

DBS TEACHING GUIDE FOR WATER BAPTISM

Rather than focusing on one passage (like a typical DBS study), we will look at multiple to help gain a deeper understanding of water baptism.

Discuss the passages section by section, allowing space for questions and conversations along the way, <u>and then</u> use the 'deeper context' to help provide context and clarity to the conversation.

DEEPER CONTEXT

I. MODE (METHOD) OF BAPTISM

- Our typical method of baptism is through immersion, which means to be completely submerged
- The Greek word *baptizō* means to "plunge, dip, immerse" something in water
 - This is the word used in every New Testament instance of someone being baptized, which is why this is our method
- Even when the term *baptizō* is not used in scripture, there are other descriptions that infer immersion
 - o "up out of the water"
 - "they both went down into the water...they came up out of the water"

II. MEANING OF BAPTISM

- It is important to understand what the act of baptism is symbolizing
- It primarily symbolizes the death, burial, and resurrection of our Savior
 - This passage from Romans affirms that as you go down into the water, it is a picture of going down into the grave and being buried (with Christ) and as you come up out of the water, it is a picture of being raised with Christ so, "we too might walk in the newness of life."
 - o Side note: if/when someone is sprinkled, they miss out on this incredible symbolism
- Baptism also symbolizes the washing away and cleansing from sin as well (see Acts 22:16; Titus 3:5)
- When you understand what the act of baptism is about, you begin to understand why it is such a
 momentous and celebratory occasion, not only for the one being baptized, but for every follower of
 Jesus who knows them and their story

III. THE NEED FOR BAPTISM

- Even though these verses (and others like 1 Peter 3:21) clearly do not make baptism *optional*, it is equally important to understand baptism is not mandatory in regard to salvation
 - o For instance, when Peter says, "baptism now saves you," he explains what he means
 - o "not the removal of dirt from the flesh," → not as an external, physical act that removes our dirt because that is not what saves us
 - o "but an appeal to God for a good conscience—through the resurrection of Jesus Christ." → what saves us is the internal, spiritual transaction between God and the individual, which is symbolized by the ceremony of baptism
- The Roman Catholic Church believes baptism is essential for salvation and that the act itself causes regeneration (which is a primary reason for the practice of infant baptism)
 - They believe the church bestows saving grace on its people (therefore the lack of faith in infants, or anyone for that matter, is replaced by the faith of the Church
- If baptism, or any other practice (i.e. speaking in tongues, etc) is necessary for experiencing saving grace from God, then salvation would come from faith plus works...which is unbiblical
 - This Catholic view was a primary reason for the Protestant Reformation, when Martin Luther spoke up to teach that salvation relies on faith alone (see Ephesians 2:8-9, Galatians 1:6)
- Although baptism may not be necessary for our salvation, it is absolutely necessary to be obedient to our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ (delayed obedience is still disobedience)
 - Spoiler alert: no one living today can use the thief on the cross as your excuse

IV. WHO AND WHEN SHOULD I BE BAPTIZED?

- It is our belief and practice that baptism is (outward) act of obedience for a follower of Jesus who has already experienced (inward) justification by grace alone, through faith alone
- Although our culture has, in many ways, watered down the practice of baptism, the pattern in the Bible
 is that only the people who give a believable profession of faith in Jesus should be baptized
 - "Believable" → their life has demonstrated reasonable evidence of pursuing and becoming like Jesus
 - This is commonly referred to as "believer's baptism"
- If you believe you have experienced the grace of God, which means something like:
 - You have a profound belief ("pierced to the heart") in the Creator of the universe
 - You have realized your personal sin and rebellion against Him
 - You have repented and confessed your sins to Him
 - And have surrendered your whole being to His Son Jesus Christ (who came to live and die, be buried, and be raised to life again as a sacrifice for your rebellion)
- Then, as exemplified throughout the New Testament, following through with *believer's baptism* should be one of your next steps

Parents

- As a parent who longs for their son or daughter to pursue Jesus, it can be easy for us to expedite the process, which ultimately does not help our children
- Biblically speaking, there is no age requirement for baptism, so here are a few ways you can help:
 - o Be in constant prayer for your kids to personally experience the amazing grace of God
 - Observe any convincing evidence of genuine spiritual life in them, along with some degree of understanding of what it means to trust in Christ
 - Lean on others in your faith community who you can trust to share honest feedback about any spiritual life in your son or daughter
 - Feel free to reach out for more resources, prayer, guidance, etc

Should I be baptized again?

- If you believe you were improperly baptized (i.e. as a baby, before you truly surrendered to Jesus, etc):
 - Spend some time in prayer and in the Word
 - o Ask as many questions as you need to
 - When you are ready, reach out to someone in your Microchurch, one of our elders, and we will be happy to walk you through the process
- If you believe you were properly baptized as a surrendered follower of Jesus (at the time), but have grown spiritually in ways that now lead you to wonder or even believe you need to be baptized again:
 - o Going through the act of obedience again is biblically permissible, but also not necessary
 - o If you are seeking spiritual refreshing or renewal:
 - Meditate on what your baptism meant when it originally occurred
 - Consider confessing of sin and/or repentance (to God or others if need be)
 - Practice the renewing of your mind (Romans 12:2)
 - If you would like to proceed with being baptized again and/or simply have other questions, reach out to one of our elders to help walk you through the process
