
THROUGH THE LITURGY: COLLECT OF THE DAY

HEROES OF FAITH SPOTLIGHT

Each month, we will highlight one of the many heroes of the Christian faith who have stood firm in the truth of Holy Scripture. We will look at the apostles who knew our Lord Jesus Christ personally, his friends who were witnesses to His miracles, the faithful ancestor of the Old Testament who patiently awaited His first Advent, as well as the many other Godly men and women who have been bold witnesses throughout the years, to the one true faith. We look to them not as people to be worshiped or prayed to but as ordinary sinners, like us, to whom the Holy Spirit gave faith to be extraordinary. They are holy because the blood of Christ forgave their sins. They are holy because the Holy Spirit gave them a living faith in which the love of Christ shone through.

On August 28, the Church rejoices to celebrate the life of St. Augustine of Hippo, pastor and theologian.

One of the so-named Doctors of the Western Church, St. Augustine, is considered by most to be the greatest theologian outside of St. Paul for his impact on the church. St. Jerome, in his contemporary, said he "established anew the ancient faith." A gifted child, Augustine studied the philosophies of his day, living a pagan life until the age of 31 when he came under the tutelage of St. Ambrose of Milan. After his conversion, he would go on to pen many writings concerning Christianity and the church. Amongst them are Confessions, City of God, Enchiridion, On the Spirit and Letter, and Harmony. He died in 430 AD and was recognized early on as a gift from God for his service to the church.

YOUTH LEAGUE UPDATE



THE LUTHERAN CONFESSIONS - ARTICLE XIII - THE USE OF THE SACRAMENTS

What is a sacrament? How many sacraments are there? When we study these questions, we must realize that the term "sacrament" is a man-made term. The word "sacrament" comes from the Latin sacramentum, which means oath or rite. The number of rites recognized as sacraments depends upon how one defines the term sacrament. This month's article deals with the definition of what a sacrament is, and as a result, leads the way for a discussion on the number of sacraments (which is discussed in-depth in Article XIII of the Apology).

In the Augsburg Confession, the Lutheran Confessors stated: "Our churches teach that the Sacraments were ordained, not only to be marks of profession among men, but even more, to be signs and testimonies of God's will toward us. They were



instituted to awaken and confirm faith in those who use them. Therefore, we must use the Sacraments in such a way that faith, which believes the promises offered and set forth through the Sacraments, is increased [2 Thessalonians 1:3]."

The main purpose of ACXIII was to put the teaching of the Lutherans in contrast to Ulrich Zwingli and his followers, who taught that the sacraments were merely signs by which people identified themselves as Christians. Zwingli adamantly denied that the sacraments had any power to create or strengthen faith. He said: "I know that all the sacraments are so far from conferring grace that they do not even convey or distribute it," and "They are wrong, by the whole width of heaven, who think that sacraments have any cleansing power."


This is the teaching of the majority of Reformed churches still today, who also deny the power of God's Word at work in the sacraments. Lutherans do not deny that the sacraments serve as outward signs which distinguish Christians from those around them, but insist that in addition to being outward signs, they are also means by which God creates and strengthens faith. The idea that the sacraments are "signs and testimonies of God's will toward us. They were instituted to awaken and confirm faith in those who use them" was a concept foreign to Zwinglian theology. The Lutherans taught that the sacraments are means of God's grace - instruments through which God conveys to human beings the forgiveness of sins which Christ won for them on the cross.

THE LUTHERAN CONFESSIONS - ARTICLE XIII - THE USE OF THE SACRAMENTS

Zwingli argued that the Holy Spirit does not need a "vehicle" through which to convey God's grace, but works without means. We must understand that while it is not necessary for God to use such a means (since He is all-powerful), He has revealed through His Word that these are the means through which He has decided to distribute the forgiveness of sins won by Christ.


Therefore, ACXIII is correct in its condemnation when it states, "Therefore, they condemn those who teach that the Sacraments justify simply by the act of doing them. They condemn those who do not teach that faith, which believes that sins are forgiven, is required in the use of the Sacraments".

Generally, we have defined the term sacrament in this way: A sacred act, instituted by Christ Himself, in which there are earthly



In the Apology, it states, "If we call Sacraments 'rites that have the command of God, and to which the promise of grace has been added,' it is easy to decide what are true Sacraments.... Therefore, Baptism, the Lord's Supper, and Absolution (which is the Sacrament of Repentance) are truly Sacraments. For these rites have God's command and the promise of grace, which is peculiar to the New Testament."

The critical thing to remember when discussing the Sacraments is not to get tripped up on strict human definitions, but to focus on what they actually offer. Forgiveness, life, and salvation! And for this, we can be most grateful that our loving Father has chosen these means to deliver His gifts.
