STANDING FIRM IN CHRIST AS SEASONS CHANGE

Why do we use "bids" in the Divine Service?

A "bid" is an invitation to the congregation to join in each of these prayers to our Lord. A bid is not part of the prayer. Rather, it is the part where the pastor first tells us what we are going to pray for, a great way of gathering the congregation's thoughts together and directing them toward the specific petitions and thanksgivings that we are about to pray.

THROUGH THE LITURGY: PRAYER OF THE CHURCH

What is the "Prayer of the Church"?


The Prayer of the Church is the part in the service where the pastor leads the congregation through a series of petitions, or requests. Each prayer is introduced by a "bid."

Why is praying together so important?

Do you know anyone who needs God's care? Wouldn't you like to have the rest of the congregation focused on praying for that person too? If so, then this is a good time to do it! During the Prayers, we pray for all of the people of our congregation, particularly those who are sick and shut-in. We also pray for our government, for all believers, and many others.

HEROES OF FAITH SPOTLIGHT

Each month, we will highlight one of the many heroes of the Christian faith who have stood firm in the truth of Holy Scripture. We will look at the apostles who knew our Lord Jesus Christ personally, his friends who were witnesses to His miracles, the faithful ancestor of the Old Testament who patiently awaited His first Advent, as well as the many other Godly men and women who have been bold witnesses throughout the years, to the one true faith. We look to them not as people to be worshiped or prayed to but as ordinary sinners, like us, to whom the Holy Spirit gave faith to be extraordinary. They are holy because the blood of Christ forgave their sins. They are holy because the Holy Spirit gave them a living faith in which the love of Christ shone through.

On September 22, the Church remembers and thanks God for His servant and prophet Jonah.

Jonah was a reluctant messenger of God. When tasked with traveling to the Assyrian capital of Nineveh to preach repentance to the people there, Jonah famously sailed in the opposite direction. Not wanting to risk his life in a foreign land preaching repentance to a people he thought did not deserve God's mercy, Jonah defied God. Yet God caused the seas to storm, and eventually Jonah was thrown overboard, and a great fish swallowed him and placed him safely on the beaches on the way to Nineveh. Fulfilling God's command, Jonah preached repentance to the people, and they did, receiving God's mercy and forgiveness. Jesus speaks of the sign of Jonah as he foreshadows His time in the tomb as He calls us to repentance. And because of Christ's mercy and forgiveness, we are given new life, as was Jonah.



THE LUTHERAN CONFESSIONS - ARTICLE XIV - CHURCH ORDER



Every Christian, by virtue of faith in Christ, has a call (Romans 8:28-30). Because of this calling, every Christian is a priest before God and possesses the office of the ministry (1 Peter 2:9). Every Christian should exercise this priesthood in their homes, with neighbors, and in the world as witnesses of Christ. We can and should confess Christ, teach, admonish, comfort, forgive, pray, and even baptize (in case of emergencies).

However, there is also a distinction between the actions of an individual Christian and those of a called minister of a congregation. One is done privately (not on behalf of the church) and the other is done publicly (in the name of the

church). The public ministry has been established by God for the purpose of proclaiming the Word of God for the salvation of souls. It also serves to keep order within the church. And this is precisely what Article XIV of the Augsburg Confession tells us. It states: Our churches teach that no one should publicly teach in the Church, or administer the Sacraments, without a rightly ordered call.


The public ministry is not an invention of man but was established by God for the building up of His Church here on earth. Paul writes in Ephesians that it is the exalted Christ who "gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the shepherds and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ" (Ephesians 4:11-12). When he spoke to the pastors of the churches in Ephesus, Paul said, "Pay careful attention to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to care for the church of God, which he obtained with his own blood" (Acts 20:28). Notice how Paul reveals this call to lead the flock comes from God, the Holy Spirit!

At the same time, this divine call comes through a group of believers, which is the congregation. One may not assume the position of pastor for oneself; instead, one must receive a call to do so through that congregation. Consider the practice of the early church as described in the Book of Acts. In Acts 1, the congregation in Jerusalem "cast lots" to determine the replacement for Judas; in Acts 6, the congregation in Jerusalem "appointed" seven men as deacons to help the apostles; and in Acts 14, Paul and Barnabas "appointed" elders in the congregations that started up on their first missionary journey.

While a congregation has the authority to call pastors and teachers to fill its specific need, it will want to be mindful of the qualifications given by God for those in the public ministry. (1 Timothy 3:1-7 - see also 2 Timothy 2:24-25 and Titus 1:5-9).

It should be noted that women are not to serve in the office of the public ministry. Scripture states that the reason for this is because of God's established order at creation (1 Timothy 2:11-14 - see also 1 Corinthians 14:34-35). This is not a culturally conditioned custom of a specific time, but rather a continuing standard God set for the sake of order from the very beginning.

The offices of the Roman Catholic Church were, from the very beginning, about power. For them, the congregation was at the bottom, above them were the priests, bishops, archbishops, and finally the pope. With the teaching of the Priesthood of all believers, Luther turned all this upside down. The office of the ministry (the keys) comes from God, through the church. Pastors and teachers are not superior to the members of the church; rather, they hold their positions by the authority of the church members. The ministry is not a difference of level or power, but of office. When called ministers deal with us by Christ's command, that is, when they teach, admonish, and comfort us with the Word of God, then we should receive their instruction, admonition, and comfort as though God spoke to us Himself.

The purpose of the office of the ministry is for the public administration of the means of grace for the purpose of saving souls. We have been given the Gospel (which is to be preached) and the sacraments (which are to be administered) in order to make disciples of Christ and teach them to observe what He has commanded (Matthew 28:19-20); to edify the church of God (Ephesians 4:12); and to save lost souls (1 Timothy 4:16).

The authority of the public ministry comes from God, and the power is found in His holy Word alone, not in those who minister the Word!
