#### THEME OF THE WEEK: The Lord Has Come Proclaimed by John

John the Baptist came in the wilderness as the voice preparing the way for the Lord. He came to those who sat in darkness and in shadow of death to point them to the One whose light pierces the darkness. John still comes today to an nounce and proclaim that the Lord is near, the Lord is coming! As the season of Advent comes to its climax this week, we rejoice in Him who comes to us in the name of the Lord, we rejoice in the One who was born of a virgin for us, born to save us! His name is Jesus because He has saved His people, saved you from your sin! "Welcome to earth, O noble Guest, Through whom the sinful world

is blest!" (LSB, 358).

### SCRIPTURE: John 1:19-28 The Voice Proclaiming the Christ

John the Baptist knows who he is, but most importantly he knows who he is not. He is not the Christ. He is not the Savior. He is not Elijah. He is not The Prophet (though he is a prophet) and He is not worthy to unite the sandals of the Christ. He is, however, the great confessor, "He confessed, and did not deny, but confessed, "I am not the Christ" (Jn. 1:20). John is not the Christ, but there is a Christ. He is a Christ Who was born for you, a Christ Who lived for you, suffered for you, and rose from the dead for you. He is a Christ who was born to save you. John is the voice proclaiming this Christ, "the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world" (Jn. 1:29). O Lord, thank You for sending John to prepare

the way for the Christ, pointing men to Him. Amen.

### SCRIPTURE: Psalm 5 Let All Who Take Refuge in the Lord Rejoice and Sing for Joy!

The world is full of those who speak lies, reject the truth, rebel against God and delight in wickedness. One day God will destroy and put an end to evil and wickedness once and for all. He will dole out justice and judgment upon all who have rejected Him. By nature we are all liars. We do not speak the truth about God or about ourselves. Before God, we confess with Isaiah, "I am a man of unclean lips" (Isa. 6:5). But the Lord in His great mercy sent His own Son into our flesh, born of a virgin, to be our Savior. He speaks the truth and delights in righteousness. He makes righteous all who take refuge in Him. Rejoice and sing

for joy, "for Christ is born, The babe, the son of Mary!" (LSB, 370). Praise be to Thee, O Lord, for Thy wondrous grace. Amen.

### SCRIPTURE: Philippians 4:4-7 Rejoice, the Lord is Near!

Saint Paul's imperative to rejoice "always" may sound cliché and ring hollow in the depths of tragedy or when the cross is heavy to bear in this "valley of sorrow" which we now live. But even there, even in the depths of living in a broken world as broken people, even in the shadow of darkness and death, the One who is the light of the world shines and no darkness can ever snuff out His light and life (Jn. 1.5). This is why Paul says, "rejoice in the Lord" (v. 4). Rejoice in "the peace of God" for you in Christ Jesus (v. 7). Rejoice for the Lord is near (v. 5)! "The King of kings is drawing near; The Savior of the world is here. Life and salvation He doth bring; Therefore rejoice and gladly sing" (LSB, 341). Help us, O Christ, to rejoice in You always. Amen.



#### SCRIPTURE: Isaiah 40:1-8 Prepare Our Hearts

What does "Prepare the way of the Lord" mean? The Lord isn't talking about earthly topography. He's talking about the topography of your heart. The devil is constantly heaving up your heart into the towering heights of pride and tearing it down into the deepest pits of despair. Pride and despair are the only possible extremes for a sinner who fears, loves, and trusts in idols. John the Baptist preaches another way, a level way. He tears down the idols of your heart by laying bare your sin. He then lifts your heart by promising God's mercy. Upon this heart leveled by Law and Gospel, Christ the King comes to dwell with you.

Prepare our hearts to receive Your mercy heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

#### SCRIPTURF: Luke 1:67-80 The Benedictus

Upon John's birth, Zechariah records for us one of the greatest canticles in the Scriptures. God had indeed visited Zechariah and barren Elizabeth. He gave them a son who would prepare the way for the Lord Himself. God kept His covenant promise to Abraham to save us from our enemies; from sin, death and the devil, from guilt, shame, and despair. The Lord has indeed visited us from on high "to give light to those who sit in the darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace" (v. 79). Praise be to Thee O Lord, for keeping Thy covenant promise to Abraham in Christ Jesus. Amen.

#### SCRIPTURE: Hebrews 12:15-29 God Comes Down to Us in Christ

"You do not come to Him, He comes to you," Luther writes. This is the essence of Advent, the essence of Christianity. The writer to the Hebrews reminds us that we cannot approach the living God in His majesty and holiness. At Mount Sinai, God was off limits and could not be approached without disastrous consequences. But since God has come down to us clothed in Christ's flesh and blood, we now have complete access to Him and His grace. Covered with the blood of Jesus, we can enter into His presence in the Divine Service, surrounded by the whole company of heaven, to receive His gifts of Word and Sacrament.

Thank You, O Lord, for coming down to us in Christ that we might be clothed in His righteousness and holiness. Amen.

#### SCRIPTURE: Psalm 145 Words of Praise

Our God's renown isn't like a fad that's here today and gone tomorrow. It endures forever. David explains, "One generation shall commend your works to another and shall declare your mighty acts." The fathers tell their sons and daughters that God is "gracious and merciful." The pastors proclaim to both young and old that the Lord is "slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love."
