hen one of our sons was still little, my family and I used to tease him and call him "Curious George." The boy was very curious for everything. Few years later, I, too, became "Curious George." I was curious to know more about "Black Friday." That was a

very interesting Friday night in my life. The night was so dark and cold but many people parked their cars and camped for hours in the freezing weather as they waited the exact time to start the shopping which was set by 10:00PM. Having spent a few years in Wisconsin by then, I still had to face the fact that I could not stand the cold outside. But I was also determined to know what was going on in the store, acquaint myself with the procedure of shopping on Black Friday. I decided to get into the store where it was a bit warmer and started moving around and asking questions. There I joined other shoppers. There was a great excitement everywhere. The Christmas atmosphere was already in the air. As I wandered in the store, I discovered that there were many reasonably priced items. Unfortunately, my budget was limited so I could not afford to purchase them. This is what we refer to in my country as "kudisha meso;" an expression that means "to satisfy the eyes, but not the heart." My eyes were satisfied because I saw, but my heart hurt because I did not get what I saw.

When the store opened it was in a very short period before many items were gone but I was able to pick up my only one item: GPS to facilitate my travelling. Now, time to join the lines for payment. In front of me there was a woman who seemed to be an experienced shopper. In such a fast pace, where there was a lot of pushing to get what you wanted; she managed to pick up many items. Sadly enough, she did not have enough credit on her card to buy all the items she had collected. Many items were finally left at the cashier and she only managed a few. What a headache!


As Christmas approaches, this is the moment that people in a consumer world experience all kinds of headaches. Some people remain broke and in debt as they seek to accumulate more things some of which will never even be used. Other people remain exhausted and stressed because of all the activities and preparations associated with the Christmas season. As we begin this Advent, which is a journey leading us to Christmas, this is a moment we are invited to stop and reflect on the reason for this season. Do we see Christ in Christmas or become guilt in our greed and busy-ness? Remember, Jesus is the reason for Christmas. And if Jesus is the reason for Christmas, "What would be a perfect way to celebrate Him in the consumer world?" We need to be cautious, least, we lose the meaning of Christmas.

Christmas is all about God coming to us to be One of us. As a result, we know He understands well what we all go through, both the good and the bad, all the disappointments as well as the blessings of our varied and fragile lives. This time of year, we rightfully sing carols and songs of joy but we also take great consolation in knowing our God is close, understanding and caring fully about all the things we have to go through. Christmas is all about God fulfilling His promise to reestablish the broken relationship between us and the Divine, God became flesh and dwelt among us: Emmanuel. This is a story about how much God loves us, and wants to affirm His relationship with us. It is a story of hope being realized. Christmas is all about God coming into a broken world to make it straight. Christmas is about God coming into a divided world to unify it. Christmas is about God coming into a hurting world to bring hope. Christmas is also about God coming into this world to elevate and give a new status to those who have been looked down. This God comes into the person of Jesus Christ. During this season, I want to invite everyone to look at Jesus, because Jesus is all what we need in today's world. I also invite to focus on Jesus and His purpose for coming to us: He is coming to save you.

# **Pumpkin Spice French Toast Casserole**

This Pumpkin Spice French Toast Casserole is the perfect fall breakfast or brunch dish. It combines the comforting flavors of traditional French toast with the warm, aromatic spices of pumpkin pie. https://betterhomebase.com/pumpkin-spice-french-toast-casserole

### Ingredients

1 loaf about 1 pound of day-old bread, cut into 1-inch cubes

(French bread or challah work great!)

6 large eggs

2 cups whole milk or 1 cup milk and 1 cup heavy cream for extra richness

1 cup pumpkin puree not pumpkin pie filling

½ cup brown sugar

¼ cup granulated sugar

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

2 tablespoons pumpkin pie spice

¼ teaspoon salt

Optional add-ins: 1/2 cup chopped pecans or walnuts 1/4 cup dried cranberries

### For the topping:

¼ cup all-purpose flour

¼ cup brown sugar

1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice

¼ cup cold butter cubed

### Instructions

Grease your 9×13 inch baking dish with butter or cooking spray.

Spread the cubed bread evenly in the prepared baking dish.

In a large bowl, whisk together eggs, milk, pumpkin puree, sugars, vanilla extract, pumpkin pie spice, and salt until smooth.

Pour this pumpkin custard mixture over the bread cubes, making sure all pieces are evenly coated. Gently press down on the bread to help it absorb the custard.

Cover the dish with plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least 3 hours or overnight. This allows the bread to soak up all that pumpkin-y goodness!

When you're ready to bake, preheat your oven to 350°F (175°C).

In a small bowl, mix flour, brown sugar, and pumpkin pie spice for the topping. Cut in the cold butter using a pastry cutter or fork until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Sprinkle the topping evenly over the casserole.

Bake for 45-55 minutes, or until the top is golden brown and the center is set.

Let it cool for 10-15 minutes before serving. This will allow the casserole to set and make it easier to slice.

### **Tater Tot Casserole**

This overnight Tater Tot Casserole simple to make. Prepare it the night before and just pop it in the oven in the morning. Delicious, warm and CHEESY!

Prep Time 25minutes mins

Cook Time 40minutes mins

Total Time 1hour hr 5minutes mins

Servings 8 pieces

### Ingredients

6 eggs
20 oz sausage links use two 10 oz packages
1 cup milk
16 oz Tater tots
2 ½ cups shredded cheese we used a cheddar and jack mix
½ teaspoon salt

### Instructions

½ teaspoon pepper

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a 9 x 13 casserole dish.

Brown sausage according to package directions and cut into bit sized pieces. Spread cooked and

cut sausage onto greased casserole dish.

In a large bowl, beat together milk, eggs, salt and pepper.

Cover the sausage in the casserole dish with the egg mixture.

Cover with one cup of cheese.

If you will be serving this the next morning, cover and refrigerate at this point. In the morning:

Spread 16 oz of tater tots on top of the cheese.

Add the remainder of the cheese on top. Bake for 40 minutes at 350 degrees.

### **Notes**

Mix cheddar and jack cheese for a rich, cheesy flavor.

Don't bother thawing the tater tots first. Just spread them evenly over the cheese layer.

Throw in some veggies like onions or mushrooms to bulk up the casserole and boost the flavor.

# Through Their Eyes – What Christmas Means to Kids and Teens

hristmas has a way of capturing the imagination of every generation, but there is something especially meaningful about seeing this sacred season through the eyes of our kids and teens. Their wonder, sincerity, and openness offer us a fresh lens through which to experience the miracle of Christ's birth.

For children, Christmas feels like a season bursting with joy – twinkling lights, familiar carols, and the excitement of giving and receiving. Yet even beneath all the fun and festivity, kids often understand something profound: Christmas is about Jesus. To them, the manger isn't just part of a story; it's the beginning of God's greatest gift. Many children talk about how they feel closer to God at Christmas – how the nativity scene, services celebrating advent, or singing "Silent Night" help them understand that Jesus came because God loves them.

Teens, meanwhile, often wrestle with bigger questions, purpose, identity, belonging. Christmas speaks deeply into those longings. For many of them, the birth of Jesus represents hope in a world that often feels overwhelming. They see in the story of Bethlehem a God who draws near, who chooses humility, who understands struggle, and who offers peace when life feels chaotic. As they grow in their faith, teens begin to recognize Christmas not just as a tradition but as the moment God's plan unfolded in a way that changed history and continues to change us.

What stands out for both age groups is the celebration of Jesus' birth. Children marvel at the angels filling the sky with songs of glory; teens reflect on the courage of Mary, the faithfulness of Joseph, and the stunning reality that the Savior entered the world in complete humility. Together, they remind us that Christmas isn't merely about sentiment, it's about incarnation. It's about the moment when God stepped into human history, choosing vulnerability so that we could know His love up close.

Kids and teens notice the joy of Christmas, but they also grasp the significance. They understand that we celebrate because Jesus' birth brought light into darkness. They understand that Christmas is the beginning of the story of salvation. They understand that the baby in the manger is the same Christ who calls us to follow Him today.

In many ways, their perspective pulls us back to the heart of Christmas. They celebrate simply and honestly – because the Savior has come. They remind us that Christmas is not just a memory but an ongoing invitation: to rejoice, to worship, to welcome Jesus into every part of our lives.

So, as we journey through this season, may we take time to notice how the young people in our church are experiencing Christmas. Listen to their questions. Hear their excitement. See their faith. In their uncomplicated joy and genuine wonder, God often speaks to us again.

This Christmas, let us join our children and teens in celebrating the miracle of Christ's birth – the night when hope arrived, when light broke through, and when love Himself came near.

Jesus is born. And because of that, everything has changed.
