


This year began on a tragic note as various wildfires hit our communities in the Los Angeles County region. Our Board immediately worked with the staff to establish a Wildfire Relief fund to which our churches and individual members could contribute financially to meet any needs that might arise. Through your loving generosity, the fund accumulated more than enough to provide for expenses to help people affected by the fires. In addition, numerous churches stepped up to directly minister to their communities. Thankfully, none of our churches burned down in the fires, and no lives were lost among our members. ABCOFLASH remains committed to helping those impacted by the wildfires.


Late last year, as we considered the ABCOFLASH budget for 2025, we realized that our expenses were going to outpace our anticipated income for the year. In response, we formed an Advancement Task Force to look at ways to address this. We realized that we needed to better educate our constituency about the work of ABCOFLASH, specifically, how churches and ministries are benefiting from our work. We also decided to make a more concerted effort to help our pastors learn how to encourage more giving to their own churches. Through various activities, our goal is to create a "win-win" situation where both our churches and ABCOFLASH can strengthen our financial stability and conditions. With God's help, we will labor together to accomplish this despite the challenging economic times that we all face.

Most of you know by now that Rev. Andy Quient, our beloved Executive Minister, aims to retire in April 2026 in order to pursue new ministry opportunities to which the Lord is leading him. We thank Rev. Andy for his hard work and sacrificial efforts on behalf of ABCOFLASH, especially following the footsteps of his long-serving predecessor, Dr. Sam Chetti. We are grateful to Andy's wife, Lisa, for her sacrifices in allowing Andy the time and space to pursue his calling. Rev. Andy's decision to step away from the Executive Minister duties has created an opportunity for a new individual of our Lord's choosing to take over the role to lead ABCOFLASH for the next season. Pursuant to our Bylaws, our Board of Directors has formed a search/succession committee to identify the next Executive Minister. In conjunction with our national organization, American Baptist Churches of the USA, the committee will consult with various constituencies to determine what ABCOFLASH needs for its next Executive Minister. The committee will subsequently entertain applications from interested and qualified candidates for consideration. We ask for your support and prayers for the search/succession committee as it carries out its task of selecting the right leader for ABCOFLASH and for the Board as it considers the various issues that face our region.



The ABCOFLASH Board includes my esteemed colleagues from churches across our region. All servants of God who do their best to govern effectively and monitor the finances entrusted to our care. Our duty is to review financial reports and ensure we exercise due diligence in our decisions. We were pleased to see that our financials reflect the return of dividends and interest this past year. This past year, we examined properties, receivables and restricted funds. We updated and adjusted our reports as needed. I have served as treasurer and worked closely with our business manager, Charlotte Chang, to present reports to the board for them to review. Thank you for taking a moment to review the graphs and reports. Please let us know if you have any comments or concerns. The Ordination Standards Committee of ABCOFLASH has the duty of examining candidates for ordination at the request of their local church. It is the committee's responsibility to determine whether the candidate meets all the requirements for a Standard American Baptist Ordination. Once it is determined that the candidate meets those requirements, the committee will recommend to the candidate's local church to proceed with ordination.

Those who are approved for Standard American Baptist Ordination and are then ordained by their local church will hold the status of an ordained minister in all regions of American Baptist Churches USA.

2025 Biennial Mission Summit

From July 3-6, 2025, American Baptists from across the United States and Puerto Rico gathered in Omaha, Nebraska, for the 2025 Biennial Mission Summit. With the theme "Come Seek Living Water," the event welcomed attendees into four days of worship, learning, fellowship, and Spirit-led renewal. Several from ABCOFLASH made the journey to Omaha for this gathering that called participants to come, seek, and live by the life-giving water of Christ.

The American Baptist Historical Society featured their new exhibit "A Resilient Faith," which presents the Northern Baptist response to the incarceration of Japanese Americans during World War II. The exhibit is the culmination of the ABHS Japanese American Confinement Sites project. Over 16,000 pages of records were scanned, including items contributed by congregations in Seattle and Los Angeles. ABCOFLASH contributed to creation of this exhibit and was recognized at the ABHS dinner.

My family and I were among those thousands reached by the gospel through these faithful and passionate missionaries.

Likewise, it became one great motivating factor in reaching out and sharing the gospel.

These are a couple of the Asian churches' ways of doing their missions and evangelism ministry.

Alliance of Asian American Baptist Churches

The 2nd Annual Retreat of the Alliance of Asian American Baptist Churches and Leaders was held in Laguna Hills, CA, from August 25 - 28. It was a very refreshing time indeed, as the program was well balanced between Bible Study and sharing time sessions and yet enough time for much-needed recreation like swimming, games (funny charades where our acting skills were tested!), pool time, and even billiards!!

The last day was a luncheon at the Wintersburg Church in Santa Ana, CA. We are deeply grateful to our ABCOFLASH Region Board and Executive Minister Andy Quient for making this event possible.





On March 6th 2025, Pastor Htwe and his team went in person and distributed rice, oil, noodles, potatoes, onions, and canned fish to 280 households in Maw Sot Mae La refugee camp in Thailand.



My gratitude is to our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, for allowing me to serve in these prophetic days. Also, I want to thank our Executive Minister, Rev. Andy Quient and our Board of Directors for all the support given to our Latino churches that are now found in five states.

Latino Ministries supports our churches that have been facing many challenges in recent months due to the raids of ICE in our predominantly Latino communities. Many of these churches have experienced loss of attendance of their own members and visitors because they are afraid to be caught by ICE. We have churches where the heads of family have been deported. Children have been suffering. Some families have been sleeping in their cars; some choosing to stay in public shelters.

News and events throughout the six associations of Latino Churches

The annual celebration of our Latino churches was held this year at the Iglesia Bautista Camino al Cielo with pastors German and Zandra Galvez. Due to the immigration situation we were facing, we had a lower attendance of approximately 250 people. But the event was well-planned and met with great enthusiasm. Participants were blessed by the four workshops we had—one each for pastors, men, women, and youth. Attendees received some solid teaching from very articulate workshop leaders composed of local pastors. Pastor Josue Borges was the keynote speaker and he motivated the attendees with insights from the Word of God.

We have six associations for our churches covering five states. Every year, we support these churches with resources and plan different programs and organize events for their benefit through their respective associations. Each association is being led by a local pastor. These associations are the following:

- 1. Association of the North Coast Rev. Dr. Alejandro Roque, leader.
- 2. Association of Los Angeles Pastor Rocael Alejandro, leader.
- 3. Association of San Fernando Valley Vacant.
- 4. Association of Orange County Pastor Marcos Granados, leader.
- 5. Association of San Diego Vacant.
- 6. Association of Arizona & Nevada Dr. Miguel Altamirano, leader.

Each of these associations plans and organizes different workshops and trainings for church pastors and lay leaders in their areas. Training sessions have been conducted in San Diego, Arizona, San Fernando, and Los Angeles. We are very grateful to all association leaders for the hard work and ministry they do for our region. Association leaders and other pastors meet in Los Angeles every two months for planning, prayer, study, and fellowship.

Latina Women's Ministries organized two events for all the Latino churches: Retreat for all Latina women at Camp Cedar Crest, Running Springs, CA, on April 2024. Over 250 women representing churches from the six associations attended the retreat.

Latina Women's Ministries breakfast and encouraging message on October, 12, 2024. They had over 284 women in attendance.

Also, the three associations that have an organized women's ministry have been conducting prayer meetings, breakfast meetings, and study for churches in their respective associations throughout the year.



AB Girls.

The AB Girls ministry is a program for girls in grades 3 through 8. It was administered by the American Baptist Home Mission Societies but was transferred to the American Baptist Women's Ministries. Last year, 2024, Wendy Macias started an AB Girls ministry for our Latino churches. They were invited to join our women's retreat and 23 teenagers went last year. This year, 2025, 29 attended the retreat again and were blessed by the workshops, teaching, and fellowship they experienced at the retreat.

Men's Ministries, Los Angeles - Cesar López, leader. Men's Ministries, San Fernando - Pastor Juan Carlos Aguiluz, leader.

Last November 8-9, 2024, 154 men from our Latino churches attended the Men's Ministries Retreat at Victory Ranch, Moreno Valley, CA. The theme was "The Three Roles of Men." We are looking forward to the next retreat this November 2025. Also, Men's Ministries continues to organize meetings in the different associations to motivate and teach husbands, fathers, and leaders of our churches.



Youth Ministries - Pastor Andres Valderrama, leader.

80 young people attended the retreat organized by the youth leader in 2024. Our Youth Ministries continues to work hard to achieve the goals we have established. This year, a beach outing and a talent night have been planned.

Children's Ministries - Desly Alejandro, leader.

Our Children's Ministries started nine years ago and two events are usually being organized every year. The first one happens in the month of February where a training event is held for

Sunday School teachers and parents. The second one is a special gathering of children and parents every September where they explore a specific topic each year. Just like last year, a concert for the kids is being planned as an added feature for the September event.



The leadership of the Ministers Council is composed of seven pastors. They organized a retreat and a training event

last May 2024. 45 pastors and spouses attended.



Every end of every month we meet for prayer, meditation, reflection on the Word of God, and fellowship. This is usually attended by 18 to 22 pastors and spouses.

Training for Pastors and Lay Leaders

One of our goals in the region is to train and educate new pastors and leaders of the next generation. Many of our pastors are nearing retirement age and there is a need for new leaders and new ministers who could do pastoral ministry, church planting, and discipleship programs.

My report this year covers the months of July, 2024 through July, 2025. In this span, we have participated in the graduation programs and fundraising activities of the American Baptist Theological Center (ABTC), a recognized



organization and an accredited theological institution that facilitates educational opportunities for seminarians and other Christian leaders. We have had students who graduated from Pasadena's Fuller Seminary and Philadelphia's Palmer Seminary and other ABTC-related institutions and programs.

We have partnered with ABTC through their six different academies in organizing training and workshop events to provide knowledge, skills, and tools to church members and lay leaders so they could better serve their churches. We also use the pastoral assessment service and other continuing education opportunities provided by ABTC. Many of our lay leaders end up pursuing seminary education at Fuller, Palmer and other seminaries.

All the things mentioned above—organizing trainings, conducting workshops, doing visitations, providing support to churches, attending meetings, pursuing studies—entail hard work, volunteer hours, self-sacrifice, and selfless commitment from our church leaders. We would like to thank each and every one of them for their service and devotion to the work of ministry.

Continuing Education for pastors and spouses

In May 2025, we had our 42nd annual retreat for pastors and spouses and it was attended by 39 people. Different topics on church service and ministry were discussed during the retreat and participants were blessed by the presentations and messages. An immigration lawyer led a session on the current immigration scenario and informed us of our rights and of what to do when facing raids, detention, or deportation.

New pastors

Last July 21, 2024, we had an installation service for Pastor Rolando Santoyo at Living Hope Baptist Church in Bakersfield, CA.

Pastor Eduardo Soto was called as new pastor of Primera Iglesia Bautista in Santa Ana, CA.



ABCOFLASH is supporting a new church plant by the Iglesia Bautista Hispana de Glendale in Arizona that aims to reach out to the second and third generation.

We continue to support a few other church plants that were started last year.



We also conduct church planting trainings during April and June of every year for the purpose of assisting potential and current church planters including those whose church plants are going through some difficulties.

Family Ministries with our Latino churches

Our region has a vision to strengthen the families in our churches. Families are the pillars of our society. Our slogan is "Strong families build a strong church and a healthy society." Therefore, we continue to conduct workshops, retreats and special events to help church couples, children, youth, women, and men. We are grateful to all volunteers coming from the six associations for providing leadership and for sharing their gifts and talents in building this ministry in their respective churches. We are also grateful for the yearly financial support given by Rev. Dr. Willie Lucas and the Children's Baptist Homes to fund these family ministry programs and activities.

Retreats for lay couples, pastors and spouses

Last August 16-18, 2024, over 45 people attended the pastors and spouses retreat. The retreat theme was "Renew the Vision" and was designed to encourage pastoral couples to continue with the call and vision that God has given them as they serve our churches. We heard great life and service testimonies from the retreat participants.

In September, 2024, 280 people attended a retreat for lay couples in Thousand Oaks, CA. There was a good number of newly married couples who had dreams and expectations of starting their own family. The retreat theme was "God restores at all times" and we had powerful speakers who focused on the subjects of biblical marriage and parenting. The retreat was so impactful that it led to the restoration of some couples with their families and some finding forgiveness in their marriages. We have been doing these retreats for our Latino churches for over 28 years now.



Dinner for lay couples in November

Last November 2, 2024, 80 people attended a dinner for lay couples. The attendance was a little low as there was a Covid 19 resurgence and also some couples were struggling with family budget. Every time we have dinners like this we usually invite a pastor or a pastoral couple who would share a message to encourage these lay couples. We were blessed by the testimony and message of pastors Angel and Marisol Campos of Arizona.



Visiting Hispanic and Brazilian Churches

In 2024, I visited churches in Las Vegas and saw how those churches were doing after they reopened, which has been difficult for them. I also visited the Message of Peace Church, a multicultural, multi-ethnic church in South San Francisco that has ministries with Brazilians, Hispanic, and English-speaking congregations. Their Hispanic ministry was started just two years ago.

In January, 2025, In January, 2025, I visited churches in California and Arizona. In February, 2025, I also visited the Ministerios Manantial de Amor, a church in Orlando, Florida, which is connected to our region with Jorge Monteagudo as their pastor. I spent time with the leaders and families in that church and gave a workshop at a couple's dinner event. God has been moving in a marvelous way in this church.

Pastoral care in Latino Churches

I have had the blessing of visiting many of our Latino churches—some needing added resources, some needing support in forming pulpit committees, some in search of a new pastor, some needing conflict resolution. I have also visited many churches who were celebrating different occasions such as church anniversaries and pastor recognitions. I have also visited churches to support pastors with different personal and family needs.

I am grateful to God for allowing me to do these visitations to support our Latino churches and pastors. I am praying for every pastor, missionary, teacher, evangelist, and lay leader who are serving our churches, for those who contribute their gifts and talents towards growing people and churches, and those who give support and resources to churches in need.

I would like to end my report by sharing the wonderful feelings I had during our December, 2024 Christmas dinner at our regional office. We praised God. We celebrated the unity in the Spirit. There was fraternal love among all of us!





This year has been a powerful season of discovery, connection, and impact. As the Resource Minister for Black Church Ministries, I have had the privilege of meeting or speaking with nearly every pastor within the scope of my position. Through intentional outreach and authentic engagement, I have worked diligently to establish meaningful alliances by cultivating non-threatening trust-based relationships with pastors, leaders, and church members across our region.

Key Initiatives and Program Development

At the start of 2025, I initiated conversations with Black Church Ministries to secure funding for a Marriage Retreat in 2026—an event envisioned for pastors, associate ministers, and their spouses. If successful, we plan to expand the retreat to include church leadership teams, reinforcing the concept that our first ministry is in the home. I secured Pastor Larry Ginn, a licensed therapist, as the retreat facilitator. The retreat will include two and a half days of workshops, culminating in a recommitment ceremony for couples to renew their vows.

In addition, I submitted a funding proposal to launch a podcast entitled "Reimagining." This one-hour series will critically explore the current state of the African American church through discussion and interviews, examining the positives and negatives of how culture and tradition have impacted the black church. The podcast will also spotlight community resources and initiatives that transcend cultural divides and provide practical support for churches in our region.

Community Engagement and Relationship Building

Over the past year, I have intentionally invested in visibility and presence by attending church anniversaries, retirement celebrations, installations, and other milestone events. These moments of support helped communicate one vital message: our churches have an advocate and ally within ABCOFLASH.

Workshops and Leadership Development

I have written this year and, in some cases, facilitated trainings and workshops for pastors, deacons, and church leaders, including:

- Marriage & Communication
- Courageous Leadership
- Awakening Your Inner Breakthrough
- The Progressive Nature of Sin a deep-dive into how sin methodically entraps the soul

I was honored to serve as a keynote speaker at the California State Baptist Convention, where I conducted a workshop on church constitution and bylaws. This opportunity enabled me to expand our network and build bridges with churches outside of ABCOFLASH.

I also worked closely with one of our African American churches in a year-long consulting role, assisting their pastoral search committee throughout the discernment and selection process for a new pastor.

Civic and Interfaith Engagement

This year, Los Angeles Mayor Karen Bass invited me to serve on a citywide Ecumenical Clergy Committee, strengthening partnerships between faith leaders and local government. I also joined the Lakewood Interfaith Council to identify resource channels throughout Los Angeles and explore new ways to connect our churches to these vital supports.

As part of our Juneteenth initiative, I participated in the regional Juneteenth Committee, supporting the event, showcasing some of the books I have written. I hosted a Juneteenth theological discussion with Dr. Bradley, a professor at USC, focusing on the historical and contemporary significance of the holiday.

National and Regional Engagement

I attended the ABCUSA 2025 Biennial Mission Summit in Omaha, Nebraska, and organized a luncheon at the regional office titled "Evolving with the Executive Minister and the Mission of ABCOFLASH," which convened African American pastors across our region for vision sharing and fellowship.

Additionally, I facilitated food ministry partnerships for several local congregations, helping them establish or enhance their outreach to address food insecurity in their communities.

Pastoral Support and Preaching Ministry

Throughout the year, I have:

- Preached in multiple churches across the region
- Attended and supported regional meetings
- Participated in installation, retirement, and anniversary celebrations
- Offered pastoral presence and encouragement at countless events
- · Continued to write and deliver workshops tailored to the needs of our churches

Conclusion

2025 has been a year of relational depth, strategic engagement, and kingdom-building impact. I am grateful for the opportunities to serve, support, and empower the pastors and congregations of ABCOFLASH. As we move into a new season, I remain committed to building bridges, breaking down barriers, and reimagining what is possible for the Black Church in our time.

Following are reports from each of our congregations...

Regional Resource Minister

This has been a year in which San Diego-area American Baptist churches have moved in ministry, service, and fellowship. Local church leaders and missionaries gathered in December at Van Tarpley's house for an Advent Celebration, which was a blessing. Local San Diego churches contributed leadership to and participated in region-wide activities of fellowship and discipleship, such as the Youth and Young Adult Retreat and Third Thursday seminars.

San Diego, like most Southern California communities, is grappling with how to provide care and practical support for our homeless neighbors. ABCOFLASH churches were invited to take part in several initiatives to help address homelessness. One example is the WeAllCount

Point-in-Time Count, which allows congregations to get to know homeless neighbors in their area and serves as a basis for allocation of federal HUD funds for homelessness-abatement programs. Area churches also participate in broader religious and community partnerships, such as the Homelessness Task Force, to address this crucial issue.

As a border community and a significant locus of refugee resettlement, San Diego-area congregations and pastors have been significantly affected by ongoing changes and uncertainty in immigration, refugee, and asylum policies and enforcement. The region's military-support community has also faced significant headwinds from shifts in contracting and procurement practices. In all of these issues, American Baptist congregations remain an important source of hope, practical support, and prayer for people in San Diego and beyond.

Student Support: Generous scholarships have been provided to national and international students through the Hispanic Baptist Convention, Fuller Theological Seminary, and the KOSA Scholarship program.

Student Services: ABTC continues to offer orientations for new and returning students, and its website (myabtc.org) is regularly updated for students' benefit.

Leadership Academies: Christian Leadership Academies serve multiple locations under the direction of Pastor Elias Gabriel and Pastor Luis Rentería.

Partnerships: Strong relationships are maintained with Fuller Theological Seminary, with Rev. Dr. Alexia Salvatierra providing leadership and support, including hosting the annual meeting.

Administrative Leadership: Pastor Luis Rentería serves as Administrative Assistant and Interim Dean, supporting student enrollment growth.

Student Enrollment: The total number of students for 2024/2025 is 175 (45 at Fuller, 120 at the Academies).

Financial Stability: ABTC successfully met financial obligations in 2024/2025, thanks to support from ABCOFLASH, Rev. Andy Quient, Dr. José Menendez, Mr. Ronald Banes, and many other partners.

Significant Milestone: ABTC's "Academy of Leadership and Theological Studies" has achieved certification from the Association for Hispanic Theological Education (AETH), enabling it to grant bachelor's degree equivalents.

Expanded Opportunities: Certified status allows American Baptist students to apply for additional denominational scholarships.

Organizational Growth: All educational and administrative standards have been enhanced.

Name Change: During this year's Annual Meeting, the ABTC Board of Directors formally approved the transition from the Academy of Leadership and Theological Studies to the University of Theology Los Angeles (UTLA). This new name highlights the institution's expanding influence, both within the United States and globally.

We express our deep gratitude to ABCOFLASH for their generous financial support, which has been instrumental in advancing our mission. With God's guidance, ABTC remains steadfast in its calling to serve Baptist churches throughout Southern California, across the United States, and in Latin America.

Our worship team is comprised of Jennifer Browne and a group of young musicians who travel from the San Fernando Valley to our church each week. Their faithfulness is to be commended.

Hope

I know there is hope, because: Thanks to Rosalie, Pauline, and Frances, our Kids' Club has resumed.

I received a call from one of our former Kid's Club children. She is now an adult with children of her own and has begun tithing to our ministry.





A Hispanic mom regularly comes for groceries each week. She finally became comfortable bringing her sons for breakfast each week and has become a regular participant in our women's program. She was very shy in the beginning, but now she is practicing her English. She brings her sons to Kid's Club and is helping a son overcome his shyness by engaging in activities with other children.

Our friends from FBC New Plymouth in Idaho came, conducted VBS for the youth in our community and hosted the 4th of July Celebration for the third year.



Last September, I (Gwynn), needing spiritual renewal for myself, attended such a meeting with the women from The Neighborhood Church in Cypress. From that relationship, we are planning a joint Women's Gathering this fall here at FICM.

Praise Report

Faith in Christ Ministries was tremendously blessed with a substantial donation that has enabled us to address many much-needed repairs, purchase necessary items for our food program, especially the "day bags" provided to the unhoused population. Enhanced Health & Wellness: Innovation for Safety and Care

We introduced advanced medication scanning technology that has resulted in zero medication errors since its implementation. This has dramatically increased safety and efficiency in our medication distribution system. In addition, with podiatry visits, on-site lab testing, and a primary care provider now available every three weeks, Ranchers receive proactive and comprehensive healthcare. Weekly counseling sessions have also supported their mental and emotional well-being, rounding out a truly holistic approach to care.

The Solar Project: A Brighter Future Begins

After years of preparation, we celebrated a major milestone in our sustainability journey—the partial activation of the Rainbow Acres Solar Project. Thanks to our partnership with Obodo Energy and the support of generous donors, solar panels have been installed on rooftops and parking structures across campus. Once fully activated later this year, this system will generate 95% of our annual energy needs and save us an estimated \$140,000 each year after the 10- year mark. This initiative reflects our commitment to stewardship of creation and redirects resources back to the heart of our mission, the Ranchers.
