is a believer, and he defends physical death from other

biblical accounts such as Ananias and Sapphira (Acts 5:1-11). He rightly notes that "Ananias and Sapphira lied to the Holy Spirit, and it cost them their lives." Ultimately, his argument hinges on understanding $\zeta \omega \dot{\eta} \nu$ as physical life, which is a problematic argument. John has already used this term in 1 John 5:13, referring to eternal life. Leading to doubt about such a drastic change just a couple of verses later.

Another advocate for physical death is Kenneth Gardoski, who does note the issues with a Derickson approach to the interpretation of death but still comes to the same physical death conclusion. He states, "It does not appear that born-again believers can sin so as to revert to a state of spiritual death. This rules out spiritual death as a possibility for the sinning believer in 1 John 5:16."Yet, this is to understand the context, as it references a brother in Christ who sins unto death, an issue that will be discussed later.

However, Akin speaks strongly against a physical death understanding. He states that it is "contextually appropriate to reject any interpretation that refers to a physical death, since "death" is contrasted with spiritual (or "eternal") life."

The issue of contextual problems with understanding it as a sin that leads to physical death is important.

Because of the contextual relevance of what comes prior to John's statement about a sin that leads to death, the scholar believes understanding the sin that leads to death as a spiritual or eternal death is most helpful.

Since John's usage of θάνατος (death) appears to be about spiritual death, as discussed previously. The question that needs to be addressed is, who then can spiritually die? To answer the question of who can spiritually die, a proper understanding of John's usage of ἀδελφὸν (brother) is needed.

Option one is that this refers to the regenerate congregation. Derickson believes it is the believers in the church that could sin: also, remember he advocates for physical death. His reasoning is tied to the believer's ability to experience sin. He states, "If this were not something they could experience, it would not make sense for John to address it here." Marshall leaves the door open for the identity to be Christians who have apostatized. e doubts it would be unbelievers, stating, "John needed to warn his readers against the possibility of sinning and failing to continue in the truth and in the doctrine of Christ (2:24; 2 Jn. 7-11) suggesting that he did not altogether exclude the possibility that a person might fall away from his faith into apostasy."

SIN THAT LEADS TO DEATH (CONT.)

His interpretation does merit consideration. However, the implication would add considerable weight to the notion that believers can lose their salvation. To firmly embrace such a notion, one would need to wrestle with the concept of eternal security in passages such as John 10:27-29, Romans 8:38-39, and Philippians 1:6, among others, which indicate that those genuinely saved are secure in Christ for eternity. It is for this reason that the apostasy of the genuine believer is unlikely.

The second option as to the identity of those who can spiritually die is the unregenerate, who are both outside and inside the church body. Some scholars, such as Stott, argue that the identity of those who commit the sin is not specified; Stott states, "he whose sin leads to death is neither named nor described." Additionally, there are advocates, such as Colin Kruse, who go so far as to identify a group of unregenerate, false teachers.

He states that "it is very likely that he has the sin of the secessionists in mind. They are people who deny that Jesus is the Christ come in the flesh, and also deny the significance of his atoning death." In the case of Yarbrough, he holds that it is simply those who have "a heart unchanged by God's love in Christ." Akin's understanding of the message of 1 John is that true Christians cannot apostatize.

He argues that "by leaving the faith, they prove that they were never true believers to begin with." Because of the context of the greater work of 1 John, the more convincing because of the argument is that $\theta \dot{\alpha} v \alpha \tau o \zeta$ (death) deals with spiritual death. This perspective avoids the necessity to work around

eternal security; therefore, it is unlikely that genuine Christians are the identity of those committing the sin that leads to death.

Thus, the identity of those who commit the sin that leads to death should be considered unregenerate going forward, which then leads to a need to identify the specific sin that leads to death. In next month's newsletter, we will begin addressing this sin and assessing how best to interpret the sin that leads to death.

I want to share with you an exciting change coming to our Student Ministry. After much prayer, evaluation, and conversations with families, we believe God is leading us to move our Student Worship Gathering from Wednesday nights to Sunday evenings, 5:30–7:30 p.m.

For years, Wednesday nights have been a good place for us to gather, but it has become increasingly difficult for students to attend consistently because of sports, schoolwork, and other activities that fill their weeknights. Rather than competing with these commitments, we see Sunday evening as an opportunity to meet students where they are, providing a dedicated time for worship, teaching, and community without the distractions and conflicts of the school week. This change allows us to be more effective in reaching students with the gospel and helping them grow in their walk with Christ.

Moving forward, Sunday nights will become our primary Student Worship Gathering, a time of worship, teaching, and fellowship. This will free up Wednesday nights for discipleship and community involvement. On Wednesdays, we will focus on studying God's Word in smaller settings, attending, and supporting students at their activities and serving in the life of our church alongside others in various ministries. We believe this rhythm will help students develop deeper relationships both within the church and across our community.

Starting on Wednesday night Sept. 17th we will begin studying the 7 churches in the book of Revelation form 6:15to 7:15 This time slot allows students who are involved in singing Christmas tree and in Children's Ministry an opportunity of serving within our church and not miss a thing. They will still have the time to join in on our study times.

Since January of 2025 we have been averaging 18 in Sunday School. On Sunday Nights we have been averaging 19 and on Wednesday nights our average is 34. These numbers include students and leaders. Our desire is always to be faithful in reaching the next generation and equipping them to follow Jesus. We believe this shift will strengthen both our students and our church family as we seek to live on mission together.

Thank you for praying with us and for supporting the FBC Student Ministry as we step into this new season with great expectation.

We will launch on September 14. Our schedule for the next 3 weeks is as follows: Sept. 3 Braylin will revisit the breakout session from Camp, The Roman Road. Sept 10, Matt Moore will revisit the Core from FCA. On Sept. 14 we will begin a 6-week series on establishing spiritual habits. It is my prayer that parents will be involved on the 14th. How may you ask? We will be sending home a letter with your student on Sept.10. This letter will have some discussion questions that go along with the lessons for the week. You, as parents, can get involved by asking these questions as they share with you what they learn, and with your help, my prayer is that you, the parents will join in with them.
