^{*} Please note: This is <u>not</u> intended to be a "fair" scholarship (for example, attending church more or being more active does NOT mean more scholarship dollars – see Matthew 20.1-16). Hope Scholars is designed as an act of sheer grace. Everyone who submits an essay must sign an "Agreement of Understanding" commitment.

What Are We Talking About?

Modest scholarships for all levels of undergraduate education: 4-year, 2-year, 1-year certificate or vocational ed training. Key word: *modest*! (We have *no idea* how much we'll collect or how many people will apply!)

Why Does the Church Care About This?

Two important reasons. First, **Presbyterian theology views all labor as a divine calling** ... maintaining that to serve in any career – whether as educator, engineer, clerk, physician, bookkeeper, scientist, writer, homemaker, attorney, or construction worker -- is equally noble as entering church service. Whatever our work, we engage it as children of God – bearing witness to Jesus Christ.

Second, in Jesus' own mission statement (Luke 4.18-19), he noted the Kingdom call to proclaim release to captives and freedom for the oppressed. At this juncture in U.S. culture, debt marks the most common "prison" the average citizen faces. "As college costs spiral out of control and public universities cut back on financial aid, more students and their parents are taking on loans to pay tuition, according to the *Los Angeles Times* Americans' student loan debt surpassed credit card debt for the first time in history in August 2010." In late 2023, student loan debt neared \$1.75 trillion.²

Working together, our individually small contributions are *more* – and have the potential to make a modest but significant difference.

Where Does the Money Come From?

Hope will receive designated gifts through Easter, 3/31/24. Many may also participate in the Hope Scholars Golf Scramble & silent auction, a funding source since 2020. For those who choose to donate, some may make self-identified "sacrifices" during Lent (say, forgoing a "nice to have" – like a luxury coffee or soda) and contribute that amount. Others may sell an item no longer needed and donate the proceeds or a portion. Some may make an extra commitment of some sort. No rules here – just right!

Who Is Eligible & What Do They Have To Do?

Ordinarily a high school senior or graduate (or equivalent) or current undergraduate student *of any age* who: 1) considers Hope their primary faith community *and* attends Hope, on average, at least once per month each quarter -- or who has a parent who does, *and* 2) writes a required 1-page essay (more than 2 full pages will not be considered) on one of the following topics:

- 1. Scripture affirms that every Christ-follower is a minister -- and that we all live *all of our lives* unto God. Explain what this means to you.
- 2. Discuss a school, church, or community activity that has brought you joy and helped shape your sense about God's direction for your future.
- 3. Explain how you think your education will have a positive impact on your life, your family, and/or your community.
- 4. Discuss how the major or career you are interested in pursuing will allow you to 'grow deeper with God and others' and/or 'reach wider to serve and share God's love with the world.'

Important: Since 2020, Hope has given two equal- or greater-value scholarships outside our walls: one each at Lake Nona High and Oak Ridge High (ORHS), an atrisk school that once bordered John Calvin Presbyterian. When John Calvin closed in 2009 & sold its property to benefit ORHS, the closing church created a fund to launch new congregations; Hope Pres was the first beneficiary — connecting us significantly with that school. Hope has awarded one equal- or great-value scholarship at Oak Ridge since 2012. Neither the Oak Ridge nor Lake Nona senior will be required to write an essay or attend Hope ... This is a gift of sheer grace.

What's the Process?

In-house applicants must submit their 1-page essay (without name or unnecessary identifying remarks) by PDF or hard copy by Easter Sunday 3/31/24 at 11 am. They must also sign an "Agreement of Understanding." On Easter morning, a clerk will assign a number to the essay and keep a private list matching names and numbers. The essay must address one of the four designated topics. Please specify which question you're addressing. A "first reader" will assess the numbered essays for compliance with guidelines. Afterward, a panel of 3-5 adults who do not have family members in contention will determine whether to designate an "Essay of Note." All applicants (+ the ORHS & Lake Nona students) will receive an equal portion of funds – though the author of one strong essay may receive a modest additional amount as Essay of Note.

Scholarship checks will be paid to schools only and not to individuals.
