THEME OF THE WEEK: The Reformation of the Church of Christ

"The Reformation" is often considered a period in history that started in 1517 after Luther nailed the 95 Theses to the church door in Wittenberg. But this is more than a day to remember the works and ideas of a mere man. Think about it. Who can reform the church? Men like Luther? God forbid. You know that the Holy Christian Church is a creation of Christ and His Word, not the product of men and their ideas. Thus, the true "Reformation" is Christ's work to set aside human perversions of His saving Gospel. Our joy this week is that Christ used men like Luther to reform His bride from error through the faithful preaching of His Word.

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 11:12-15 "A Kingdom of Peace, and a Kingdom of Violence"

Having been justified by faith, we have peace with God" (Romans 5:1). That is a tremendous comfort. God is not at war with us; He is not even mad at us. All His wrath has been spent on Jesus, and we are the friends of God. This peace and friendship set us at war with the world, the devil, and even our own sinful flesh. The church of God is a church militant. The kingdom of God suffers violence. While we are at war with sin and death, we are at rest with God, at peace. We rejoice in this peace, and from the confidence that it gives we stand against all the assaults of the devil. Lord Jesus, let Your kingdom come to us and ex-

pand. Bring Your enemies into Your peace, and grant them to stand with us as well. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 126 "Brought Back from Captivity"

In 586 BC the Babylonian King Nebuchadnezzar walloped Jerusalem, destroyed the temple, and carried almost all of the people away to Babylon. In 531 BC the Persian King Cyrus issued the decree of return, permitting the exiles to rebuild Jerusalem and the temple. Psalm 126 comes for the joy of that journey home; the joy of God's anger relented, and the city given back to them. The church has taken up this Psalm at the time of the Reformation, rejoicing that the Lord has brought us back to the joy and confidence of His pure Gospel, taught from God's Word. O Lord, our mouths are filled with laughter and our tongue with singing. You have done great things for us. Keep us in the joy and freedom of the forgiveness of all our sins. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Revelation 14:6-7 "What Shall We Do?"

Contrary to popular sentiment, Revelation is one of the most comforting books in the Bible. The timeless message? Christ reigns, Christ wins, and we will reign and win with Him. In Revelation 14:6,7 we see an angel proclaiming an eternal gospel to all people. Reconciled to God in Christ, all the nations of the earth are told to "fear God and give Him glory ... and worship Him Who made [all things]." Let us not live our days in fear of current events. Let us live our days worshipping the God Who has saved us by grace, through faith, and apart from works. Most merciful God, thank You for restoring us to You in Christ our Savior! Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Deuteronomy 10:12-21 The Unmerited Love of God

The Lord of heaven and earth, God of gods, and Lord of lords (v. 17) "set His heart in love" on Israel (v.15). Yes, the Lord God chose Israel, a sinful people, an ungrateful and rebellious nation, to be His chosen people. No merit or worthiness in Israel produced such singlehearted love of God. Yet the LORD who is "merciful and gracious, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness" (Ex. 34:6), chose Israel in love to be His people. It is this singlehearted love of God in Christ that calls sinners out of the darkness of death and sin into the marvelous light of Christ to be for Him a holy people (1 Pet. 2:9). O Lord, as

Your chosen in Christ, help me to walk in all Your ways, love and serve You above all things. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: John 15:1-17 The Fruit of the Vine through the Branches

Where do the branches end and the Vine begin? Or vice versa? That's the idea exactly! What goes on in the Divine Service comes from our Lord, the Vine. This is the life that He gives to the world in the Word of the Gospel and the Sacraments. The power contained in preaching and teaching and absolution at church is how Jesus (the Vine) works in the Church (the Branches). Therefore, it is difficult to discern where the Vine ends and the Branches begin. He has included His Church in Himself, for she is His very own body. When we go to church and hear the Gospel and receive the Lord's own body and blood, or when we hear the pastor forgive us, we receive through the branches, the fruit of

Christ, the life of the Vine. Lord Jesus, show us Yourself at work through real means of grace. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: 1 John 3:1-8 For This Purpose

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 54 Many Enemies, One Really Good Friend

Christians have enemies. If we don't know this the Psalms will never make sense to us. "Strangers have risen against me; ruthless men seek my life" (Psalm 54:3). If we can't identify our enemies, then we at least remember that the world, the flesh, and the devil are tracking us down to wreck our trust in Christ. Yes, we have enemies, but we also have a friend, a helper greater than our troubles. "Behold, God is my helper." We announce it to the world. "The Lord is the upholder of my life." He delivers us from trouble, and we give thanks to Him. O God, save me by Your name and vindicate me by Your Might. Amen.
