in this nation! In November, the people of this nation are given a time to pause and celebrate a day for Thanksgiving. This year, we will continue in this tradition on November 27 and we will all offer our thanksgiving to God, the Creator of the universe for His countless blessings bestowed on us as a nation, as a church family, as families and as individuals. As good as this tradition might be, I think one day a year is not enough to thank God. As children of God, we are called to joyfully participate in this national holiday of Thanksgiving, while simultaneously realizing that we have to acknowledge with gratitude all the blessings we receive each and every day throughout the year. Life, love, faith, health, friendships, relationships, opportunities, and everything in between is a gift from our Loving God.

I like what Henri Nouwen explains about the spirit of thanksgiving. He says, "Gratitude goes beyond the "mine" and "thine" and claims the truth that all of life is a pure gift. This is significant to me in the sense that earlier in my formative years, I always thought of gratitude as a natural response to the awareness of gifts received, or simply put, a short-lived emotion that depends on our external circumstances. But now, as I grow in my spiritual journey, I have come to realize that gratitude is something to be lived as a discipline. The discipline of gratitude is the explicit effort to acknowledge that all I am and have is freely given to me as a gift of love, a gift to be celebrated with joy. We can enthusiastically embrace this discipline of gratitude because we understand that the action of thanksgiving is one which makes us humans

unique. Of all creatures, only human beings can choose to express gratitude, or choose to ignore the countless blessings of God. We must remember, though, that our unwillingness, or inability, to express gratitude is a deep, serious, spiritual illness.

In fact, this spirit of gratitude goes together with our Christian teaching of one's spiritual journey. God calls all His followers to discipline themselves and struggle to maintain a true Christ-like spirit, which includes the spirit of gratitude, the spirit of joy, the spirit of humility, the spirit of love, the spirit of hope, and more. Difficult and disappointing circumstances will tempt us to lose these Christian attitudes, but our spiritual struggle is exactly an effort to always live in communion with God and allow His Holy Spirit to fill us with His fruit of love, joy, peace, hope, and gratitude. Each and every moment of our lives, we have a choice to make whether to be grateful or to be ungrateful; to see life as a blessing, or a burden; to notice the hand of God present in our own reality, or to arrogantly think that we are our own god and we have achieved everything on our own.

This spirit and discipline of thanksgiving go in line with our upcoming Commitment Sunday. Every November, we chose one Sunday to be the day when we reflect upon the blessings that God has given us, and think about how we can show our gratitude back to God by offering Him from our many gifts. These gifts include our time, talents, and treasure. This year the Commitment Sunday will be November 16, 2025. By that time, you will have already received your stewardship packet and prayed to the Lord to guide you on how you can graciously respond to God's goodness to you and commit to support God's work through CUMC. Acting as a good steward of God in His Church is a concrete way we can express our thanksgiving to Him. I thank God for every one of you, and pray that you may have a most joyous and blessed Thanksgiving celebration.

#### **Mission Outreach Christmas Activities**

#### **Northcott and Rooted and Rising**

t is that time of year again. As in years past, we will again be supporting Northcott Neighborhood House, Rooted and Rising (the former United Methodist Children's Services), and Lasata.

Our giving tree will be put up in the lobby before November 2. This is for hats, mittens and scarves, which will support both Northcott and Rooted and Rising.

We will also be collecting gift cards for the same two organizations. Gift cards should be in denominations of \$10 or \$20, and should be from Target or Wal-Mart. These gift cards will help the staff of these two organizations purchase Christmas gifts for the children (and adults) that are supported by Northcott and Rooted and Rising. Cards can be placed in the wooden donation box in the church office.

In order to deliver the donated gift cards as well as the hats, mittens and scarves to the two organizations before their Christmas parties, we ask that all donations be brought to church no later than Sunday, December 7. The donated items will be evenly divided and delivered on Tuesday, December 9.

Additionally, we will be collecting gifts for the residents of Lasata. A list of the requested items will be posted in church as soon as it is available, and we will request that you sign up for the gift... and the person...that you will support. This means that you will be purchasing items for a specific person, and the gift will be exactly what he/she has requested!

Those gifts must be unwrapped - please do NOT wrap them - and they must be delivered to church no later than Sunday, December 7. We have promised to provide gifts for 50 residents, but if we have more gifts that are donated, you can be sure that they will be used and appreciated.

Please help to make Christmas special for our friends at Lasata, some of whom are prior congregants of CUMC. Let's let them know that they are NOT forgotten!

#### **Pecan Sales**

Please note that we will not be conducting Pecan Sales as we have done for many years. With the drop in purchases and the loss of some key members, we just were not selling enough to make this worthwhile.

We regret the loss of this activity, especially because the proceeds supported the Franciscan Peacemakers, an organization that combats homeless and human trafficking in Milwaukee. However, your Mission Outreach Committee has decided that the proceeds from our Superbowl Soup Sale, which will be held on Sunday, February 8, will go to the Franciscan Peacemakers. We hope that you will support this activity and mission, and more information will be forthcoming after Christmas.

#### Magazines???

ith so much reading material available online, reading paper magazines is largely a lost art. But if you are one of the few people who still receive magazines in the mail, or perhaps you buy them in the checkout line at the store, please keep the Ozaukee Jail Literacy Program in mind.

This is a mission that CUMC has supported for several years by collecting reading materials to be donated to the inmates in the Ozaukee County Jail. There is a group of people who sanitize the donated materials to ensure that it is appropriate for the inmates, and also to remove any personal identifying information. And a similar group of people also conduct tutoring sessions to help teach the inmates to read, and thus to better prepare them for reentry into society upon their release.

It is not just magazines that are needed, but books - mostly paperback books - as well.

So please consider donating used magazines and books to the Ozaukee Jail Literacy Program. You can drop them in the lobby next to where we collect food donations for Family Sharing. A member of the Mission Outreach team will deliver the donated materials to the appropriate location.

And please keep in mind that many doctors and dentist offices have reading materials in their waiting rooms. Most of those materials get thrown away, but they would be perfectly acceptable donations. Ask the receptionist if we could have them when they are done with them. If you don't want to be responsible for picking them up, please notify Craig Pierce, and he will take care of it.

Thank you for keeping this segment of our population in mind...and in your prayers.

# Bedrock: Building Confidence in God, Block by Block

onfidence is something everyone talks about – but few truly understand. In a world that often tells us to "believe in yourself," the Bible invites us into something deeper, stronger, and more lasting. True confidence isn't rooted in self-reliance, talent, or success. It's grounded in the unchanging truth that God is with us.

We define **confidence** as living like you believe God is with you.

That kind of confidence doesn't waver when life gets hard. It doesn't crumble under pressure or disappear when things don't go our way. Instead, it's built on the steady, unshakable foundation of God's character – His love, His faithfulness, and His promises that never fail.

That's why our theme this month is called "Bedrock: Building Confidence in God, Block by Block." Just as a building must rest on solid ground to stand firm, our lives must be built on a foundation of faith. Every story we hear, every moment we trust, every prayer we pray — it all becomes part of the structure God is forming in us. One block at a time, our confidence grows as we come to know who He is and what He has done.

Throughout this series, our kids will explore powerful stories from Scripture – stories of men and women who built their lives on faith in God. They'll hear about people who faced fear, uncertainty, and impossible odds, yet chose to trust God's goodness. These aren't just ancient tales; they are living examples of what happens when we place our confidence in the One who never changes.

When David faced Goliath, he didn't rely on his own strength but on God's power. When Esther risked everything to save her people, she trusted God's providence even when His presence wasn't obvious. When Peter stepped out of the boat, he learned that confidence in Christ can keep us standing even on the waves. Each of these moments reveals the same truth – confidence in God is built through faith that acts, even when we can't see the outcome.

My prayer is that as children encounter these stories, they'll begin to build their own bedrock of faith. They'll learn that God's love is steady, that His promises are true, and that His presence never leaves them – not at school, not at home, not anywhere.

But this isn't just a lesson for kids. It's a reminder for all of us. We live in a world that shakes our sense of security and questions what we stand on. Yet, when we root our lives in God's Word and His character, we find confidence that endures.

So, as our kids learn to build confidence "block by block," may we do the same. Let's take time to remember God's faithfulness in our own stories. Let's encourage one another to trust Him in the places that still feel uncertain. And let's live like we truly believe – every single day – that God is with us.

That's the kind of confidence that lasts. That's the kind of confidence that changes lives. That's the **Bedrock** we're building on together.
