The UMC in Whitewater is very involved in the Community Space Project. Community Space provides support to immigrants who come to the Whitewater area, most of whom are from Venezuela or Nicaragua. More than 1,000

immigrants have come to the Whitewater area in the past year or so. They are hard-working people who get jobs, work hard, and put their children in school. Yet having left everything behind in their old homes, they have many needs.

Community Space helps these people get established. It helps pay for medical needs and utilities. It has a food pantry and clothing area to provide for those who need help. Many of the immigrants need bedding, linens, pillows, etc., and Community Space helps to provide those items for them.

One-half of our Easter Offering will be donated to the Community Space Project, and one-half to help those in Ukraine. You can be an important part of providing for those in need by donating generously on Easter Sunday.

Patience



aiting is a part of life, but, thankfully, we do not have to wait on our own. Through the Holy Spirit, God can help us experience the patience we need to wait well. After all, God is patient with us. And He is in control and knows what is best for us.

Even though His people had been waiting for years for the promised Savior, at just the right time, God sent Jesus. Because we are created in God's image, we can reflect God's patience in our lives. We can lean on the Holy Spirit to give us the strength we need to trust God and show patience when we encounter difficult circumstances in our lives.

It can be difficult to find patience while you are waiting for something important – or even something that is not so important. At its core, patience is about trust: trusting people to follow through...trusting that a process will run smoothly...and, most of all, trusting that Gid has our best in mind and that God's timing is better than our own.

Thankfully, as we follow Jesus, the Holy Spirit is helping us grow and transform to become more like Him. This transformation includes growing in our ability to trust that God will be with us while we wait. As we follow Jesus and trust God, we will grow in patience.

As we start our month in Children Ministries talking about patience, we will think about the times when it is most difficult to wait. When we can anticipate the moments when patience might be tricky, we can prepare and be ready to wait. We will kick off the month with a patience proverb found in Proverbs 14:29. "Anyone who is patient has great understanding. But anyone who gets angry quickly shows how foolish they are." When it comes to waiting, we have a choice. We can either lose our patience and get upset, or we can choose to keep our cool and think about what we can learn through our waiting.

We will face times when we have a choice between what is good and what is best. We might rush to get the good because we do not want to keep waiting for what is best. Yet it is in those moments when we might miss out on something really great. God has something amazing planned for us if we learn to have the patience to wait for it.

Waiting may be hard, but God's Holy Spirit can help us. We cannot avoid having to wait, but we can choose how we respond. A good way to discover patience is to think about what is true about God: God loves us and knows what is best for us. He cares for us and is always with us. We can trust God no matter what.

Forgiveness

orgiving others can be tough. It can also be difficult to ask God for forgiveness for something you did. We have all been there. But the good news is, experiencing God's forgiveness enables us to forgive others.

When someone does something wrong to you, you have choices for how to respond.

You could choose to ignore what they said or did. This might seem like a good decision, but you never get the chance to deal with your emotions. When you hold onto something that hurts, it can eat away at you.

You could choose to try to get revenge. You could to them exactly what they did to you. Or you could do something even worse. I think we all know that this is not the wisest choice.

Or you could choose forgiveness, a much better choice than the first two. You could choose to forgive the person for what they said or did. Forgiveness allows you to give the whole situation to God and let Him help to fix the broken relationship. Even if you choose to end the friendship or relationship, God can work in you to heal your pain.

Forgiveness is always the best option. More than that, it is a command from Jesus. Matthew 18 retells a conversation that took place between Jesus and his disciples. "Peter came up to the Lord and asked, 'How many times should I forgive someone who does something wrong to me? Is seven times enough?' Jesus answered, 'Not just seven times, but 77 times!" (Matthew 18:21-22)

This month in Student Ministries we continue our journey through the life of Joseph. We learn all about the jealousy his brothers felt toward him, their betrayal against him born from their jealousy, and Joseph's ultimate forgiveness. This is a story of hardship and sadness that was healed by love and forgiveness. We can learn a lot from Joseph's devotion to God. When he could have turned away from his brothers, he chose forgiveness. When he could have sought revenge, he chose forgiveness. He did not give in to the jealousy and betrayal. He chose God.



Men's Discussion Group

takes on

Two Books



lhe Thursday Morning **Men's Discussion** group began discussing a new book on Easter week: The Gospel of Mary Magdelene by Jean-Yves Leloup. Perhaps no figure in biblical scholarship has been the subject of more controversy and debate than Mary Magdalene. Although she is discussed in the gospels of Philip, Thomas, Peter, and in the collection of writings known as the Gnostic gospels that were rejected by the early Christian church. there is no better insight into this mysterious

There are several books with this title but this one by Jean-Yves Leloup stands out because of his knowledge of apocryphal and Coptic writings, and of eastern philosophies. Leloup is a French theologian and Orthodox Christian priest. He has published a number of translations of Coptic and gnostic writings. What emerges from this important source text and commentary is a new and perhaps more accurate depiction of Mary Magdalene as the "apostle of apostles," the one who first truly believed the nature of Christ. The gospel text and the spiritual interpretation by Leloup together reveal unique teachings of Mary that emphasize the eminence of the divine feminine and an abiding love of nature over the dualistic and ascetic interpretations of Christianity presented elsewhere.

and influential woman than Mary's own gospel.

The book about Mary Magdelene is appropriate for the season. But it is short so the men chose another that is appropriate for our times: Not in It to Win It: Why Choosing Sides Sidelines The Church by Andy Stanley. Is it possible to disagree politically and love unconditionally? The reaction of evangelicals to political and cultural shifts in recent years revealed what they value most. Lurking beneath our Bible-laced rhetoric, faith claims, books, commentaries in the media, and sermons are a relentless drive to WIN!

But the church is not here to win. By every human measure, our Savior lost. He lost on and with a purpose. And we are in it for something else entirely. That something else is what this book is about. The author, Andy Stanley is an acclaimed televangelist, author, and founder and senior pastor of North Point Ministries in Alpharetta, GA. In this book Andy will help us discover how to take a stand the right way, how to view politics through the lens of faith, and how the life of Jesus and his teaching applies to modern-day challenges in a fresh way.

Jesus never asked his followers to agree on everything. But he did call his followers to obey a new command: to love others in the same way he has loved us. Instead of asserting our rights or fighting for power, we need to begin asking ourselves: what does love require of me?

We invite all men to join on Thursday mornings at 7:00 a.m. at PJ Piper's in downtown Cedarburg. There is lots of room at our table; come and enjoy a breakfast or just coffee as we us discuss our books and enjoy each other's company.



Transitioning to Facility Care



ur care connectors met on March 18 with a representative from Village Pointe Commons. Amy Jacobson is the community relations manager for this living facility and she answered many questions about transitioning from being at home to facility care.

One valuable piece of advice she offered was to not wait until an "emergent" issue with decision making. For instance, if a person falls and needs to be in facility care, it is better to have a plan in place rather than having to scramble to make arrangements. Take time with family to have these sensitive, difficult conversations well in advance of issues.

Our group asked what kinds of care we as a church can offer in helping people make smooth transitions. She encouraged us to have our congregation members moving to assisted living to join in the community activities there to meet people and ease the sadness of not being in one's own home. To alleviate isolation and loneliness, visits are so important. Many facilities in our area will now accept beloved pets as long as they can be care for properly and that can ease transitions.

As you can imagine, the terminology and choices of facility care can be overwhelming. Tours are available at all institutions, and she said that is a good place to start. Designated family members can help with the burden of paperwork, too, but assistance is available with the ADRC of Ozaukee County. As of right now, Village Pointe requires two years of living at the facility before Medicaid is accepted. Planning for financial housing costs is critical since care can run close to \$10,000 per month. ADRC can help navigate estimating costs. Plans for couples should include if one is in a care facility what expenses will the other partner incur living at home.

Many of the group shared their own personal experiences which helps us know we are not alone in this time of decision making. We thanked Amy for her time and guidance. She shared that Village Pointe will be having a seminar on "Living with Dementia" coming in May (see the flyer in this newsletter).
