9:35 a.m. - 11:00 a.m. Live Nativity Animals & Petting Zoo



In June of this year, I had the privilege of traveling to the Yucatan region of Mexico with a small group of Covenant members that included my daughter, Katie Estridge. It was our first mission trip together, and I was thrilled to have this opportunity. I was also grateful to be the "Granny" on this trip, surrounded by fabulous young people

with a heart for mission. Upon our arrival in the town of Yaxche, we moved into the bedrooms of our host families and hung our hammocks. I couldn't help but wonder if I could sleep in that thing, but I hoped so. It was a stark contrast to the city of Charlotte we had left behind, and I felt like we had entered a very different world.

As I explored the area where we would work, gather for devotions, prepare meals, and engage in crafts and athletic activities with the women and children of the town, it was eerily quiet. I felt like I was looking at a paint-by-number canvas with outlines but no color. I wondered if we could bring vibrant colors and emotion to this seemingly blank canvas and if we would be able to successfully connect with the local families and with each other. I should not have worried. Within hours, the canvas of our mission trip sprang to life. We met our host families who welcomed us with pure joy and gratitude despite having given up their homes to accommodate us. The next few days were magical. We worked. We laughed. We sweated. We connected. We felt an incredible bond and affection for one another and our hosts.

Later in the week, we had the opportunity to purchase locally made crafts and gifts that will be sold at this year's Alternative Gift Market. Some of these items include hand painted ceramic crosses, vibrant rattan handbags, and dainty handmade jewelry. Should you be able to snag one of these items at AGM, all the proceeds of your purchase go toward supporting our nonprofit partner in the Yucatan, Friends of Accion. I hope that when you purchase these items, you will experience some of the beauty, joy, and loving kindness we encountered during our time in the Yucatan. So don't miss this year's Alternative Gift Market and the opportunity to purchase Christmas gifts for your loved ones. There will be olive oil from Palestine, vanilla from Mexico, nativities from Kenya, and much, much more.

Thirty facilitators, twenty six listening sessions, dozens of emails and over 160 pages of input notes. These numbers just begin to illustrate the abundance and generosity of spirit that has gone into our envisioning process thus far. Our team is deeply grateful for everyone who has shared their voice as we discern how we can continue to live into our shared vision. We heard stories of expansive welcoming that initially

brought people to Covenant, stories of how faith has been shaped through being in community learning and serving together and stories of experiencing the love of God through each other. We also heard hopes and ideas for ways we can be even more consistent and expansive in living out our aspirations and God's call for us. This input is an incredible gift that will help shape a vibrant and faithful future for Covenant.

In addition to generating valuable input, we observed the Holy Spirit move in many ways among us as we gathered to share our experiences and perspectives. We watched people learn more about each other, deepen relationships and be inspired by each others' stories and ideas.

Our team is now reading and reflecting on the input notes and working toward our charge of preparing a report to share with Session at their January retreat. That report will include recommendations for how to share our findings and next step plans throughout our congregation and staff. Stay tuned!

Safety on Campus

Preparation Can Save Lives

No one wants to plan for a disaster or crisis, but when lives are at stake preparation is our best hope for the positive outcome of a worst-case scenario. In October, Covenant's staff, teachers, and most frequent volunteers gathered in Fellowship Hall to receive Active Survival Training from Charlotte Mecklenburg Police Department's Officer Jonathan Frisk.

During this two-hour class, staff listened to emergency response phone calls and the details of several active-shooting locations such as Sandy Hook, Virginia Tech, and even our own UNCC. Officer Frisk described how these tragic events have influenced the evolution of law enforcement response and how the actions of survivors can help us make life-saving decisions.

Other discussions included what to do (and not do) if encountering an active shooter, basic first aid for injuries, and how to react when law enforcement arrives.

In addition to this class, our Director of Operations, William Lucas, is implementing a phone app to provide an immediate emergency alert to all staff phones with a single press of a button. We pray we'll never need to use these tools but appreciate the care and foresight of crisis preparation.



Get to Know Our Pet Ministry

The Pet Ministry came together as a vision based on faith and passion from two petloving members to address the needs of both our two-legged and four-legged Covenant members. Nancy Williams was already visiting members with her Border Terrier Austin, and Alex McKinnon works in the pet care services industry (with his company

Kinn, Inc.), along with their Terrier Mixes Skye and Erin. Laura Capranica, Covenant's Faith Community Nurse, joined up with Nancy, Alex, and their dogs to found the Pet Ministry.

At that time, no one was providing any organized ministry to help strengthen the bonds between people and pets. Seventy percent of American households have a pet, and eighty percent consider pets as members of the family. Here are Pet Ministry's beliefs in their mission and goals:

WHY: Pets are all about unconditional love. This is why we founded the Pet Ministry.

WHO: We believe that pets are family, who are loving gifts from God for us and our communities.

HOW: Love by design describes how we do what we do.

WHAT: We create experiences that strengthen the relationships and love between pets, people, and God.

Our Blessing of the Animals event in 2022, led by Grace Lindvall, drew many members and dozens of pets. The blessings, along with the fellowship, made it a very special event. Our 2023 Blessing of the Animals was led by Serenity Taylor and Mary Kate Sykes, who blessed over 50 pets, and the camaraderie was again very special.

The Pet Ministry has also been successful in expanding its community impact by hosting pet therapy sessions during exam week at Queens University this and last year. We introduced a new event this fall where a renowned Veterinarian spoke on how to prepare your pet and your family better for their senior years.
