"If I had it to do over, I would _____ (fill in the blank)."

Most of us use the phrase more than once in life. We utter it in regard to parenting, work, relationships, health, church, belief systems, and even God. The phrase expresses our longing for a chance to go back in time and correct past mistakes.

The longer we live, the more we accumulate such regrets. Sometimes, they overwhelm us. We feel trapped by the consequences of such past decisions. When this happens, we tend to shy away from making significant decisions, lest we again make a mistake.
