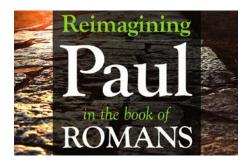
We will be launching new groups on Wednesday evenings starting September 13. Groups are welcoming new members and are made richer by them, we would love for you to join a life group.

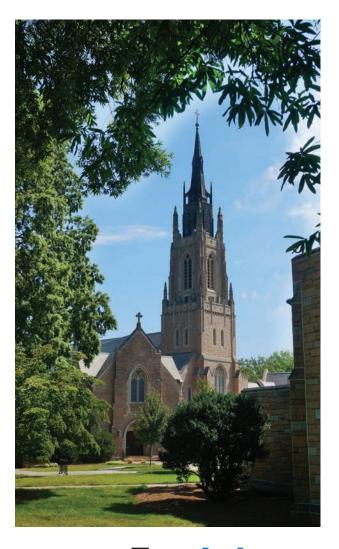
We hope to hear from as many voices as possible across our community of faith, so if you are able, please mark your calendars to attend one of these sessions. This will be a time of meaningful connection.

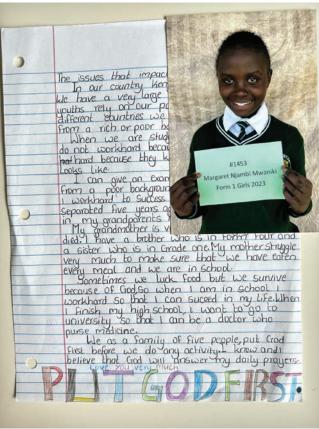

In the impoverished Renguti community, most students do not have the opportunity to pursue an education past the eighth grade. Covenant now partners with Mountain Park Academy, a faith-based secondary boarding school that provides rigorous STEM curriculum as well as trade school programs. We are grateful that Hannah and Margaret and over 60 other students will be attending high school at Mountain Park in the new year.

Now We Can Hear Every Word

Covenant Installs Hearing Loops in Sanctuary & Fellowship Hall

If you've been in our sanctuary or Fellowship Hall over the past few months you've probably seen the signs for our new hearing loop system. For congregants and visitors who use hearing aids, a "hearing loop" (otherwise known as an audio induction loop) can provide extra clarity to the voices of our ministers, choir or teachers — especially for the listeners who are sitting towards the back of the church or classroom. The loop allows your hearing aid to pick up sound from this enhanced system, rather than distracting background noise in the area.

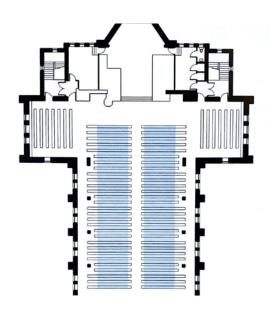
The central seating area of our sanctuary has a special wire installed in the floor underneath a two-inch wide strip of brown vinyl. Anyone sitting inside this section (as seen in blue on our sign outside the sanctuary) can turn their hearing aid to the "T" setting and hear the service more clearly. If you sit outside of the indicated area, the loop won't be available.

Jim Watson, a Covenant member with hearing loss due to heredity and military service, acted as an advisor for our loop installations. Jim says, "Several years ago, my wife Lou and I attended service at a church that had hearing loops. I could hear every word of their sermon — yes, every word! Not long after that, our Session approved hearing loops for Covenant's sanctuary, and recently added hearing loops in the Chancel, as well as Fellowship Hall's event space and classrooms 207 A and B. That has been a tremendous blessing for me and for other church members. Now we can hear every word at Covenant!"

For those who do not have a hearing aid with a telecoil or "T" setting, or those who don't own a hearing device and need one for a class or service, Covenant is offering free hearing devices. Pick up a "Contacta" listening device to hang around your neck and a set of individually bagged earbuds. Please return the listening unit at the end of the service/event/class, but keep the earbuds to reuse the next time.

Also, you can bring your own wired headphones or earbuds to use with the "Contacta" listening units, which accept any headphones or earbuds with a standard headphone plug.
