The prophet Jonah refused to obey the Lord, fleeing from God's ______ in an entirely different direction. This act of direct disobedience landed Jonah in some very unusual and difficult life circumstances and ultimately into the belly of Hell (v. 6). It was there that Jonah cried out to God and repented of his sins causing God to bring him back onto dry land and to his mission. It is nearly impossible to return from the Hell inside the earth, but it is possible to return from hell-like circumstances God allows in our lives when we flee Him in rebellion (Ps. 18:5; 116:3; Matt. 23:15). Today we will explore how Jonah returned from Hell!
