

We cannot stop drowning in the waters of our addictive culture, but we can see our reality for what it is. detach from it and build a "coral castle and learn to breathe under water". The New Testament calls it salvation, or enlightenment, the Twelve Steps program calls it recovery.

Richard Rohr is a globally recognized Jesuit Priest who has authored numerous books challenging our interpretation of the bible and our approach to religion. He is the founder and director of the Center for Action and Contemplation in New Mexico. His manner of writing is challenging but easy to accept.

Thank You CUMC!

he Mission Outreach Committee would like to thank the congregation for your amazing support that allowed CUMC to make two significant donations recently.

In early August, the Committee decided that we wanted to donate to flood relief for those who have been terribly affected by the floods in Texas, Virginia, and North Carolina. We set aside \$1,000 from the Mission Outreach budget, and we asked the congregation to join us in trying to reach a total donation of \$1,500. Within just a few days after making the appeal to you, our donations reached \$1,800. And now that the "dust has settled", we have topped out at \$1,247 in donations from the congregation, meaning that we are able to donate a total of \$2,247 to the Global Ministries US Disaster Response and Recovery Fund.

While our intent was to support those in Texas, Virginia and North Carolina, the **US Disaster Response and Recovery** Fund supports those in need throughout the U.S. This will include those in the greater Milwaukee area and throughout southeastern Wisconsin when we experienced our own flooding after the rain storms on August 9-10. The United Methodist Church has been and continues to be active providing various types of assistance. And it should also be noted that Midest Mission, which is also a United Methodist mission and is one that we have supported in a variety of ways over the years. has been involved both here and throughout the U.S. with flood recovery.

I should not be surprised, as your generosity to such causes is always amazing.

Later in August we held a Brat Fry at Sendik's in Grafton, the proceeds of which went to Ozaukee Family Services. Thanks to the many CUMC members and friends who stopped by to purchase food, eat lunch and visit with us, and the many community members who joined us, we raised \$440.

Again, thank you for making possible our support of these very worthwhile missions.

What Does Moses Have to Do with Me?

Finding Courage, and Direction, in the Unknown

et's be real, life in middle and high school can feel like a mess of unknowns. 
