Student Ministry Annual Report

This year began with the launch of our Student Leadership Team (SLT), culminating in the selection of our first group of student leaders. Eight students attended the 3SLI Leadership Conference in Cincinnati, Ohio, marking a strong start to leadership development in our ministry. Wednesday night gatherings wrapped up in April as our adult leaders shifted their support to end-of-year school activities.

We closed the school year with a pool party generously hosted by the Frazier family. Summer brought major moments of growth and engagement: ten high school students attended Camp 2025, and the Called 2025 event in Oklahoma City was a strong success, with three young women discerning a call to ministry. More than ten of our students served faithfully during VBS week. In July, thirteen students traveled to Alabama for their first Motion Conference, joining over 17,000 others in worship and teaching. Wednesday night gatherings resumed in August with the addition of Sydney Hall as our second high school girls' leader. Weekly attendance averaged 16–22 students—praise God for consistent growth and connection. Our first Fall Retreat was a major highlight and spiritual milestone. The SLT made remarkable progress, taking bold steps in leadership and even learning how to preach.

To our volunteers: thank you for the time, energy, and compassion you invest in our students. To our parents: thank you for trusting our team. We deeply love your students—and you. I am honored to be here to guide, lead and pour into students. I look forward to what is to come and as we move forward I hope to better connect with families overall through shared meals, including parents more on what we are learning and connecting to those who are not here yet.

Annual Report – Eastland Athletics

This program has always been used as a tool to invite people into the church doors, giving us an opportunity to grow relationships with them so that we can show them the love of Jesus Christ. In the 2025 year, this athletic program has been able to reach out and do some amazing things for the community around the church because of the involvement of great volunteers in this program. Below is a swift recap of the program that went on in 2025.

Upward

Upward basketball and cheerleading continues to be one of the biggest areas of outreach for the church. The goal of Upward is to teach about Jesus' love while teaching the fundamentals of basketball and cheerleading. Last season we had 429 players and 77 cheerleaders, this was the largest number of participants in our history. With other leagues popping up around Lexington and near the church our program has remained strong for the 2025-2026 season. This season our numbers are once again groundbreaking with 413 basketball players and 82 cheerleaders with new participants signing up daily. The continued success of this program has everything to do with the great volunteers from the church and parents of the players.

Ping Pong and Rook

Ping Pong and Rook have remained a storage program for Eastland Athletics. This programs offer players hours of fun and connections with people of the church and the community. These take place on Thursday and Friday nights in the gathering room and commons. We have small but loyal groups that play every week. We are hoping in this next year to grow both groups and hold tournaments. I would like to thank both Berny Short and Zelma Lambert for taking the lead in these two sports at Eastland.

Rentals

Eastland is becoming the spot to go to for sports rental. With the options of the softball field, basketball courts and batting cages coaches around Lexington are finding that Eastland is the place for their team. We have teams from Lexington athletic club, Bluegrass United Volleyball, Bluegrass United Soccer, the Special Olympics softball and flag football, Veritas High School Basketball (boys and girls) and Volleyball, all calling Eastland home. Having teams rent Eastland's facilities helps the church financially and it brings awareness to the church for those families looking for a church home.

Connections Ministry Report

The heart of our Connections Ministry is to reflect the very nature of Christ: to welcome, to love, and to guide every person toward a thriving relationship with Jesus. This 2025 report celebrates the intentional, loving work that has allowed us to faithfully pursue this mission, turning first-time guests into true disciples and integrated members of the family of God.

2025 Guest Snapshot: A Growing Spiritual Family

This year, Eastland has continued to be a place where people seek and find hope. Analyzing our Sunday attendance, we have celebrated an average of **5.8 guests** attending our Sunday morning services each week (Jan 12 - Apr 27, 2025). This consistent flow of new people represents individuals seeking community, truth, and a life-changing encounter with God—and our team is the frontline in facilitating that connection.

Next Step Sunday was launched this year to get to know people to new to Eastland in a casual way after church, where we serve lunch and have intentional conversations and help our guests take the next step into group life, serving, or diving into the Connect Journal.

A Heart for Service: Celebrating Our Volunteers

To the approximately 10-15 people on the Connections Team I have the privilege of training and leading, and to the over **40 volunteers who serve on a weekly basis** across Eastland, your heart for connecting people to Jesus is nothing short of amazing. You are the hands and feet of Christ, embodying radical hospitality. Every smile, every warm welcome, and every intentional conversation with a guest is a profound act of ministry that reinforces the truth: **you belong here at Eastland.** Thank you for your tireless, sacrificial commitment to making people feel seen, valued, and loved in Christ's name.

Extending Our Welcome: Serving at Upward

This year, we expanded the reach of the gospel beyond our Sunday services by serving at our Upward basketball and cheerleading programs. By warmly welcoming families to games and practices, we demonstrated Christ's love and the Church's care to our community in a non-traditional setting. This service expanded our connections footprint, showing that the belonging found at Eastland extends to every corner of our local area.

As we look ahead, we anticipate continued growth, especially among young families. With Eastland Kids being a critical driver of overall attendance, our vision for the new year is to launch new, focused training sessions in partnership with Eastland Kids leadership.

Property and Finance Report

Todd Frazier, Property and Finance Chairperson

Maintenance / Upkeep / Repairs Undertaken during 2025

- P & F Committee did not undertake any large projects from 2024's report in 2025.
- Several HVAC units was serviced and or replaced throughout the facility.
- All exterior lighting both on the building and lighting on poles were replaced and are now working
- Half of the shingle roof on the Family Life Center was replaced, the second half is planned for spring 2026
- Roof was replaced on the auxiliary gym including gutters and all building trim
- Wednesday crew leak along with McDaniels Plumbing conducted a investigation of underground piping and found several leaks.
- New water fountains were installed in the church and the Aux Gym
- The nursery was relocated adjacent to the sanctuary beside the Commons area so that mothers and infants are closer together and parents are more at ease.
- The kids wing was given a face lift, signage was installed and several rooms were painted.
- New projectors were installed in the sanctuary along with audio visual improvements.
- Windows in sanctuary were reglazed and the leaks appear to have been addressed.
- One of the large HVAC units for the offices and vestibule is being replace in December.

Proposed Capital Expenses 2026

• Parking Lot Drainage

- Preliminary bids have been received, evaluated and approved to address subsurface water and drainage issues in the parking lot(s).
- Committee plans to patch and repair several asphalt areas once drainage has been corrected.
- **Roofs** Flat roofs and shingle roofs need repairs and or replacement in areas
 - Second half of the Family Life Center is planned for replacement in the spring 2026.
 - Pastor Jarad filled several potential leaking areas in the flat roof areas with extruded foam last year and we plan to install additional foam as needed.
 This is a temporary fix at best and will need to be repeated until a new roof can be installed.

- Bids have been solicited for new shingle roof to complete the Family Life Center as well as the sanctuary.
- Bids have been solicited for all new flat roofs which are over the offices, drop off and Kids wing and classrooms.
- Tile Floor in main bathrooms These tiles continually crack. Need to be evaluated and estimate for replacement
- **Signage** New signage needs to be considered... including traffic flow, guest parking, location signage etc.
- **Church Lawn Equipment** New lawn equipment needs to be purchased and existing repaired.
- **Painting** Throughout the church. We need to have the lobby and areas where visitors and high traffic areas are dirty, dull or dingy.
- **Shelving** there are several areas that need shelving installed.
 - Adjacent to the baptistry, upper level, for Christmas tree and decoration storage.
 - The youth department needs shelving and possibly a pallet wall installed
 - The music department need shelving and a secure area for the music equipment and related items.
- Several of our rooms on the office side need to be repurposed. This would allow us to better serve our Sunday school needs and reduce clutter.
- The landing / sidewalk and railing at the connecting corridor between the aux gym and children's hallway needs to be replace / modified This continues to pull away from the building and has caused a recent fall. I feel this MUST be addressed soon.

Long Range Expenses – 2026 and Beyond

- **Flat Roof / Foam /Rubber** The flat roof areas of the building need to be replace or replaced as funds become available
- Parking Lot/Drainage This is a big project and will need to be further
 evaluated in the spring for replacing complete sections once drainage and
 patching is complete.
- *Family Life Center HVAC* The two 15 ton split units need to be repaired as money allows.
- *All areas* most remaining HVAC units are nearing the end of their life cycle and will need to be replaced.
