HARK, THE HERALD ANGELS SING!

Read Luke 2:13-14

Rethinking our Worship:

If heaven is singing about Jesus right now, what would change in your schedule, habits, or priorities if your life really matched that song?

The Christmas Message

The angels shattered the night sky with a song, but their message actually invites stillness of heart. “Glory to God in the highest” means the center of the universe is not human achievement, but the glory of God revealed in a newborn King. The angels announce peace, yet the world into which Jesus was born was anything but peaceful—occupied, unjust, and weary. The good news is not that circumstances suddenly improved, but that God Himself drew near. Glory and peace meet in a Person, not a plan. As heaven sings over the earth, the call is to stop striving long enough to truly behold the King who has come near.

Your Response (to the Message)

“Lord, one place I want Your peace to rule in my life is...”

The Christmas Challenge

Choose one busy block of your day and deliberately turn off every device for 20–30 minutes. In that silence, speak “Glory to God in the highest” aloud and name specific places you long to see His peace on earth, starting in your own home, church, or workplace.

Closing Prayer

Lord Jesus, King of glory, thank You for stepping into a noisy, broken world with a song of peace. Quiet my heart where it is restless and distracted. Teach me to honor You above my schedule, my preferences, and my worries. Let Your glory re-center my life, and let Your peace flow through me to others this Christmas. Be adored in my thoughts, my words, and my choices today. Amen.





GO! TELL IT ON THE MOUNTAIN.

Read Luke 2:17

Rethinking our Worship:

If the people around you only knew about Jesus from listening to you this month, what picture of Him would they walk away with?

The Christmas Message

After seeing Jesus, the shepherds do not return to “business as usual.” They return glorifying and praising God, telling everyone what they have heard and seen. The first response to beholding the King is not private inspiration but public declaration. These men had no training, platform, or strategy—only a fresh encounter and a simple story. That is still enough. The Christmas message is not meant to be hoarded like a precious secret; it is a treasure that grows as it is shared. God delights in using ordinary voices to announce extraordinary news. The question is not whether you are gifted enough, but whether you are willing to speak of what you have seen in Christ.

Your Response (to the Message)

“Jesus, the main thing I want others to know about You from my life is...”

The Christmas Challenge

Sometime this week, share a brief personal “good news” story about Jesus with one person—by text, over coffee, or in a handwritten note. Focus on what Christ has done in you this year, not on having perfect words.

Closing Prayer

Jesus, good news for all people, thank You that You trusted simple shepherds with heaven’s announcement. Give boldness and humility to my voice. Free me from fear of rejection or awkwardness. Fill my heart so full of Your joy that it naturally overflows in conversation. This Christmas, let my words point someone closer to You, the Savior and King. Amen.





O, COME LET US ADORE HIM!

Read Matthew 2:10-11

Rethinking our Worship:

When people look at how you spend your time, money, and attention, would they say you admire Jesus—or that you actually adore Him?

The Christmas Message

The magi traveled far, risking reputation and resources, to bow before a child. Their posture preaches: true wisdom recognizes when Someone greater has entered the room. They do not merely observe or compliment; they adore. Adoration is more than appreciation—it is joyful surrender. The gifts they lay down mirror their hearts laid down. In a culture that prizes being impressive and self-sufficient, kneeling in worship can feel like a loss of status. Yet in God's kingdom, this is where dignity is restored. Before Jesus, titles, degrees, and accomplishments fade. What remains is the honor of being worshipers who recognize the King, even when He comes in unexpected wrapping.

Your Response (to the Message)

"Jesus, one area I choose to move from admiration to adoration is..."

The Christmas Challenge

Physically kneel in prayer at some point today. As you kneel, name at least three areas where you want to surrender control to Jesus—time, finances, relationships, or ministry—and deliberately offer them as "gifts" of worship.

Closing Prayer

Christ our King, worthy of all adoration, thank You for drawing wise ones from far away to worship at Your feet. Teach my heart to bow gladly before You. Strip away pride that resists surrender. Let my life, resources, and decisions be gifts that reflect Your worth. May this season be marked by genuine adoration, not just seasonal sentiment. You are worthy, now and forever. Amen.





SILENT NIGHT

Read Luke 2:6-7

Rethinking our Worship:

If someone tracked the noise level of your soul this week, would there be any space quiet enough for you to notice Jesus' presence?

The Christmas Message

Bethlehem likely was not literally silent, yet the Scriptures describe a simple, almost understated birth: a baby wrapped in cloths and laid in a manger. No palace, no parade, no fanfare—just the hidden arrival of Heaven's King. God's salvation enters history in a way easy to overlook. This challenges the assumption that God only works in dramatic, visible ways. Often, He moves in hushed spaces, in hidden obedience, in small acts of faithfulness. The "silent night" reminds believers to look for Christ not only in the spectacular but also in the ordinary. The world's hope lay in a feed trough, proving that quiet places can hold the loudest miracles.

Your Response (to the Message)

"Lord, here is one ordinary place where I sense You quietly at work..."

The Christmas Challenge

Set aside one evening to create a "silent night" in your home. Turn off background noise, dim the lights, and read the birth account in Luke 2 slowly. After reading, sit in silence for five minutes, asking God to show you where He is quietly at work in your life and community.

Closing Prayer

Emmanuel, God with us, thank You for entering our world in holy humility. Open my eyes to see Your presence in the quiet corners of my day. Forgive me for chasing only the big, impressive moments and missing You in the ordinary. Let this Christmas be a season where silence becomes sacred, and where stillness helps me behold You more clearly. Amen.





MARY, DID YOU KNOW?

Read Luke 1:30-33

Rethinking our Worship:

What is one area of your life where you say you trust God, but your actual decisions show you still want to stay in control?

The Christmas Message

Mary receives staggering news: she will bear the Son of the Most High. She cannot possibly grasp every implication—how could she? Yet her response is simple surrender: “May it be to me according to your word.” Faith is not having full information; it is trusting God’s character when details are unclear. Mary models a courageous, costly “yes” that will expose her to misunderstanding, hardship, and awe. The child she carries will not just change her life; He will change the world. Christmas reminds believers that obedience may be confusing in the moment, but it participates in a larger story of redemption. Saying “yes” to God today echoes into generations.

Your Response (to the Message)

“Father, the step of obedience I’m afraid to take is... I choose to trust You with it by...”

The Christmas Challenge

Identify one specific act of obedience you have been delaying—reconciling with someone, serving in a ministry, giving generously, or adjusting a habit. Write it down, pray over it, and take one tangible step toward that obedience before the week ends.

Closing Prayer

Holy Savior, born of Mary, thank You for her humble courage in accepting Your call. Grow that same trusting obedience in my heart. When the future feels unclear, anchor me in Your faithfulness. Help me to say “yes” even when I do not see the whole road. Use my obedience, however small, to bless others and honor Your name this Christmas. Amen.





JOY TO THE WORLD!!

Read Luke 2:10-11

Rethinking our Worship:

If joy in Christ is deeper than your circumstances, what current situation are you letting have more power over your mood than the gospel?

The Christmas Message

The angel's announcement is "good news of great joy" for all people, not because pain has disappeared, but because a Savior has arrived. Joy in Scripture is not shallow cheerfulness or seasonal nostalgia; it is a deep, resilient gladness rooted in who Jesus is and what He has done. The world's joy depends on circumstances; kingdom joy flows from Christ's unchanging presence and promises. "Joy to the world" is both proclamation and invitation: the Lord has come, so open your heart, your home, your community to His reign. When Jesus is received as King, joy does not erase sorrow, but it does outlast it.

Your Response (to the Message)

"Jesus, here is the situation I've allowed to control my mood more than Your good news..."

The Christmas Challenge

Practice "intentional joy" today. Choose one person who is weary or discouraged and find a concrete way to bring them joy in Jesus' name—a meal, a thoughtful gift, a visit, or words of encouragement that explicitly point to Christ's hope.

Closing Prayer

Jesus, Lord of joy, thank You that Your coming brings good news that cannot be canceled by hardship. Restore to me the joy of Your salvation. Guard my heart from cynicism and hopelessness. Let my life be a channel of Your joy to my family, church, and neighbors this Christmas. May many taste and see that You are good. Amen.





AWAY IN A MANGER

Read Philippians 2:6-8

Rethinking our Worship:

Where in your daily life do you quietly expect to be treated like the important one, even though you follow a King who chose a manger?

The Christmas Message

The manger is a symbol of shocking humility. The eternal Son of God does not cling to His rights but empties Himself, taking the form of a servant. The One who spoke galaxies into existence is laid where animals feed. This is not accidental; it reveals the heart of God. Jesus does not arrive distant from human poverty and vulnerability, but right in the middle of it. His lowly birth foreshadows a life of self-giving love that will lead to a cross. To follow such a King means embracing humility, not status; service, not self-exaltation. Christmas invites believers to reconsider what true greatness looks like in the Kingdom of God.

Your Response (to the Message)

“Lord, one place I’m tempted to seek recognition instead of humble service is...”

The Christmas Challenge

Choose a quiet, behind-the-scenes act of service that no one may notice—cleaning, childcare, visiting someone overlooked, or meeting a practical need. Do it anonymously if possible, offering it as manger-shaped worship to Christ.

Closing Prayer

Servant King, thank You for stepping down into our world so fully that You rested in a manger. Deliver me from the temptation to seek recognition and comfort above obedience. Shape my heart to mirror Your humility. Let my service this Christmas reflect Your gentle, self-giving love, so that others may glimpse You through simple acts of care. Amen.





JESUS, OH WHAT A WONDERFUL CHILD

Read Isaiah 9:6-7

Rethinking our Worship:

If Jesus really is as wonderful as you say, what is one specific fear, habit, or plan that would have to change in response to who He is?

The Christmas Message

Isaiah's prophecy piles up royal titles on a promised child. In the manger, those titles look almost absurd. Yet wrapped in weakness is the wisdom, power, and everlasting care of God. This child will grow to teach, heal, forgive, and ultimately bear the sins of the world. His kingdom will never end. To call Jesus a "wonderful child" is not sentimental; it is a confession that in Him, heaven's fullness dwells. Christmas invites believers to let wonder rise again—to see beyond familiar images to the staggering reality of who this Child is. The more clearly Jesus is beheld, the more fully hearts respond with worship, trust, and lifelong allegiance.

Your Response (to the Message)

"Jesus, because You are wonderful in this specific way in my life, I want to change..."

The Christmas Challenge

Gather with family, friends, or your small group and take turns finishing this sentence: "Jesus, You are wonderful to me because...". Let each person share at least one concrete way Christ has shown Himself wonderful this year.

Closing Prayer

Glorious Jesus, wonderful Child and everlasting King, thank You for coming near in such tender vulnerability. Restore my sense of wonder at who You are. Guard my heart from treating Your birth as a mere tradition. Let the truth of Your names—Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace—shape how I live, serve, and hope. Be adored in my life, now and always. Amen.
