





The Joy of Attending Sunday School

An enduring feature of our storied Presbyterian and Reformed tradition is its fidelity to the journey of the mind. As part of Christ's body we have been "thinking the faith" at least since John Calvin's Institutes of the Christian Religion (1536) inscribed its line in the shifting sands of Christian thought.

Nor would we forget other ancestral occupants in our pantheon of Christian thinkers whose gifts, wrapped in life experience, offer insight and wisdom. Enshrined there with Calvin find the apostle Paul, too in company with Roman Catholic Saints Augustine, Aquinas and Hildegard of Bingen. Lately find Karl Barth, Paul Tillich, Hans Kung, Rosemary Radford Ruether, Douglas John Hall present also. Venerable teachers such as these—disciplined in study, prayerful and thoughtful in reflection—have marked a path for inquisitive disciples intent to think the faith to follow.

Covenant Presbyterian disciples (Latin, disciplina, instruction, knowledge; a "disciple" is a "learner") today find solace in good company in Sunday School. (Nothing quite matches "getting schooled", eh?) There, teachers with prepared lessons prompt contemporary thinking and learning. At least one Sunday School class opens weekly with a hymn, keyed by piano accompaniment.

A recent Book of Revelation study stretched imaginations while another lesson viewed biblical stories through art. Our Sunday School classes regularly consist of person-to-person interactions, not PowerPoint presentations. They are a shared, one-hour journey of mind and heart.

"Sunday School" as we know it gained widespread popularity in 19th Century America. However, its popularity has recently waned. Still, the church's, if not our own need for intellectual adventure and clearer thinking remains unabated—Sunday school or not. One might argue that this need is even more acute today, given our contemporary context and condition.



While motivated to participate in Sunday school for multiple reasons, impetus emanates from a prevailing sense of wonder, a commitment to think the faith. Sunday school has proven a viable venue for that practice, if only to stem my own winsome tides of ignorance.

Praying This Journey Stays with Me

Toward the conclusion of our fourday journey, depicting the evolution of slavery and the Civil Rights Movement, I entered the Legacy Museum in Montgomery, Alabama. Our Tour Guides had forewarned us that we would be embarking on an emotional walk through this time

in history, which was remarkedly absent from my private school education in upstate New York. The clear message I heard from the three previous days was that "this is not over."

Amidst the powerful displays of silhouettes, statistics, and documentaries, I began to follow the dedicated pathway that led me through this chronological journey. I started to hear indistinguishable voices and saw to the left and to the right of me, dramatic representations of inhuman "living" quarters all of which included bars, like what you would find suitable for caged animals. I started to focus on a voice, a beautiful voice of a woman singing. I kept walking toward that voice until I found its source. She sang clearly, passionately, and beautifully of her faith in her God and in her Christ. From behind bars.

Across from this image was a bench, placed by the Museum, for visitors to sit and face the singer. I turned, and saw the youngest member of our group, sitting, watching the woman, and sobbing. I froze, uncertain of whether to sit with her and comfort her, offer my hand on hers, or leave her in this very private and personal moment. All I could do was stand motionless, unsure if she would welcome the comfort of a white woman. "Would she want me there" was all I could wonder. Was I any better than the generations before me in her mind. I stayed motionless and immoveable, until the moment (which felt like an hour) had passed and she went on.

It isn't over, but I pray every day that this pilgrimage stays with me and makes me stronger and more brave and never again motionless.







Extended Communion Resumes

In August, Covenant resumed serving extended communion after pausing it because of Covid. Once a quarter, following the celebration of communion at Covenant, teams of two take the bread and cup blessed in worship to share with home bound or hospitalized members who desire to be served.

Ann Ayers recently shared her reflections on this ministry, saying "Live streaming is such a blessing to our members who can't attend worship in person. Yet on communion Sundays, though they can see the elements and hear the words, they miss the sensory experiences of taste and smell and touch. Extended communion invites them into the complete holiness of the sacrament." That sense of holiness can occur in a living room, an activity space in assisted living, or at the bedside in a hospital.

Those who serve extended communion in homes or health care settings frequently find that family members or fellow residents ask to join in the sacrament. As is the case when communion is served at church, all are welcome.

Sherry Ward reflects, "Serving extended communion to our home bound members is one of the BEST things that Covenant does. I am always humbled by the peace that settles over the room as scripture and prayers are spoken. Often I leave the homes feeling that I have been in the presence of a saint – many of these members being those who once led Covenant – making it possible for us to experience such a rich life of worship and service today."



Emily Reinicker is another elder who has faithfully served. She says, "The folks I have visited are so glad not to be forgotten. Many of these members have been pillars of our church; I love to hear the stories of teaching Sunday School and raising families in the church."

For this reason our Director of Operations, William Lucas, has implemented new procedures to secure the safety of everyone on our campus.

To limit access to our schools we have added a special lock to the interior door of the Education Building which can be opened with a staff card or by the Welcome Desk personnel.

Monday through Friday we're requiring anyone who isn't on staff — every member or visitor — to sign in at the Welcome Desk before proceeding to their desired location.

We appreciate your willingness to take these extra steps in the spirit of care and responsibility for those attending our campus during the week.



Celebrating Habitat's Carter Work Project

A host of Covenant members worked alongside Garth Brooks and Trisha Yearwood during Habitat for Humanity's 2023 Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter Work Project. More than 70 members volunteered for at least one nine-hour workday as part of Covenant's team, and many more volunteered with their employers or civic groups.

The Project took place at the Meadows at Plato Price affordable housing development during the week of October 1-6, and made significant progress in the construction of 27 affordable homes.



Covenant members' participation was not limited to driving nails, and extended to nearly every aspect of the Project. Mission and Outreach Chair Tim Kendrick described the breadth of members' involvement: "It's never hard to find a reason to be proud of Covenant Presbyterian but it was especially easy last week

with the Carter Habitat for Humanity Build here in Charlotte. We were incredibly lucky to have Covenant represented with Laura Belcher as the overall leader (what an awesome job she did), Kerr Collins driving overall operations, Jason Graffis and Heather Potter leading the Children's Choir, and Katherine Kerr with her amazing invocation during the opening ceremony. The Covenant volunteers did excellent work and, thanks to Steph Guffin's coordination, had the experience of a lifetime."

Covenant's volunteer efforts at the Carter Work Project complement significant financial investment in the Meadows at Plato Price. Covenant members contributed more than \$350,000 toward the development, which was presented during worship on September 10. This gift makes Covenant one of the largest financial supporters of the project, corporate or nonprofit. The Meadows at Plato Price is named for the Plato Price School, which served a thriving African-American neighborhood until its closure in the 1960s.

Racial Justice Author Speaking in February

I was invited to join a Covenant book club and read *The Color of Compromise* by Jemar Tisby in preparation for his visit to Covenant next February.

I was unaware of Tisby's work. Still, I was enthusiastic about a deeper study of a concept I thought I was familiar with,

having wrestled with issues of privilege and structural racism during the national turmoil that exploded after the murder of George Floyd in 2020.

Tisby's work was densely packed with a perspective that challenged my own. Page after page, he peeled back the onion on America's relationship with racism from our nation's founding, the Civil War, Reconstruction, and into modern issues we face today told through the lens of the American Christian Church's involvement. Tisby cast light into the complicit action and inaction of our heroes in the faith, honored historical institutions, and the Body of Christ.

Tisby shared difficult historical lessons and truths I am still working to wrap my head around. After George Floyd's murder, corporations, communities, and individuals launched efforts to educate and invest in diversity and inclusion. Yet, it feels like momentum has slowed with pressures in the economy and politicizing of the educational efforts. I am learning it is not just a task to be checked off on our to-do lists.

Jesus set the example of loving his neighbor and challenging the status quo throughout his ministry, becoming the ultimate sacrifice through his death and resurrection. He preached the Kingdom of Heaven and illustrated that this mysterious kingdom would appear upside-down from our earthly vantage points. Participants in this Gospel, we are called as individuals and as the Church to join in bringing about this Kingdom of Heaven through the renewal of our minds, our neighborhoods, our workplaces, and our city.

Tisby claims that "Justice takes sides" and leaves us with the bold charge, "What will the Church do?"

Jemar Tisby is the author of the New York Times bestselling book, The Color of Compromise: The Truth about the Church's Complicity in Racism, How to Fight Racism, and How to Fight Racism: Young Reader's Edition. He is also a Professor of History at Simmons College of Kentucky in Louisville. lemar is the co-host of the "Pass the Mic" podcast. His writing has been featured in the Washington Post, The Atlantic, and the New York Times among others. He is a frequent commentator on NPR and CNN's New Day program. He speaks nationwide on the topics of racial justice, U.S. history and Christianity. Jemar earned his PhD in history and he studies race, religion, and social movements in the 20th century.

To prepare for his visit, we'll begin a congregation-wide study of Jemar Tisby's work starting in January 2024.



Finding Common Ground

Descendants of the enslaved and their enslavers build a friendship.

Michael Mines and Ann Morris learned of their connection in 2020, when Ann was researching her family history and discovered Michael's ancestors were enslaved on a plantation in Virginia at the same time Ann's ancestors were the plantation owners. Together with five cousins — two white Morrises and three Black Mines — they forged a tight-knit group that met regularly in person and on Zoom for six months.

The two families met in the summer of 2023, along with 180 of the linked descendants, when they gathered to learn and repair relationships on the Virginia plantation.

Join us in Fellowship Hall on January 7th at 9:30 a.m., when Michael and Ann will be our speakers on Convocation Sunday.

Listen to their story of how Michael's and Ann's ancestral connection has shaped their lives, and join in conversation about the broader implications for racial justice on a national and global scale.
