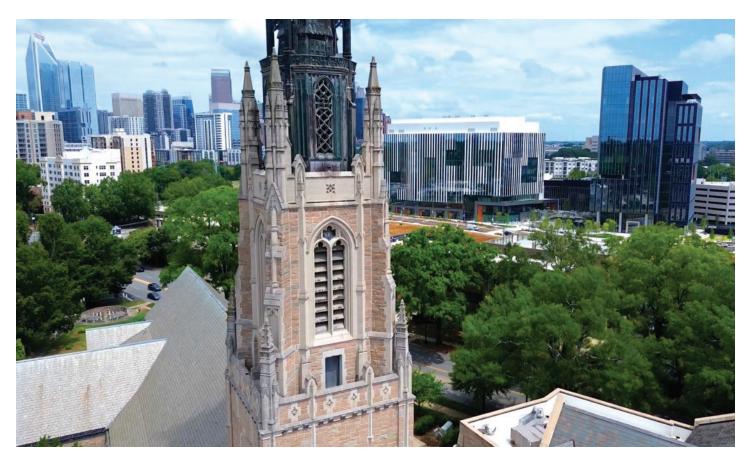

Peter Beinart is a journalist, political commentator, and professor at the Craig Newmark Graduate School of Journalism at CUNY. Author of *Being Jewish After the Destruction of Gaza*, he is a leading voice on American politics, foreign policy, and the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Editor-at-large of *Jewish Currents*, MSNBC commentator, and fellow at the Foundation for Middle East Peace, Beinart is known for his moral clarity, historical insight, and compelling advocacy for equality and shared humanity. September 14: Mitri Raheb

A frequent visitor to Covenant, Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb is the Founder and President of Dar al-Kalima University in Bethlehem, as well as the most widely published Palestinian theologian, author of 50 books translated into thirteen languages. Former Senior Pastor of the Christmas Lutheran Church, he is a social entrepreneur, NGO founder, and member of the Palestinian National and Central Councils. Recipient of global honors including the Olof Palme Prize, his work is featured by major international media, advocating justice, dialogue, and cultural resilience.



September 21: Hadia Mubarak

Dr. Hadia Mubarak is Associate Professor of Religion at Queens University of Charlotte and author of *Rebellious Wives*, *Neglectful Husbands*. A specialist in Qur'anic exegesis, Islamic feminism, and gender reform, she has taught at Guilford, UNC Charlotte, and Davidson, and serves as Scholar-in-Residence at the Muslim Community Center of Charlotte. Mubarak holds a Ph.D. from Georgetown University and was the first woman elected president of the national Muslim Students Association.



Nurturing Your Faith & Spirituality While Parenting

A six-week educational session for parents

As parents, we gain a deeper appreciation for the "seasons of life" as we watch our children grow through each stage of development. Nothing can fully prepare you for how your heart will expand, grow weary, and carry so much along the way. Scripture reminds us:

"Above all else, guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it" (Proverbs 4:23).

Our heart — spiritually and metaphorically — shapes our thoughts, feelings, and actions. Yet cultivating a spiritually healthy heart often requires more mental, emotional, and even calendar space than we feel we have. Knowing we need to protect our heart is one thing; learning to create consistent and sustainable rhythms of spiritual practice is another.

This series will explore practices and rhythms that help you protect and nurture your heart in the midst of your parenting season. As you grow in your own relationship with God, you'll also model spiritual heart-care for your children.

Every week includes a 20-minute presentation, followed by plenty of time for discussion and community-building.

Week 5: Quieting The Societal Noise In Community

Discover how community can help quiet the noise of outside pressures and offer space for grounding and renewal. Together, we'll explore practices of centeredness, shared purpose, and familial values—learning what it means to walk alongside others who are truly with you. Led by Ashlee Anderson.

New Initiative from P&E

Creation Care Task Force

Fall invites us to pause and notice the beauty of God's creation—leaves turning brilliant colors, apples and pears filling the farmer's market, and creatures preparing for the winter ahead. It's also a season to reflect on Covenant's role in caring for that creation. At the request of the Planning and Evaluation Committee, a new Creation Care Task Force was formed this summer to help us do just that.

The group is charged with taking a holistic look at Covenant's call to care for God's world and making recommendations in two key areas:

- Identifying focus areas where Covenant can live more fully into this calling.
- Exploring how Creation Care can be integrated into the church's ongoing life and leadership.

The task force includes Andrew Morrison, Blaine Sanders, Campbell Carter, Erin Hines, Julian Wright, Mary Gaertner, Amy Capitano, and Katherine Kerr.

Members bring both passion and hope to this work. Erin reflected, "When my husband and I first came to Covenant, I was delighted by the Butterfly Highway signs in the parking



lot and the references to the natural world in prayer. It was the first time I had attended a church that included all of Creation in God's redemptive work. The Bible is clear about our responsibility as stewards, and I'm excited to explore how Covenant can deepen this commitment."

The team is currently researching creation care practices and learning from other churches. In September, they will host listening sessions to hear your ideas. October and November will be spent in discernment and data gathering, with recommendations to P&E planned for December.

We invite you to support this work—by sharing your voice, attending a listening session, or holding the task force in prayer.

A Garden of Love in Memory of John Dickson Tomatoes & Testimony

If you've walked by the Covenant vegetable beds lately, you've likely seen a quiet miracle growing—vines full of tomatoes stretching toward the Carolina blue sky. But look closer and you'll see something even more extraordinary: a legacy of love, community, and faithful witness taking root.

John Dickson, a beloved member of our congregation who died last year, was many things—a pilot, a professor, a man of deep intellect and even deeper warmth—but to many at Covenant, he was our tomato whisperer. John's joy in nurturing the garden outside our Education Building wasn't just about produce. It was about presence. He showed up, quietly and faithfully, tending what God gave.

This spring, a group of church members decided to carry that joy forward. Led by Ann Watkins and others, the tomato garden John so carefully cultivated has returned to life—this time as a shared ministry. There's been soil and sweat, laughter and learning, and yes, a little singing to the seedlings (John would approve). As one observer put it, "It makes my heart so happy to see this ministry continuing under loving care."



These tomatoes are not just tomatoes. They are testimony. A sign of the fruit that grows when a life is lived in generous love—and when a community chooses to remember by doing.

So come take a look. Say a prayer. Pick a tomato. And give thanks for John, whose legacy reminds us that resurrection sometimes looks like a garden bed full of hope.



Outdoor Ministry Sowing a New Garden Generation

Thanks to a dedicated team of gardening volunteers, Covenant's Children's Native Garden is gaining momentum and putting down roots! At the heart of every garden is its soil. Beyond light and water, soil is what determines seed germination, root health, and ultimately, fruitful flowering. As garden design team member Terry Loeb reminds us, "It's all about the soil!"

With a good soaking of timely rain, we'll soon re-cover the garden for another solar incubation period, allowing organic material to continue breaking down. This conditioning, stretching into winter and beyond, will enrich the ground and prepare it for future plantings. What we're after is humus—earthy stuff echoing Adam's beginnings—that will nourish an ecosystem designed to flourish.

Covenant has a long-standing partnership with Highland Renaissance Academy, a Title I elementary school serving an inspiring community of students and families. One of the most joyful

and impactful ways we support Highland is through monthly visits with its third-grade classes.

We're looking for volunteers to join us once a month on Tuesdays from 10:45–11:45 a.m. During that hour, you'll be with other Covenant members in the classroom helping children explore a variety of books. There is no preparation required—just a love of stories and a heart for encouraging young readers.

Covenant member Alan Morrow has been part of Read, Roar, Soar for seven years and shares why this simple act matters so deeply to him:



"When Covenant first invited me,

I wondered, 'Why would I do this?' But then I met the children at Highland who have a remarkable innocence and a fresh way of seeing the world — a natural joy and trust. Reading with them helps support their academic growth, but it does so much more. It nurtures creativity, imagination, and a budding sense of right and wrong. Protecting and encouraging that innocence helps them develop into kind and thoughtful adults. What I didn't expect was how much it would change me. Spending time with these children helps me reclaim a piece of that innocence for myself. Their joy is contagious. Their wonder reminds me to slow down and find delight in life's simple pleasures."

A New Layer of Hospitality at Covenant

About a year ago, staff and ushers recognized that Covenant could benefit from an added layer of hospitality on Sunday mornings and Wednesday evenings. With the leadership of William Lucas, Director

of Operations, we launched a new volunteer role: the Usher Coordinator for the Day.

Covenant's large, open campus is a gift, but it can feel overwhelming to visitors and new members. The Usher Coordinator helps by serving as a roaming greeter and guide—answering questions, directing people to worship, classes, childcare, or events, and offering a friendly presence.

Coordinators serve Sundays 8:15 a.m. – 12:15 p.m. or Wednesdays 5:15 – 7:45 p.m. Since the role began in August 2024, six volunteers rotate weekly. Staff are notified in advance of who is serving and can call or text if help is needed. Coordinators also carry a "panic button" feature that alerts staff and ushers in an emergency.

You might see a Coordinator holding an umbrella on a rainy day, helping someone up the stairs, calling the custodian about a spill, or locating a restroom. They also



know where AEDs, fire extinguishers, and emergency resources are located. We're even compiling a list of medically trained members to call if needed.

As one of the Coordinators, I can say it's a meaningful way to connect with people and experience the church in a new way. Interested in joining the rotation? Vaccine Clinics Coming in October

Vaccines are one of the most powerful tools available to protect our health and the health of those around us. With many viral illnesses still a concern, staying current on your vaccines means fewer sick days, fewer hospital visits,

and a healthier community. We are making it easy for you this fall by offering vaccine clinics on Wednesdays at Open Table.

The Influenza (Flu) virus changes every year, which is why it's important to get vaccinated annually. The flu shot reduces the risk of severe illness, especially in children, seniors, and those with weakened immune systems.

COVID-19 continues to evolve. Vaccines have been shown to significantly reduce the risk of severe disease and long COVID. Keeping up with the latest booster is key to maintaining protection. COVID vaccine recommendations are changing – stay tuned for who will be able to receive a booster.

RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Virus) can be especially dangerous for infants, older adults, and people with heart or lung issues. An RSV vaccine is available upon request at our clinic for persons over 65. Ask your doctor if it's right for you.

If you're unsure about your eligibility or specific health conditions, speak to your doctor. Your Primary Care Physician can give you personalized guidance to help you make an informed decision.

The youth were curious and diligent while they addressed a variety of human needs: bundling diaper donations for families unable to afford them, securing produce for the hungry before it became food waste, keeping inventory stocked and ready at thrift stores for those needing clothing, and going full-cycle weed to harvest on a food bank farm.

Where these young people really shined was handing out popsicles and engaging in games like soccer and cornhole on a hot June day in the city park. Sounds simple, right? It was anything but. They — and even more so I — had to discern fear versus discomfort as we fellowshipped with unhoused community members.

Adolescents can be challenging, but they reflected on their interactions at the end of the week with an insight and authenticity I did not expect. Friendships were forged as we shared some giggles, broke out (or didn't) from escape rooms, and slurped down frosty drinks after go cart races during an adventure park finale. It was as much a summer fun and faith-growing journey for me, the "adult-in-charge," as it was for the middle schoolers. I hope my daughter won't mind if I want to tag along again next summer too!

A Daughter's Perspective

On my summer mission trip, I learned so many important life lessons that I will never forget. When my parents signed me up, I assumed we would be helping one organization a day. I soon learned we were doing two—even if

you were tired or hot.

At the diaper bank, they told us that one out of three families can't afford diapers. We packaged them so families could get what they needed without paying the expensive price.

At the food bank, we pulled weeds, planted cucumbers, harvested okra, and packaged onions into five-pound bags. It showed me how important it is to have fresh, healthy food, even if you can't afford it.

This mission trip helped me understand how important life is and reminded me not to take resources for granted.
