











For RE, the children explored the harvest festival celebrated in

Year 3

In English this term, Year 3 have been learning how to write a diary entry. They read an extract from 'The Roman Diary - The Journal of Iliona'. They then carefully planned and wrote their own diary, pretending to be a Roman Gladiator. Once they had written their diary, they learnt how to carefully edit



their work for spelling mistakes, missing words and we also tried hard to make their work even better by using adverbs and descriptive

language. We were so proud of their work. Year 3 invited Mrs Ross to read the diary entries and the whole class received a Headteacher sticker.



Year 4

This term, in English Year 4 have been trying to think of a range of vocabulary for something that smells bad. The children had 6 'smell stations' that they took turns in smelling. The smells covered soured milk, mint, garlic and other smells. The children used this vocabulary to create a sentence that opened with an adverbial phrase and described the smells of two environmental features and one feeling.





Year 5

In Computing, Year 5 have been designing and then creating multilevel 3d maze games using Purple Mash. Year 5 have also begun learning about how the Maya civilisation compares to the Anglo-Saxons. They have looked at timelines, physical features and houses of both periods in history.











Year 6

They went out at 2:50pm to survey the parking infringements they saw and have plotted these to find patterns and draw conclusions.





- · The types of behaviours that may be displayed (such as verbal and physical aggression, breaking objects, escape and avoidance and self-neglect).

 - · Why they may happen.
- · How to put a plan into place, as well as some strategies that may help reduce such behaviours and promote positive ones.
