PeADD BOARD MEETING MINUTES

Call to Order – PeADD Board Chair, Judge Todd Mansfield, called the meeting to order at 12:02 p.m. with a quorum present. The meeting was conducted in person at the Pennyrile Area Development District and virtually via Zoom.

Pledge of Allegiance & Invocation – Mayor Ed DeArmond led the pledge, and Judge Jerry Gilliam led the invocation.

Approval of Minutes – The August 11, 2025, Board of Directors Meeting Minutes were presented for review and approval.

MOTION – Judge Jack Whitfield made a **MOTION** to approve the minutes as presented. Ms. Diane Ford-Benningfield seconded the motion. With no questions or comments on the floor, the motion carried.

Financial Report – Mr. Lee Wilson, PeADD Board Treasurer, presented the Monthly Financial Report as of August 31, 2025, for review and approval. Mr. Wilson stated we should be at 16.67% of the overall budget, pointing out that our actual expenditures reflect 11.06% of the budgeted amounts and all line items are within approved thresholds. On the revenue side, he stated that 6% of the budgeted revenue has been invoiced as of August 31st.

MOTION – Mayor Kevin Cotton made a **MOTION** to approve the Monthly Financial Report as presented. Judge Jaime Smith seconded the motion. With no questions or comments on the floor, the motion carried.

Federal & State Reports – Legislative updates were provided by Ms. Morgan Alvey, Field Rep. for Senator Mitch McConnell's office, Senator Craig Richardson, representing District 3, Mr. Brian Blank, KY Fish & Wildlife, and Ms. Martha Jane King, Field Rep for the Department for Local Government.

Staff Reports -

1. **Community & Economic Development** – Ms. Amy Frogue, Director of Community & Economic Development (CED), provided updates on current programs and initiatives. The Economic Development Administration's FY25 Disaster Supplemental Program is now open, offering \$1.4 billion for projects that support economic recovery after disasters. Funding is awarded on a first-come, first-served basis with a 20% local match requirement, which can be met through the Kentucky Grant Program. Members were reminded to review the Intergovernmental Review Report and to complete the KYTC Rural Consultation Survey by October 1 to help improve regional participation rankings.

The Kentucky Office of Homeland Security will host a Cyber Workshop and Tabletop Exercise on November 13 at 1:00 p.m. in the PeADD Boardroom, offering three hours of emergency management and DLG training credit. Ms. Frogue also stated that PeADD was also recognized with the Kentucky Emergency Management Agency's Catalyst Award for its leadership in disaster resiliency efforts and support of local emergency management offices.

2. **Health & Family Services** – Ms. Amanada Stokes, Director of Aging & Independent Living, provided updates related to Health and Family Services. She stated that following the recent state reorganization, additional staff training and cross-training have been conducted to ensure continued program coverage. The department is approaching one year since transitioning to a new state data system, which has improved data quality and reporting. September was recognized as National Senior Center Month, with local centers hosting numerous activities to promote engagement and challenge outdated perceptions of aging.

Ms. Stokes stated that the curbside meal program, initiated during the COVID-19 pandemic, will end on September 30, after more than 160,000 meals were distributed regionwide. Participants have been notified and may transition to home-delivered or congregate meal options. She also highlighted Suicide Prevention Awareness Month efforts,

including billboard and social media campaigns promoting the 988 crisis line, and participation in the Out of the Darkness Walk. PeADD staff recently took part in the Substance Abuse & Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Older Adult Suicide Prevention Policy Academy, contributing to Kentucky's statewide prevention strategy. Upcoming community events, she mentioned, include the Pennyrile Senior Games, Nature Fest at Jeffers Bend, and the Walk to End Alzheimer's.

3. **West Kentucky Workforce Board** – Ms. Sheila Clark, Director of the West Kentucky Workforce Board, thanked the judges for their participation in the recent Workforce Consortium meeting, where Judge Terry was elected as the new Chief Local Official for the Purchase Counties, and Judge Humphries continues to serve as the Pennyrile Chief Elected Official. Updates were provided regarding workforce storm grants, which can assist local governments with cleanup efforts. The next Workforce Board meeting will be held September 30 at 10:00 a.m. in Paducah at the Emerging Technology Center, with both in-person and virtual options available.

Mr. Derek Poor, WKWB Veterans Transition Liaison, announced the upcoming 4th Annual Veterans Employment and Training Symposium on November 3 in Versailles, KY, featuring military and transition office leadership from Fort Campbell and Fort Knox. Becki Wells, Youth Program Specialist, provided updates on youth workforce programs highlighting that 43 individuals are being served of the 90 new participants that have been enrolled this year, along with 87 in follow-up services. Through partnerships with local schools and community colleges, youth are receiving training in high-demand fields such as welding, CNA, and phlebotomy, with several participants already placed in employment. The Putting Young Kentuckians to Work initiative, funded by the Kentucky General Assembly, continues to provide valuable short-term training and job placement opportunities. To date, 92 youth have been served under this program since July 1, demonstrating strong regional impact.

New Business

1. **Monthly Code of Ethics Report** – Judge Todd Mansfield stated that no Code of Ethics issues or violations had been reported since the last meeting.
2. **Guest Speaker** – Mr. Sam Flynn, Executive Director of Kentucky's Pre-K for All Initiative, a statewide effort to expand access to high-quality, publicly funded pre-kindergarten for every 4-year-old in the Commonwealth. He stated that the program aims to support working families, reduce childcare burdens, and strengthen long-term educational and economic outcomes. Flynn explained that while Kentucky has funded preschool for over 30 years, access remains limited with only about 27% of children currently qualifying. The new initiative seeks to expand voluntary access, so every family has the option. He presented research from Kentucky and other states showing strong returns on investment: improved kindergarten readiness, higher academic achievement, reduced absenteeism, and long-term workforce benefits. Flynn emphasized that expanding pre-K is not only an education initiative but also a workforce development strategy, helping parents (especially mothers) rejoin the labor force, boosting family income, and creating new teaching jobs across the state.
3. **Director's Report** – Executive Director, Mr. Jason Vincent, introduced Maria Brown as the newest member of the PeADD staff. Maria will serve as the first point of contact at the front desk and by phone, and staff are excited to welcome her to the team. Vincent also reminded members about the upcoming Industry Appreciation Event scheduled for September 25 at Lake Barkley State Park, encouraging everyone to attend and support local industry partners. Additionally, he highlighted the Cybersecurity Workshop to be held at the PeADD office on November 13 at 1:00 p.m., hosted by the Kentucky Office of Homeland Security. Finally, he announced that no board meeting will be held in October due to staff and board attendance at the annual NADO training conference, with regular meetings to resume in November.

Other Business – There was no other business.

Adjourn – With no further business, Judge Kota Young made a **MOTION** to adjourn the meeting at 1:11 pm. Judge Jack Whitfield seconded the motion.

POPULATION OF FOCUS:

- Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) and comorbid polysubstance use
- Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) and co-occurring mental illness
- Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) and comorbid polysubstance use and co-occurring mental illness

FUNDER: Kentucky Opioid Abatement Advisory Commission through the Kentucky Office of the Attorney General.

ELIGIBLE APPLICANTS: KYOAAC grants are open to any registered entity (for-profit or non-profit) that is in good standing with the Kentucky Secretary of State, as well as counties, cities, towns and other government entities.

FUNDING PRIORITIES FOR PREVENTION: Projects submitted in this category should primarily focus on the prevention of first-time use, provide education on substance use, and/or support harm reduction strategies that assist those who are unable to stop using drugs to make positive changes to improve the health of themselves, enhance community well-being, and to reduce the risk of overdose.

For 2026, the Commission has identified certain priorities within the area of Prevention for distribution of settlement funds. Priority consideration will be given to applications that address the following:

- Prevention of first-time use
 - Youth-focused, in-school or out-of-school (youth defined as below 26-years-old.)
 - Programs that increase access to Positive Youth Experiences (PCE) and use reduction of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACE) as a goal.
- Parent/guardians and adult-focused substance misuse education
- Overdose reduction efforts – ex. Naloxone distribution, mobile clinical services, etc.

PRIORITY CRITERIA:

While the Commission may consider all areas of the application, they established several criteria they deem to be considered priorities, which include:

- Projects that demonstrate strong collaboration. If collaboration with other organizations is listed, applications **must** include letters of support, MOAs, or other documentation of that collaboration.
- Projects that expand or enhance services or opportunities. Supplanting, defined as replacing funding of a recipient's existing program with awarded funds, is discouraged.
- Recovery housing projects must comply with state accreditation requirements.
- Projects that address or fill service gaps in particular regions.

The Southeast Hydrogen Energy Alliance (SHEA) and E4 Carolinas (E4C), regional energy trade associations, will collaborate with three key Georgia Tech (GT) interdisciplinary research institutes; the Strategic Energy Institute (GT SEI), the Advanced Technology Development Center (GT ATDC), and the Manufacturing Institute (GTMI). SERA will be funded during its 30 month organization and demonstration with FY 2025 Economic Development Administration (EDA) Disaster Supplemental Implementation Path funds and collaborator in-kind cost share. SERA will be funded thereafter by ongoing sponsors' support, as SERA proves its value during the demonstration period.*

SERA will serve and benefit the 544 FEMA 2023-24 disaster-designated counties in the ten Southeast States and the nuclear, hydrogen and similar technologies, which generate or use power via resilient fuel stored at the power generation site and which are conducive to micro-grid support or are mobile.

SERA will build on recent federally-funded hydrogen and advanced nuclear technologies market demand studies, defining the Southeast region's need for these technologies' acceleration. These studies include; "The Economic Impact of the Nuclear Industry in the Southeast United States", funded by the EDA (2021-5) and authored by E4C (2024), and "The Green Hydrogen Value Chain in the Southeast United States", funded by the U.S. Department of Energy (USDOE, 2021-2) and authored by E4C and SHEA (2022). SERA will provide a substantial return on the EDA and USDOE investments in these market demand studies.

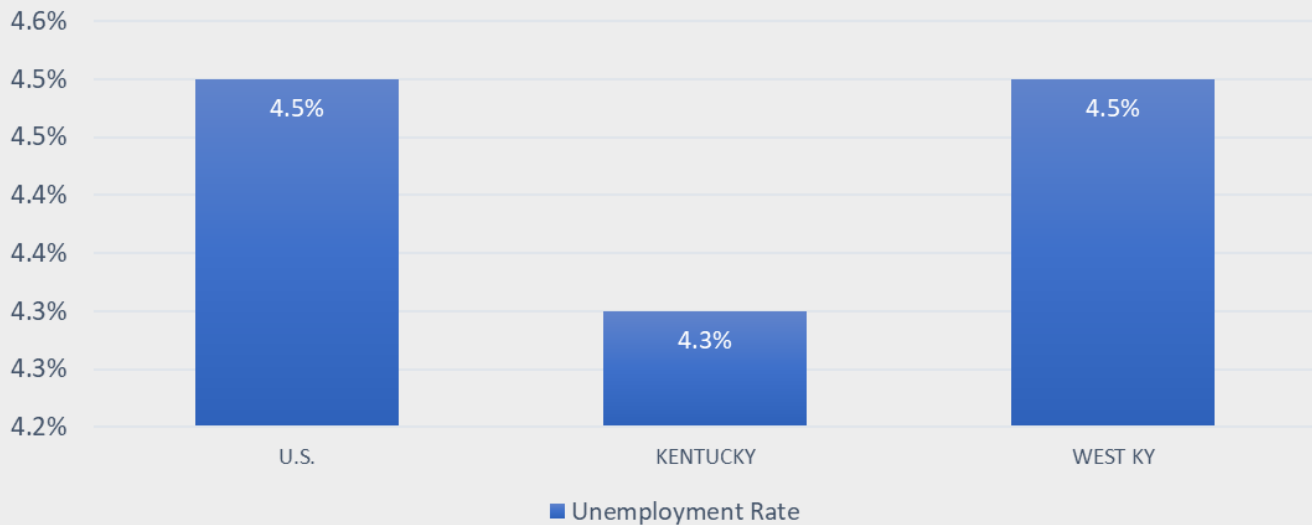

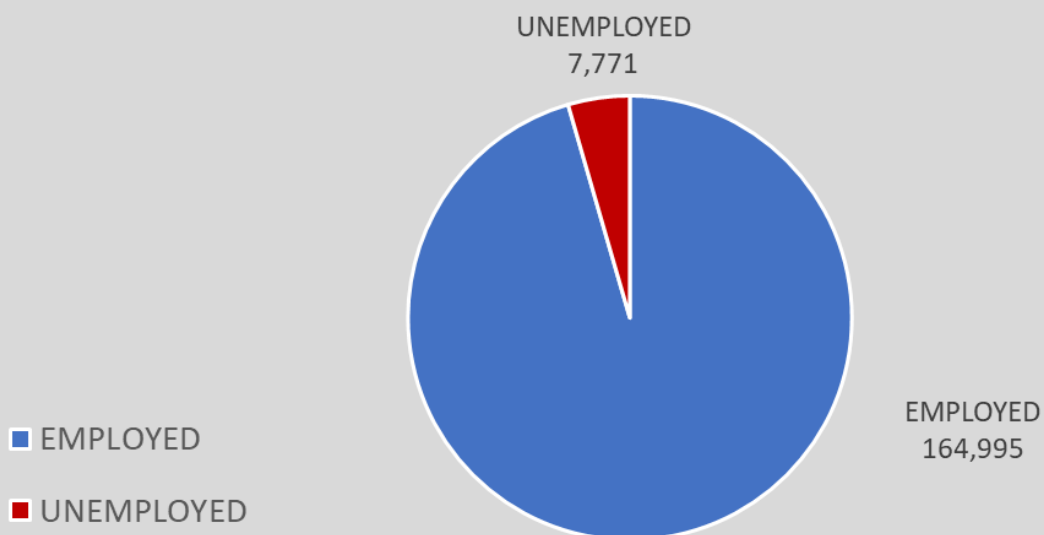

Purchase / Pennyriple Local Workforce Area

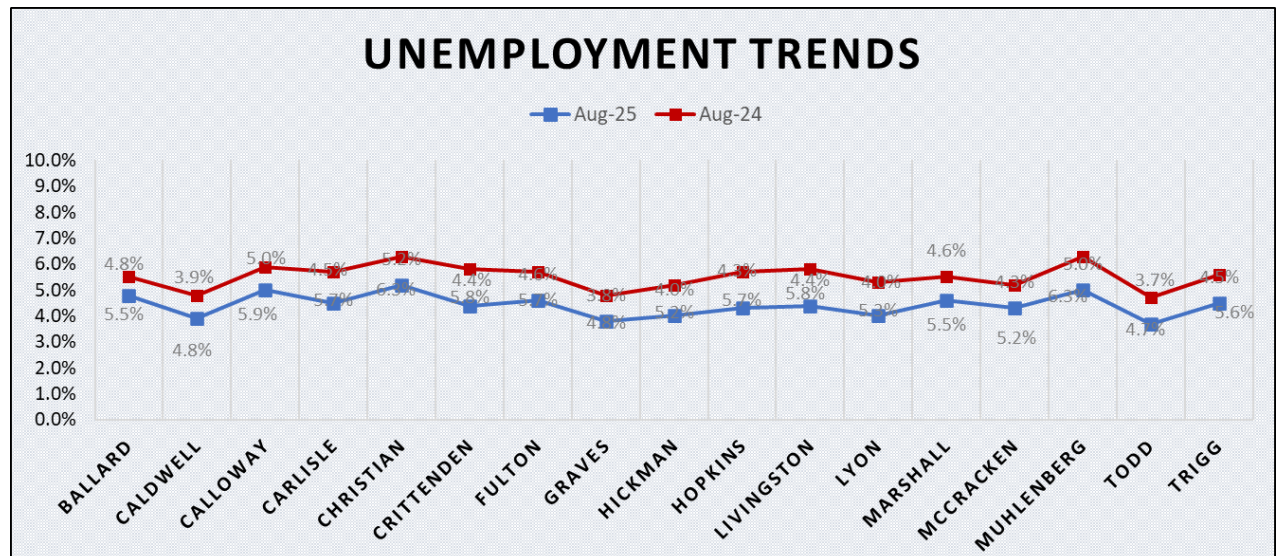
