Leader: So let us enter this time with open hearts and willing



People: We are here, Lord. Meet us, shape us, and send us as



Givens Family (*Joseph, Rachel, Elijah & Micaiah*) Serving in Calais, France

Joseph and Rachel Givens, along with their children, Elijah and Micaiah, serve with the Maria Skobtsova Housing Association in Calais, France. This ministry provides vital shelter and support to migrating people seeking refuge as they journey toward England.



Since 2022, Joseph and Rachel Givens

have served in Calais, France, where they accompany volunteers at Maria Skobtsova House, a temporary shelter for women and children on a journey of migration. They work with many refugees, primarily those from the Middle East and Africa who flee to Europe in search of safety and stability for themselves and their families. War, death, famine, and oppressive political regimes force thousands of migrants to undertake this journey every year. As asylum is often refused in mainland Europe, Calais, France becomes an important crossroads. It is the nearest European city to the United Kingdom. There, refugees who have been unsuccessful at settling in Europe seek to cross the English Channel and claim asylum in Britain.

While migrants wait to cross, they crowd into temporary camps that lack access to sanitation facilities, transportation, clean water, and public safety. The local government discourages migrants by breaking up these temporary settlements and forcing the residents to relocate nearly every day. Women and children are especially at risk in this situation. The Maria Skobtsova House provides a safe space for up to 16 of them to live, work, laugh, play and pray together. The Givens family is called to manage the house, oversee daily activities, make connections with local nonprofits and churches, maintain a prayerful presence and shine a light for the gospel.

A few months ago, the ministry was able to move into a new building with the support of a French foundation. The larger house has a fenced yard for the children to play in, much larger bedrooms that will accommodate more guests, and two full bathrooms. The Givens family is excited about the opportunity to continue hosting and supporting people in this larger space.
