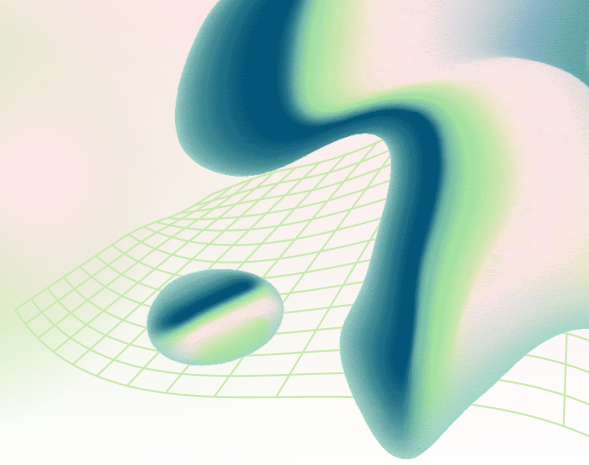


CHILDREN'S EXTRACURRICULAR SPENDING
