Ponderings at the end of a day—or year!





We also remember what the coming of Christ meant for us as the Advent season begins and Christmas is on the horizon. Ephesians 2:12-13 says, "Remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world.

But now in Christ Jesus, you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ." Even if we perhaps can't remember what it was like to have no hope in God, we can definitely remember the meaning of the gift God sent us in the form of a baby!

Your Light Has Come



In the introduction to his book For All God's Worth, theologian N.T. Wright says, "Christmas is God lighting a candle, and you don't light a candle in a room that's already full of sunlight. You light a candle in a room that's so murky that the candle, when lit, reveals just how bad things really are. The light shines in the darkness, says St. John, and the darkness has not overcome it."

For that reason, Wright explains, Christmas isn't a dream or a momentary escape but reality. And the same is true for Christianity. "Either Jesus is the Lord of the world and all reality makes sense in his life, or he is dangerously irrelevant to the problems and possibilities of today's world," he adds. "There is no middle ground. Either Jesus was, and is, the Word of God, or he, and the stories Christians tell about him, are lies."





A Season of Relationship



For his Christmas album *Milk & Cookies*, worship leader David Crowder wanted to focus on the relationship aspect of the holidays and the mixed emotions involved. Deaths of loved ones, absence from home or having "no home to get back to," he says, can wrap sadness into what's supposed to be a joyful season.

Yet pain and separation perfectly mirror the meaning of Christmas, according to Crowder. "It's about the created being at a distance from their Maker and ... God making a way back into communion with [them]." He adds, "I feel like most of the stuff that we experience around the season points to what is the miraculous — that there was the best gift ever given, and it was to make a way back into relationship with our Creator."


Church Council Notes—November 27, 2023

- ⇒ The Discernment Team (Ruth) did not have a report.
- ⇒ The Vision Team (Chuck M.) hopes to complete the pastor evaluation from the focus groups by the end of January. Discussion was held regarding some ideas that were generated from the focus groups.
- ⇒ The Care Ministry (Ron D.) will meet soon. The last communion in October went well.
- ⇒ The Hospitality Ministry (Brocia) reported a foster, adoption, kinship game night has been planned for Dec. 9. The New Year's Eve party will begin at 6 pm. Supper Clubs are being organized for January and February as well as game afternoons. Welcome baskets for new Halstead residents are being discussed.
- ⇒ The Mission Ministry (Dwight) reported both the Hog Roast and the Mission Supper were well attended and made (before expenses) around \$2,600 and around \$6,000. The council had some discussion around the use of mission funds.
- ⇒ The Nurture Ministry (Debbie) reported the winter quarter mission offering will be for USD 440 backpacks.
