about what we offer, schedule a time to talk with me. I will be delighted to have a conversation with you.


Make this house of worship a priority in your life, and in your calendar, offering all you can to support it with the gifts the Lord has given you.

# Finance/Stewardship Update

n behalf of the entire Finance team, I want to thank everyone for the 2023 contributions you made to Community United Methodist -Cedarburg. We are very fortunate to predict that at the end of 2023, we may make our budget, and end the year in a positive position. This was the result of good stewardship. We earned extra revenue from building use, investment income and special giving that filled the pledge shortage.

We are also happy if you have submitted your pledge cards for 2024, and if you have not yet returned yours, please get it to us as soon as possible. (There are cards available in the office, or we can email one to you.

Our 2024 Budget is \$241,714 for pledges. Current Pledges Returned are \$206,819. While we anticipate a few more pledges coming in, we expect a shortfall of around \$30,000. This is very similar to how the year 2023 started. If you have any questions don't hesitate to contact Shirley Krenzke.

# Mission Outreach Looking Back ...and Forward

ear CUMC Members and Friends,
I write this on behalf of the Mission Outreach
Committee, which you have always so
generously supported. I have thanked you
repeatedly as the year has gone on for the various
special collections that we have held. But as we
approach the end of 2023, I thought you might be
interested in a summary of all that your generosity
has supported.

We began 2023 with a budget of \$7,000, and with that money we supported 10 Ozaukee County organizations, 4 Milwaukee non-profit organizations, one national UMC Mission (Red Bird Mission in Kentucky), and four international UMCOR missions.

In addition to the above, you donated \$3,210 to special projects, including the Meta House lunch program and other projects, that allowed us to meet the needs of various organizations that exceeded our initial budget.

And finally, through your donations and participation in fundraising activities such as the quarterly Coin Offering, the Superbowl Soup Sale, the El Porvenir Aluminum Can Drive, the two Sendek's Brat Frys, the three Special Sundays (Easter, Thaksgiving, and Christmas), and the Special Sunday offerings such as UMCOR Sunday, Peace With Justice Sunday, and others, you allowed us to donate an additional \$3,600 to various causes.

That brings the grand total to \$13,810 that you have donated to help God's children locally, regionally, and internationally. And we are not done yet. As I write this, we have yet to include the Christmas offering (which will go to Family Promise and the United Methodist Church's Midwest Missions), and

the proceeds from the Pecan Sales (which will go to support Franciscan Peacemakers). In addition to the financial contributions that you have made, you provided 28 bags of food to Family Promise during the November Thanksgiving Food Drive, almost \$700 in gift cards and LOTS of hats, mittens and scarves to Northcott and Rooted and Rising (formerly United Methodist Children's Services), and a large donation of Christmas gifts to the residents of Lasata! Add to that the ongoing food collection for Family Sharing and Northcott, and the provision of meals to Family Promise, and the total impact that you have made is truly astounding!


Looking forward, we are planning once again to hold our annual Superbowl Soup Sale in early February, so please watch for those details.

# Responsibility

n Psalm 24:1, David wrote, "The earth belongs to the Lord. And so does everything in it." God is the author of creation, and God has entrusted us to care for and cultivate the world we see around us. We do that by taking responsibility. From work we need to accomplish, to people we meet, to the words we use, life is filled with moments where we can decide to reflect God's character, take responsibility, and use what we have wisely.

When we follow through and do what needs to be done, we can point others to Jesus, the One who took the ultimate responsibility for us and made it possible for us to be with God forever. God's Spirit has the power to transform our unique and imperfect lives into the character of Jesus. Taking responsibility may not come naturally to us, but God's Spirit can help us develop it in our lives as we follow Jesus and learn to live like Him.

Responsibility is showing you can be trusted with what is expected of you. Everyone has some sort of responsibility. It could be getting homework done or picking up after playing a board game. Other times it might look like practicing a new instrument or caring for a hamster or puppy. For Pet Project, our children and preteen ministry group hopes to inspire kids to reflect God's character in the way they follow through on the work that needs to get done.

Throughout the Bible, we read a lot about how to live with responsibility. The Bible is filled with stories about people who could be trusted ... along with others who struggled in this area. But beyond those stories, the writers of Scripture included proverbs, principles, and parables that also bring God's ideas about responsibility to life. Sometimes these concepts are more difficult to teach because there is no story included. However, the truths we find through Solomon and Paul, along with what we discover through Jesus' parables, can be life-changing when we learn how to live them out.

It is also important to remember that we cannot make promises about what will happen if we choose to put these ideas into practice. Proverbs and principles like these are not intended to offer certainty. Instead, they demonstrate that living with wisdom creates positive natural consequences that are likely to happen when we choose to honor God and others with the responsible choices we make.

ear God's Holy people, Faithful brothers and sisters, Fellow workers and soldiers in Christ, I greet you all in the name of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, Grace and Peace be unto you!

I write to wish you a Merry Christmas and a happy new year, 2024!

I was happy to finally meet you physically when I visited the USA. I thank you for allowing me to share our work with you in your churches and hosting me in your homes. I apologize for the churches who support us whom I failed to visit, but I am hopeful that I will be able to visit you the next time I itinerate. In the meantime, I am available to speak with you on Zoom or correspond through email.

Thank you so much for moral and financial support this year, 2023. Through your generous giving we reached the set goal for missionary support and we were also able to do a lot at the farm. We continue with the construction of our vocational college, which we are roofing now. Also we planted maize, soybean and sunflower on a total of just under 14 hectares for the year.

I had a very long trip back home from the US because our flight from Atlanta was delayed and I missed the connecting flight from Addis Ababa. I had to spend the day and night in a hotel in Ethiopia then proceeded to Lusaka the next day. When I arrived in Ndola, my wife and son joyfully picked me up from the airport and at Mujila Falls, our community welcomed me with song and dance. We are all grateful for you, our supporters, and we declare blessings on you and our connectional church.
