# 1 Peter Lesson 9

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## “Living Hope” **1 Peter 4:1-11**

## Day 2 – Read 1 Peter 4:1-11

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Note on 1 Peter 4:6: “This section ends on another one of those ‘Peter, what are you talking about?’ notes when he tells us in verse 6 that the gospel was preached to ‘those who are dead.’ His meaning is really quite simple: he has in mind people who were alive when they heard the gospel but have since died. The basic point of this difficult verse is that God is going to judge everyone, and those who wish to be spared God’s judgment must heed the good news of salvation in Jesus in this lifetime, *before* they die.” (1-2 Peter, Living Hope in a Hard World, Lydia Brownback, p.71)

5) What does Peter mean by “the end of all things is at hand”?
