Around the Word Devotions + the week of October 5-11, 2025

THEME OF THE WEEK: Perseverance in Glorifying God

"Blessed be the Lord God of Israel, for He hath visited and redeemed His people." He visited in Nain, where He raised the dead. We await His second visitation, where His glory will be revealed fully in our own resurrections. In this time between His visitations, we persevere in glorifying Him. We do it by hearing His Word, by praising His goodness, by confessing our sins and His truth. We also do it in hope, the sure and certain hope of the resurrection of all flesh at the last day. His redemption and visitation mean our resurrection is sure, just as His is sure. "We believe in the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting."

SUN

SCRIPTURE: Luke 7:11-17 — Jesus is Unclean

Jesus touched the bier. That little detail might get overlooked in all the commotion of today's reading. But this little detail is not unimportant. Doing so made Jesus, at least according to the Mosaic Law, unclean. It was one thing for the bearers to carry the dead body and its coffin, for this was necessary and they were called to do so. But most certainly a hush and a murmuring ran through the crowd when Jesus touched the bier. This Jesus touches death, becomes "unclean" for this young man, in order that He would take its curse upon His body. And also for us. In His resurrection Jesus is Lord of death. Death could not

hold this young man. And it will not hold you either. Jesus, call me out of my grave on the last day that I may see You face to face! Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 119:121-128 — Certainty in His Word

Our eyes long for Christ's salvation and the fulfillment of His righteous promise. In the meantime, we face a world that neither fears nor glorifies Him. The Lord has given us certainty in His Word. He has given us Baptism as the pledge of a clean conscience before God through the resurrection of Jesus. He has given us His Testament, His Body and Blood as a guarantee. Against naysayers and doubters, those who abandon the truth in this waning world, we hold to the Lord's Word, to the testimony. The Lord's Word is gold that survives every fire's testing. Lord, be surety to us for good. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Ephesians 3:13-21 Love, God's Glory

The glory of God is His love, and it is unfathomable—unknowable; yet, Paul bows His knees to pray that we and all the saints would know it. How can you know what is unknowable? Only in Christ and by faith. To have Christ by faith, trusting the promises of God's concrete love for us in Christ's death and resurrection, is to have all of God's glory. It is given to us in Jesus. Thus there is glory "in the Church," as St. Paul says. What humans cannot comprehend—God's glory—is still ours to have, keep, and benefit from. Lord, root me by faith in Your Son, in whom Your surpassing love is known. Amen.



SCRIPTURE: Deuteronomy 32:39, 40 — God Kills and Makes Alive

There is no God but the Triune God – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. He says, "... I kill and I make alive; I wound and I heal..." (Deut. 32:39). At first glance, the order appears to be backward. We live first and then we die. Yet, God does things differently. Through the Law, He first kills us by revealing the depth of our sin and the death we rightly deserve. And then, in the promise of the Gospel, He raises us to newness of life through the forgiveness of sins. So, the Lord's order is right. He first kills and then makes alive, because the life He gives will never end. O Lord, kill my sinful flesh through the preaching of the Law so that You may bring me to life through Your Gospel. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: John 11:19-45 — Jesus, The Resurrection, The Life

This conversation between Jesus and Martha has comforted Christians for centuries. Jesus is the Resurrection and the Life. All who believe in Him will live forever. Jesus only needs to speak a word, and the bars of death are broken; the bond of death is loosed. Jesus calls Lazarus out of the grave, and He will do the same for you. If Jesus waits to return, each of us will have to breathe our last and die. It is the way of all flesh. We will be dressed in grave clothes and be put in a tomb. We will be mourned. We will stink. But Jesus, who loves us also, and who weeps at our death, will stand on the earth, and the dead will hear His voice and come forth. He is the Resurrection. He is the Life that never ends. Jesus, be my Resurrection and my Life. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: 1 Corinthians 15:21-28—In Christ Shall All Be Made Alive

Our eyes behold sickness and death. We see men overcome by the weakness of their flesh as they sin against one another. We see death swallowing up life. Though our eyes cannot see it, Christ's resurrection is greater in power and scope than the deadly effects of Adam's sin. St. Paul tells the Romans, "If many died through one man's trespass, much more have the grace of God and the free gift by the grace of that one man Jesus Christ abounded for many" (5:15). The day is coming when we will rejoice to see Jesus reigning with death under His feet. We will see and rejoice at the host of saints gathered from across the continents and centuries who have followed their Captain in victory from death to life. Grant me steadfast faith to share in Jesus' victory. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 36

Jesus speaks of the human heart and the human mouth as a fountain of death. We are dying, and the things we do and say bring forth death. But with the Lord is "the fountain of life." His works and His words bring forth life. In fact, the words of God are so full of life that they make the dead to be raised, and, even more wonderfully, they make sinners to be righteous and holy. O LORD, You give us to drink from the fountain of Your pleasures, for with You is the fountain of life; in Your light we see light. Oh continue Your loving kindness to those who know You, and Your righteousness to the upright in heart. Amen.


