Small Group Guide: The Doctrine of Laying on of Hands

Opening Discussion:

1. What comes to mind when you hear the phrase "laying on of hands"? Have you experienced or witnessed this practice before?

Key Takeaways:

- 1. The laying on of hands is a biblical principle for imparting blessings, gifts, or authority.
- 2. Our hands are meant to be conduits for God's power and work.
- 3. To effectively use this practice, we must be "under the hand of God" submitted to His authority and molding.
- 4. The spiritual condition of the person laying on hands matters greatly.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. Why do you think the laying on of hands is often ignored or misunderstood in modern Christianity?
- 2. The sermon mentions that our hands are associated with our works. How can we ensure our "works" align with God's purposes?
- 3. Discuss the analogy of "clean water flowing through dirty pipes." How does this relate to the importance of personal holiness in ministry?
- 4. The sermon lists several functions of laying on of hands (healing, baptism of the Holy Spirit, commissioning, etc.). Which of these surprised you or stood out to you? Why?

- 5. How do you interpret the warning in 1 Timothy 5:22 about not being hasty in laying hands on others?
- 6. What does it mean practically to be "under the hand of God" in our daily lives?

Practical Applications:

- 1. Self-reflection: Take some time this week to examine your own spiritual condition. Are there areas where you need to submit more fully to God's molding?
- 2. Prayer exercise: Practice laying hands on each other in prayer, being mindful of the reverence and responsibility this act carries.
- 3. Study: Choose one of the biblical examples of laying on of hands mentioned in the sermon and dig deeper into its context and meaning.
- 4. Ministry opportunity: Look for appropriate ways to use touch in your interactions with others this week, whether through a handshake, a comforting hand on the shoulder, or praying for someone with laying on of hands (with their permission).

Closing Prayer:

Close by having group members lay hands on one another (as comfortable) and pray for God's work to be accomplished through their hands in the coming week.
