Around the Word Devotions + the week of September 14-20, 2025

THEME OF THE WEEK: Believing Love of All Others

The theme of this week's devotions is... "Believing Love of All Others". The life of a Christian is a life of faithful service and love towards the neighbor. Just as the Catechism leads us to ask who our neighbors are, it also shows us how to love. We learn in the 2nd Article of the Creed that God's love comes to us in Jesus Christ and then we share this love and service with others. We love by sharing God's Word and being the helpful hand that they need. Our love may fail but we know that God's love for us never fails and we rest secure in His loving arms because we will be cared for eternally.

SUN

SCRIPTURE: Luke 10:23-37 "The Law Can't Fulfill Itself"

To the 'self-justifier' every aspect of life is defined by conformity to God's strict commands. Everything is either blessing for doing the right thing or curse for sinning. To prove the Law's impotence, Jesus gives the Lawyer a legal answer. Neither the priest nor the Levite can touch the wounded man for fear of defiling themselves, or perhaps from calloused indifference. Either way, the Law fails to provide saving mercy to the wounded man. The Samaritan is beyond the rigid demands of threat and punishment. He shows mercy, just as God in Christ shows mercy by imputing sin to his Son and righteousness to you. From faith in

this Gospel, you are to learn true love for the neighbor. Grant me believing love for my neighbor, O Lord. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 119:97-104 (MEM) "Jesus Again"

I love reading this section of Psalm 119. The psalmist boasts of some pretty amazing things: He loves the Lord's Law and meditates on it day and night. He has a thorough understanding of God's heart and mind. He holds back every evil, just so that he can keep God's Word and precepts. How wonderful a Psalm this is! Because Christ has kept the law for me and redeemed me from my sin, I now love the Lord's law. How can it hurt me? It can only be my delight. Hypocrites boast in the law, but without the righteousness that comes by faith and the Holy Spirit's grace. They continue to stand under its curse. God be praised that Jesus' saving work allows us to speak these words with boldness and confidence. Jesus has come to do what we were called to do, but never could accomplish. What joy! What everlasting joy! Father in heaven, count me righteous for the sake of Christ. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Galatians 3:15-22 "The All and the One Seed"

In our text Paul is deep into the doctrine of justification, how it is that the Lord forgives all our sins. The Law is especially designed by God to show our need for a Savior. "The Scripture imprisoned everything under sin, so that the promise by faith in Jesus Christ might be given to those who believe" (Galatians 3:22). That promise came first, before the Law. Paul gives us a hint on where to find the Gospel in the Old Testament: look for the promise of the Seed. The Seed will crush the devils head (Genesis 3:15). The Seed will bless the nations (Genesis 22:18). The Seed will have an everlasting kingdom (2 Samuel 7:12·13). The Seed is Christ, the Savior of Sinners. Grant to us, O Lord, to rest in Your promise of life and salvation. Amen.



SCRIPTURE: Leviticus 18:1-5 "Law Promising Life?"

This text seems to contradict St. Paul's sermon that the Law cannot give life. Does it? I don't think so. The Law can indeed give life to the one who keeps it. Can you? The answer is of course, 'No.' You have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God. Christ fulfills the Law in our stead. He gives us His own righteousness of having kept the law when we believe in Him. Does that mean that we should jettison the keeping of the Law from our lives? Absolutely not. We weren't redeemed to become idolaters. From faith comes a happy obedience to God's statutes and rules. Just remember that we don't trust in our obedience to save us. We gladly leave that work to Christ. Give me grace and strength to love

us. We gladly leave that work to Christ. Give me grace and strength to love and keep Your Law, O Lord. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 20:20-28 "Believing Love Suffers Like Jesus Suffered"

You will indeed drink My cup, and be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with." These words shatter any "best life now" thoughts. James and John were a lot like us. They have delusions of grandeur. They wanted to share in His power and glory. Jesus offers them the cup of wrath and a baptism of suffering and blood. He offers them positions as servants. We might want glory, but Jesus gives us an office of service. We serve others because He first served us. He ransomed us with His own blood, and He continues to forgive and feed His people through the Word and Sacraments. If we suffer with Him, we will be glorified with Him. Dear Jesus, serve us so that in faith and love we might serve You and others. Amen.

FRI

SCRIPTURE: 1 Timothy 1:5-17 "The Law's Audience"

The Law is for the "lawless and disobedient." They need their flesh to be kept from hurting others, what Lutherans call the Law's 1st use, and they need to come to the knowledge of their guilt before God, which is the 2nd, theological use of the Law. Paul knows both uses well. He remembers when Jesus stopped his march to Damascus by blinding him physically, curbing his flesh. But the Lord also opened the eyes of his heart to see that his violence was attacking the Lord himself. This revelation came, not to punish Paul, but to save him. "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am the foremost," Paul testifies.

God be praised! Open my eyes to know my great need for Your mercy, O God, that I may find it in Your Son. Amen.

SCRIPTURE: Psalm 84 "Jealous of the Sparrows"

The Sons of Korah sing of their jealousy of the sparrows and swallows. You can imagine it. These ancient priests see the birds making their nets under the eves of the temple in Jerusalem. They see the birds flying out and then returning home to the shadows of the temple, and they think, "How wonderful to have the Lord's house as your house." (See Psalm 84 3·4) "For a day in your courts is better than a thousand elsewhere. I would rather be a doorkeeper in the house of my God than dwell in the tents of wickedness" (84:10). O LORD of hosts, blessed is the one who trusts in You! Amen.
